## a) What impacts are anticipated in the community from this proposed Council item?

The project includes relocation of Johnson Creek to a protected crossing over the trunk sewer and away from industrial properties, reconnecting floodplains and creating off channel refuge for STE species, addressing two stormwater outfalls, constructing an ADA accessible trail system that connects the springwater trail to the site and lays the groundwork for a community park. Typical construction impacts to the community may include noise from construction equipment, vibration due to grading work, and limited disruption to traffic due to hauling activities on Luther Road and the Springwater Trail and other related construction activities. The only construction entrance to the site is down the Springwater Trail. The trail will remain open during construction and pedestrian and bicycle traffic will be limited to a 4-5 foot lane. Trees will be removed in Clackamas County right of-way and the sites will be planted by BES Watershed Revegetation Program with native species following construction.

b) Which community and business groups, under-represented groups, organizations, external government entities, and other interested parties were involved in this effort, and when and how were they involved?

The quarter mile area surrounding the project has received two project update mailings. Project staff met directly with the Overland Park Neighborhood Coalition to discuss the project and easements. Neighbors adjacent to the project were invited to two public meetings to discuss the project and easements. Project staff also met with each neighbor individually to discuss the need for construction easements. Project staff maintains an up to date website that includes concept drawings, photos, designs, timelines, and contact information.

- c) How did public involvement shape the outcome of this Council item?
- Issues brought up by neighbors and the Overland Park Neighborhood Coalition helped shaped many concepts included in the project design. For example, neighbors were concerned about potential transient activity encroaching on their property. Project staff responded by adding fencing between the project and adjacent private property.
- d) Who designed and implemented the public involvement related to this Council item? A Public Involvement Plan was developed during the early stages of project design with help from Barney and Worth. BES staff implement public involvement activities as described above.
