

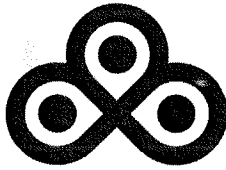

5. Purpose of Agenda Item:

Intervene in proceeding of Oregon Public Utility Commission to present and protect the City's interests in addressing energy efficiency questions related to choosing electricity or natural gas fuels, switching gas or electricity fuel and the influence of Energy Trust of Oregon incentives for choosing one fuel over the other.

6. History of Agenda Item/Background:

The City of Portland's Climate Action Plan establishes short- and long-term goals for carbon reduction which are influenced by the carbon emissions from generating electricity and use of natural gas. Participation of the City in PUBC proceedings allows the city to 1) obtain information regarding gas and electric fuel efficiency and other matters not readily available; 2) hear other parties' actions and comments in proceedings; and 3) influence outcomes of proceedings for the benefit of Portland residents.
