Passing the ordinance gives the Bureau of Environmental Services (BES) the authorization to accept \$100,000 in grant funding for the replacement and restoration on one of nine fish barriers that blocks juvenile fish passage, daylights the stream, and restores floodplain and riparian habitat in Crystal Springs.

Local match in the amount of \$55,200 will be provided in the form of salary, benefits, materials and services in the FY 2012/13 budget of the Bureau of Environmental Services. Additional match totaling \$1,409,330 (for a total match amount of \$1,464,530) will come from TriMet and UPRR.

a) What impacts are anticipated in the community from this proposed Council item?

This grant from EMSWCD is part of a broader effort to focus on salmon recovery in one watershed – Crystal Springs. The railroad culvert, owned by Union Pacific Railroad (UPRR), is the only privately held culvert in the system and is a known barrier to juvenile salmonids. A partnership between TriMet and Union Pacific Railroad (UPRR) on the Portland-Milwaukie light rail project facilitated discussions for the ninth culvert to be replaced. The new railroad culvert will carry both UPRR trains and TriMet light rail trains over the creek.

Together with TriMet, BES visited the Eastmoreland, Sellwood-Moreland Improvement League (SMILE), and Reed neighborhood associations to talk about the culvert program and the railroad culvert project. The culvert site is not accessible to the public. The railroad culvert site is along UPRR tracks and future Portland-Milwaukie light rail tracks between the Eastmoreland Golf Course to the east and McLoughlin Boulevard to the west. The impacts on traffic and livability in nearby (but not abutting) residential neighborhoods is minimal given the inaccessible location of the culvert.

In 2010, BES worked with Reed College, the Sellwood-Moreland Improvement League (SMILE) Neighborhood Association, and adjacent property owners to perform a culvert replacement at SE 28th Avenue. The railroad culvert will be replaced during summer 2012 and all the fish barriers in Crystal Springs Creek will be replaced by the end of 2014.

b) Which community and business groups, under-represented groups, organizations, external government entities, and other interested parties were involved in this effort, and when and how were they involved?

In March and April, together with TriMet, BES visited the Eastmoreland, Sellwood-Moreland Improvement League (SMILE), and Reed neighborhood associations to talk about the culvert program and the railroad culvert project. Responses from the neighborhoods were positive.

BES works closely with a community group focused on stewardship and restoration in Crystals Springs Creek, the Crystal Springs Partnership. The goal of the partnership is to increase awareness of watershed issues, promote stewardship opportunities, and provide support for watershed projects. BES joined the partnership at community events and fairs to talk about culvert removal and efforts to improve watershed health at various events.

Additionally, BES is working with the Army Corps of Engineers, NOAA Fisheries, Metro, Portland Parks, to remove the other eight culverts throughout the Crystal Springs watershed and restoring Westmoreland Park. Each of these projects requires a unique approach to public involvement.

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c) How did public involvement shape the outcome of this Council item?

This grant from EMSWCD is part of a broader effort to focus on salmon recovery and restoration in one watershed – Crystal Springs. The Crystal Springs community is very supportive of salmon recovery efforts.

d) Who designed and implemented the public involvement related to this Council item?

Public involvement to-date has been a joint effort by the BES Science, Fish and Wildlife Division and TriMet. Ronda Fast at BES and Jennifer Koozer at TriMet designed and implemented public involvement to-date. For TriMet, the context of this project is the larger light rail development. For BES, the context of this project is the culvert removal program in Crystal Springs.

I. RECOMMENDATION

City Council should pass this ordinance to accept EMSWCD grant funds in the amount of \$100,000 for Crystal Springs Railroad Culvert Replacement & Restoration.

II. BACKGROUND

In 2007, the City launched the Grey to Green Initiative (G2G), aimed at accelerating the implementation of the Portland Watershed Management Plan. G2G focuses on seven key components. Most pertinent to this proposal are the removal and/or repair of 9 fish barrier culverts, the acquisition of over 400 acres of land, and invasive species removal, among other focal areas that add up to a \$150 million effort. Of the \$50 million earmarked by the City Council, \$2 Million were specifically targeted to the culvert effort. After an exhaustive inventory, ranking and review by a steering committee comprised of professional representatives from NOAA Fisheries, the US Fish and Wildlife Service, the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife, the Johnson Creek Watershed Council, and the Portland Bureaus of Transportation, Parks and Recreation, and Environmental Services, the City selected the 9 fish barrier culverts in one watershed that has the highest potential for salmon recovery.

This grant will help to fund replacement of the Railroad Culvert, one of nine culvert lacking fishfriendly passage features as well as restoration of the stream channel. Replacing these fish barriers will provide access to the most intact and oldest riparian habitat in the stream, as well as cold, spring headwaters where spawning habitat exists. BES is currently replacing six of the other culverts along this stream.

This award will provide \$100,000 in new grant revenue. Local match in the amount of \$55,200 will be provided in the form of salary, benefits, materials and services in the FY 2012/13 budget

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of the Bureau of Environmental Services. Matching funds are available in the Sewer System Operating Fund, Bureau of Environmental Services, WBS element E08967. Additional match totaling \$1,409,330 (for a total match amount of \$1,464,530) will come from TriMet and UPRR.
