Passing the ordinance gives BES the opportunity to accept \$1,000,000 in grant funding from the EPA for Brownfield cleanup activities. At least half of the grant must be used to establish a Revolving Loan Fund that shall be administered by BES. These funds shall be loaned to private landowners for brownfield cleanup activities.

I. RECOMMENDATION

City Council should pass this ordinance to accept a grant from EPA in the amount of \$1,000,000 for brownfield cleanup activities.

BACKGROUND II.

The EPA's Brownfield Revolving Loan Fund Grant Program provides funding for a grant recipient to capitalize a revolving fund and to make loans and provide sub-grants to carry out cleanup activities. BES manages the Portland Brownfield Program which provides environmental assessment and remediation assistance on brownfield properties in order to enhance environmental, economic, and social quality.

Since 1998, the City of Portland has secured \$2.18 million in environmental assessment and remediation grants from the U.S. EPA. Assessment activities have occurred on public and private lands but cleanup activities have only occurred on public lands. To date, there has been no funding available to private landowners for cleanup activities. A minimum of half of these new grant funds would allow the City to establish a revolving fund to make loans available to private landowners for brownfield cleanup activities. The balance of the grant funds are permitted to be used on City-owned properties for brownfield cleanup activities.

III. FINANCIAL IMPACT

There will be \$1,000,000 in new grant revenue. EPA requires a 20% non-federal match. Local match in the amount of \$200,000 will be provided in the form of salary and benefits in the FY 2011/2012, FY 2012/2013, FY 2013/2014, FY 2014/2015, and FY 2015/2016 proposed budgets of the Bureau of Environmental Services. Matching funds are available in the Sewer System Operating Fund, Bureau of Environmental Services, ESPP000017 / PUPPECBF000000BE.

IV. LEGAL ISSUES

None identified at this time.

V. CONTROVERSIAL ISSUES

No controversial issues have been identified at this time. Organizations supportive of this ordinance action include other City agencies, brownfield property owners, Oregon Tradeswomen, Inc, Groundwork Portland, Coalition for a Livable Future, East Portland Action Plan, Constructing Hope, Oregon Public Health Department, Oregon Department of Environmental Quality, property developers, residents, business owners and workers adjacent to brownfield properties, and community based organizations.

This brownfield cleanup work is consistent with the City's policies related to environmental quality, economic development and community health.

VII. CITIZEN PARTICIPATION

The BES Portland Brownfield Program facilitates the Brownfield Advisory Committee. The committee consists of a diverse set of stakeholders representing a wide range of individuals and organizations impacted by and/or involved in brownfield redevelopment.

VIII. OTHER GOVERNMENT PARTICIPATION

Work conducted under the proposed action will involve coordination with the Bureau of Planning, Bureau of Housing and Community Development, Portland Development Commission, City Hall, Oregon Department of Environmental Quality, Oregon Economic and Community Development Department, U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, Multnomah County, and Port of Portland.
