


1) Legislation Title:

Adopt findings, authorize an exemption to the competitive bidding process to Procurement Services pursuant to ORS 279C and PCC 5.34, authorize contracts and provide payment for construction of the Washington Park Reservoirs Improvements Project (Ordinance)

2) Purpose of the Proposed Legislation:

The goal of the Washington Park Reservoirs Improvements Project is to provide increased reliability of stored drinking water at Portland Water Bureau's (PWB) Washington Park Reservoir (WPR) site and to protect the stored water.

The PWB's current vision, as identified in the Long Term 2 Enhanced Surface Water Treatment Rule (LT2) Storage Recommendation (March 2009), is to replace the existing open finished drinking water reservoir (WPR No. 3) with 15 million gallons (MG) of buried storage on-site generally within the same footprint as the existing reservoir and to disconnect a second open finished drinking water reservoir (WPR No. 4) from the public water system.

The Water Bureau is proposing an alternative contracting method, namely the Construction Manager/General Contractor (CM/GC) method for this Project. The alternative contracting method will enable the CM/GC to provide input during the design process for value engineering, constructability review, to assist in developing a construction phasing plan and to assist in the land use and permit processes. Use of the CM/GC alternative contracting method is also more likely to minimize costs, reduce change orders, reduce risk, reduce construction impacts, and ensure continuous delivery of high quality water.

7. **BACKGROUND/ANALYSIS:** The goal of the Washington Park Reservoirs Improvements Project is to provide increased reliability of stored drinking water at PWB's Washington Park Reservoir (WPR) site and to protect the stored water.

The PWB's current vision, as identified in the Long Term 2 Enhanced Surface Water Treatment Rule (LT2) Storage Recommendation (March 2009), is to replace the existing open finished drinking water reservoir (WPR No. 3) with 15 million gallons of buried storage on-site generally within the existing footprint and to disconnect a second open finished drinking water reservoir (WPR No. 4) from the public water system.

The PWB proposes to use an alternative contracting method in order to establish a CM/GC to provide input during the design process for value engineering, constructability review that will assist in developing a construction phasing plan and to assist in the land use review and permitting processes. Use of an alternative contracting method is more likely to minimize costs and construction impacts thereby ensuring continuous delivery of high quality water.

The City Council is the Local Contract Review Board with the authority to exempt certain public contracts from the competitive bidding requirements of ORS Chapter 279C.
