5. Purpose of Agenda Item:

Intervene in proposed rulemaking hearing of Oregon Public Utility Commission (OPUC) to present and protect the City's interests in the transfer of information between energy utilities and the Energy Trust of Oregon for the purpose of improving building energy efficiency and promoting renewable energy development.

6. History of Agenda Item/Background:

The City of Portland's Climate Action Plan establishes short- and long-term goals for carbon reduction which are influenced by the carbon emissions from generating electricity and use of natural gas. Participation of the City in PUC proceedings allows the city to 1) obtain information regarding gas and electric fuel efficiency and other matters not readily available; 2) hear other parties' actions and comments in proceedings; and 3) influence outcomes of proceedings for the benefit of Portland residents.

7. Legal Issues: The hearing proposes new rules and amendment of existing rules to facilitate the transfer of information between energy utilities and the Energy Trust of Oregon which would



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8. What individuals or groups are or would be supportive or opposed to this action? Energy Trust of Oregon is supportive. Energy utilities may be supportive or opposed.

9. How does this relate to current City policies?

The City of Portland and Multnomah County Climate Action Plan 2009 includes an action to require energy performance benchmarking for all commercial and multi-family buildings before 2012 as a key first step toward achieving a 2030 Objective to reduce the total energy use of all buildings built before 2010 by 25 percent. The City has not implemented a benchmarking policy to date, and barriers to tenant energy consumption data often challenge building owners, managers and operators who seek to understand their whole building energy use. Access to more complete energy utility customer data would enable the Energy of Trust of Oregon to benchmark and track whole building energy consumption for commercial and multifamily residential buildings.



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
