TO THE COUNCIL:

The Chief Procurement Officer has advertised and received bids for Bid Number 113887 for the Portsmouth Force Main Odor Control Project for the Bureau of Environmental Services, with a project construction estimate of \$1,800,000. The Bureau of Environmental Services rated the level of project estimate confidence as Optimal.

Bids were opened on February 14, 2012, and Seven (7) bids were received. The low bid of Triad Mechanical, Inc. was deemed responsive to the requirements of the solicitation. It is recommended that the bid of Triad Mechanical, Inc. be accepted at the lump sum quoted in their bid for a total estimated amount of \$1,463,103.00.

The Bureau of Environmental Services along with Procurement Services, identified 16 (Sixteen) Divisions of Work as potential M/W/ESB subcontracting opportunities for this project, resulting in \$ 261,636.00 awarded to subcontractors.

# a) What impacts are anticipated in the community from this proposed Council item?

The project consists of two separate locations. The Portsmouth Force Main Odor Control Ventilation Facility (POVE) is located outside of the Columbia Blvd Wastewater Treatment Plant between N. Columbia Blvd and N. Columbia Ct. and the Portsmouth Shaft Improvements (POSH) is located on N. Willamette Blvd off Carey Blvd at the current North Shaft Site for the Portsmouth Force Main. There will be construction noise and some traffic delays for truck traffic at both locations and some minor access issues to the business adjacent to the POSH location.

# b) Which community and business groups, under-represented groups, organizations, external government entities, and other interested parties were involved in this effort, and when and how were they involved?

Regular communications with the neighborhoods, businesses and residents in both locations have been ongoing since the beginning of 2009. Open houses were provided in the Kenton Neighborhood in June 2010 and at the Water Pollution Control Lab in September 2010. Regular meetings with and input from the Columbia Boulevard Wastewater Treatment Plant's Citizen Advisory Committee, Kenton Neighborhood Association, Portsmouth Neighborhood, St. John's Neighborhood Association, and Friends of Cathedral Park

The North Portland Neighborhood Services (NPNS) has also been provided information about the project.

Public involvement has given the City the opportunity to address the public's needs regarding the projects. Examples would be access, vegetation, and general aesthetics of both sites.

#### I. RECOMMENDATION

Authorize a contract with the lowest responsible bidder for the Portsmouth Force Main Odor Control Facility Project No.E08927 (Ordinance).

## II. BACKGROUND

This project provides for the installation of ventilation and odor control facilities in the existing Portsmouth Tunnel system to prevent the release of odors, in particular at the North shaft site where the new Portsmouth Force Main will discharge into the Portsmouth tunnel. When the odor control project was first conceived it was assumed that odor control facilities would be provided the North shaft discharge connection, just east of the intersection of N. Willamette Boulevard and N. Carey Boulevard. Design of the Portsmouth Force Main Project included allowances for the future installation of an odor control facility adjacent to the shaft being installed at the connection point. To this end, an adjacent parcel of land, located at 6825 N. Willamette Boulevard, was purchased by BES to be used for the odor control facilities. That lot has been cleared and is currently being used by the Portsmouth Force Main contractor for their construction activities.

The scope of work for this project included a ventilation study that was conducted to verify the appropriate location for proposed Portsmouth Tunnel system odor control facilities, and to determine the best ventilation rate to be used in the facilities to minimize the chance of odor releases.

The final conclusion and recommendation from the ventilation study was that this project should include the design and construction of odor treatment facilities at two separate sites. The active ventilation and bio-contactor type odor treatment, Portsmouth Ventilation (POVE), facility will be located at the Columbia Court site,

and a passive carbon contactor type treatment system will be installed at the Portsmouth Tunnel North shaft site (POSH).

# III. FINANCIAL IMPACT

The estimated construction cost is \$ 1,800,000. Funds are available in the Sewer System Operating Fund FY 2012 Budget, Bureau of Environmental Services Project Number E08927.

### IV. LEGAL ISSUES

No legal issues have been identified.

## V. CONTROVERSIAL ISSUES

One controversial issue has been identified. The odor treatment facility to be constructed immediately south of CBWTP at the Columbia Court site will adjoin a trailhead for the Peninsula Crossing trail. BES is continuing to work with neighborhood associations and representatives of the trail committee to include design features enhancing the trailhead.

# VI. LINK TO CURRENT CITY POLICIES

The project is consistent with BES strategic planning and the BES CIP process. Construction will be performed in accordance with the City of Portland Standard Construction Specifications.

# VII. CITIZEN PARTICIPATION

Public outreach for this project has been conducted by the BES Director's Office. Several information flyers have been distributed to the community, and the project manager and public information office have been, and continue to attend neighborhood association meetings to brief the public on the project status and respond to questions.

# VIII. OTHER GOVERNMENT PARTICIPATION

There is no other governmental participation in the design and construction of these odor control facilities.
