- 5. **Purpose of Agenda Item:** This Ordinance provides authority for The Management and Finance Office to create a new Fund; the Community Solar Special Revenue Fund.
- 6. History of Agenda Item/Background: The Oregon Community Foundation's Penstemon Fund granted the Bureau of Planning and Sustainability \$100,000 for community based efforts to increase renewable energy, (Ordinance 186029). This provides an opportunity to install solar electric systems on publicly-owned facilities.
- 8. What individuals or groups are or would be supportive or opposed to this action? Opposed: None Support: Those in support of renewable energy.
- 9. How does this relate to current City policies? The creation of this fund, if successful, will support the development of solar, a renewable energy resource, on public facilities. Since 1990, with the passage of

Resolution 36748, the joint City of Portland/Multnomah County Climate Action Plan, calls for accelerated transition to renewable energy like solar. In addition, Resolution 36714, the City's five-year Economic Development Strategy adopted in 2009, identifies solar as a key opportunity within the Clean Tech and Sustainable Industries cluster.



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
