7. BACKGROUND ANALYSIS

The East Portland Action Plan committee established as a third priority: Civic Engagement for culturally appropriate and language-specific entry-level workshops. These funds are stipulated to allow community members, neighborhoods, business associations, non-profits and other groups to seek funding to address the Action Plan item: Community Building.2.3: Develop and hold leadership and civic engagement classes/programs for East Portland Citizens to build capacity for participating in lobbying, advocacy, board participation and partnership, etc.
