The City of Portland, Oregon Police Bureau applied for U.S. Department of Justice (USDOJ), Office of Justice Programs (OJP), Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA) grant funding. The grant period is October 1, 2012, through September 30, 2013.

If awarded, the USDOJ OJP BJA will reimburse the City a maximum of \$211,532 for expenses incurred by the Police Bureau for White Collar Crime Detail overtime, program expenses and a 0.5 FTE Multnomah County Deputy District Attorney dedicated to intellectual property crime investigation and prosecution.

The Portland Police Bureau's White Collar Crime Detail has developed longstanding collaborative relationships with local law enforcement agencies, the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), the Internal Revenue Service (IRS), the Department of Homeland Security (DHS), the Social Security Administration (SSA), the U.S. Postal Inspector, the Tigard Police Department Commercial Crimes Unit and local brand representatives in the development of the Intellectual Property Crime Enforcement Program Team (IPCET).

As a matter of course the Police Bureau would normally conduct criminal investigations on the type of cases pursued by the IPCET. Participation in the IPCET provides a force and resource multiplier, which is of great benefit to the City and the community served by the bureau. Bureau personnel assigned to the IPCET remain under the supervision of the Portland Police Bureau. When statutory, constitutional or decisional law of Oregon restricts investigative methods more than federal law, the investigative methods employed by Portland police officers working with other law enforcement agencies shall conform to the requirements of Oregon law. Portland police officers may not take action or exercise authority under the agreement if the action or exercise of authority is prohibited by Oregon law.

For these reasons the bureau deems this a routine and non-controversial item that would not require public involvement.
