6. History of Agenda Item/Background:

updating of the Comprehensive Plan.

On June 9, 20010, Portland City Council passed Ordinance No. 183866 providing financial assistance for five DCL organizations to design culturally-appropriate public engagement activities to build capacity within their organizations and increase participation in the Portland Plan. These organizations included the Center for Intercultural Organizing (CIO), the Latino Network, the Immigrant and Refugee Community Organization (IRCO), the Native American Youth and Family Center (NAYA), and the Urban League of Portland. During development of the



draft Portland Plan that will go to City Council in 2012, these organizations have been key to drawing in diverse participants to help frame strategies. Participation of these organizations will continue as the City moves to implement the Portland Plan and draft a new Comprehensive Plan.

- 7. Legal Issues: None associated with sponsorship grants. Active public engagement is required as a Goal of comprehensive planning.

Previous Portland Plan participants will be invited to continue activities supporting implementation of strategies and input into the Comprehensive Plan.
