The Homeownership Advisory Committee is a sub-committee of HCDC. The Portland City Council has charged HOAC with reviewing homeownership policy and programs for the City of Portland and making recommendations to improve policy and program. HOAC has focused its work on analyzing the strategies to close the minority homeownership gap.

Authorized for the purposes of (1) expanding the supply of affordable housing for the low- and very low-income families with an emphasis on rental housing; (2) building state and local nonprofit capacity to carry out affordable housing programs and (3) providing coordinated assistance to participants in development of affordable low-income housing. Portland is the lead jurisdiction for the Portland HOME Consortium.

HUD describes a homeless person as someone that resides:

- 1. in places not meant for human habitation,
- 2. in an emergency shelter, or

3. in transitional or supportive housing for homeless persons who

In addition, a person may be considered homeless if, without assistance from a service-provider, they would be living on the streets.

Also included, persons who ordinarily sleep on the street or in emergency or transitional housing but are spending a short time (30 consecutive days or less) in a hospital or other institution are considered homeless. People staying in "homeless camps" or otherwise living outdoors are also considered homeless.
