2016 STEVE LOWENSTEIN AWARD

HONOREES: Leigh Bohannon, Aasha Benton, Dr. Keisha Thomas – Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Portland Alumnae Chapter

Leigh Bohannon is a native Oregonian. She attended Grant High School and graduated from Alabama A&M University in 2006. Since returning to Portland, she has devoted much of her time to working to improve the lives of the less fortunate in Portland, mostly through the Portland Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta as co-chair of Delta GEMS.

Aasha Benton is co-chair of the GEMS program. She is also a certified Zumba instructor and donates her time teaching classes throughout the community to help provide physical activity to build a strong heart and body.

Keisha Thomas, PhD, is an electrical engineer originally from Brooklyn, NY. Since moving to Portland, she has volunteered with the Portland Alumnae Chapter's Dr. Betty Shabazz Academy. She has also mentored youth in after-school, summer camps, and other STEM-based programs for over 15 years.

The three honorees volunteer to lead the Dr. Betty Shabazz Delta Academy. **The Portland Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc.** has been a pillar of Portland's black community since 1945. Its 250 college-educated members have lived on the front line of African American and women's civil rights and social justice issues. The Chapter provides an extensive array of public service initiatives through its Five-Point Program Thrust of Economic Development, Educational Development, International Awareness and Involvement, Physical and Mental Health, and Political Awareness and Involvement.

The Delta Academy was created out of an urgent sense that bold action was needed to save our young females (ages 11 - 14) from the perils of academic failure, low self-esteem, and crippled futures. The Academy enriches and enhances the education that our young teens receive in public schools, particularly in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM). Dr. Keisha Thomas meets with the participants bi-weekly with assistance from other chapter members.

Delta GEMS (Growing and Empowering Myself Successfully) is a natural outgrowth and expansion of the Dr. Betty Shabaaz Delta Academy, created to capture the dreams of African American at-risk, adolescent girls aged 14-18. Delta GEMS provides a framework to actualize those dreams through activities that provide opportunities for self-reflection and individual growth, develop a Can-Do attitude, and offer a road map for college and career planning. All high school seniors that have participated have graduated, and most of them have gone on to colleges and universities.

Both programs emphasize personal development, self-esteem, bonding with peers, academic enrichment, and community service. Partners have included Big Brother Big Sister, Black Parent Initiative, Black United Fund, Martin Luther King Day of Service, and Susan G. Komen Race for the Cure.
