No revenue impacts are expected to occur from the adoption of the Central City 2035 Concept Plan by this resolution because the plan is focused on high-level policy and urban design directions. The final plan, which includes recommendations from four quadrant planning efforts, is anticipated to be implemented in 2014 as part of the early implementation of the new Comprehensive Plan. Starting in 2015, the completed plan will be used for revisions to the Central City Comprehensive Plan and zoning maps and major project list. These implementing actions are anticipated to

facilitate development in the plan area, with attendant increases in property values and property tax revenue.

- 5. Purpose of Agenda Item: This resolution provides Council endorsement on the Central City 2035 Concept Plan, the first step in updating the 1988 Central City Plan, and provides direction to city staff for the completion of Central City work.
- 6. History of Agenda Item/Background: The 1988 Central City Plan has been the document which has guided decision-making and investments in the City's core over the last almost 25 years. The majority of actions in that plan have been accomplished. There is now a new set of opportunities and challenges facing the Central City which require new directions and policies. Dear Mayor Adams and City Commissioners,

The Planning and Sustainability Commission is pleased to forward our recommendations on the Central City 2035 Concept Plan. We support the policies and urban design directions laid out in this plan as the first step in updating the 1988 Central City Plan. The Central City 2035 planning project is intended to help preserve our existing assets and guide us on a path to a truly livable, sustainable city center.

At a September 11, 2012 public hearing on the plan, the Commission received a range of testimony generally supportive of the Concept Plan. Participants in the process testified in favor of the extensive work that had been done. Other comments were focused on transportation issues, specifically bicycling mode share goals and implementation of the Bicycle Master Plan.

After the public hearing on September 11, 2012, City staff compiled a final memorandum with recommended staff changes which was presented to the commission at a public meeting on September 25, 2012. The amendments reflected comments received from the commission and the public at large. After review the Commission supported the changes and supports work that will be done in the following phases to address all the concerns which were discussed.

On September 25, 2012 the Planning and Sustainability Commission unanimously voted to forward the Central City 2035 Concept Plan to City Council for adoption by resolution. The Commission strongly supports the Concept Plan and the strategic vision of a center of innovation and exchange it lays out for the Central City. This plan supports and is consistent with the N/NE Quadrant Plan which the Commission is also forwarding to City Council for adoption as a separate agenda item.



The Planning and Sustainability Commission recommends that Council adopt the Resolution which:

- 1. Will adopt the Central City 2035 Concept Plan as non-binding City policy for the Central City;
- 2. Direct completion of the long-range quadrant planning work outlined in the Central City 2035 Concept Plan; and
- 3. Direct staff to submit to City Council by June 2015 an ordinance that adopts the final Central City 2035 Plan and amends the Portland Comprehensive Plan and Map and Zoning Code and maps in conformance with the Plan.

Thank you for the opportunity to participate in the review of these plans and for considering our recommendations.
