## ORDINANCE No. 188476

\* Authorize the Bureau of Parks and Recreation to execute agreements that allow the Bureau to provide funding to Multnomah County for the administration of the SUN Community School Initiative in any fiscal year where those payments have previously been authorized by Council in the normal budgeting process (Ordinance)

The City of Portland ordains:

## Section 1. The Council finds:

- SUN Community Schools are the school-based delivery sites for the SUN Service System, a broader system of care that includes the City of Portland, Multnomah County, six school districts, the state Department of Human Services, nonprofits and community members. There are currently 85 SUN Community Schools across Multnomah County.
- 2. Eleven of these schools are operated by Portland Parks & Recreation, which has been heavily involved in the Community Schools model for decades.
- 3. Recent scientific findings about how the brain works show that high levels of stress during childhood and adolescence can damage how the brain functions. Investing early in strategies that reduce or minimize that stress on youth and families results in significant benefits to our community. SUN offers opportunities and supports that support healthy child and youth development and family stability.
  - SUN Community Schools have six main elements that are critical to their success in supporting students and families. The six elements are:
    - Strong core instructional program that challenges and supports students to their highest potential by focusing on rigor, and relevance through supportive relationships.
    - Educational support and skill development for youth and adults based on youth, family and community hopes including tutoring, homework help, team building, and building a positive identity.
    - Enrichment and recreation activities ranging from the arts to sports such as hobbies, industrial skills and games.
    - Family involvement and support such as information about the school and parents' rights, leadership development, classes like education and language learning, and opportunities to get involved.
    - Social, health and mental health resources that often include links to emergency housing and utility services, health and mental health providers, and organizations for those experiencing domestic violence.

- Family and community events that might focus on specific topics like a math or reading night, build community like a cultural celebration, or celebrate students' achievement or progress.
- 4. In addition to operating eleven of the 85 SUN Community School sites, the City of Portland provides an annual pass through of General Fund resources to support the other SUN programs within Portland. There is an intergovernmental agreement between the City and the County that sets out the program design, roles, and responsibilities for the SUN Service System.
- 5. In furtherance of the abovementioned goals, Portland Parks & Recreation wishes to continue their successful partnership with Multnomah County and the SUN Schools program by providing funding in the amount of \$635,628 for Fiscal Year 2016-17. Portland City Council has already authorized this specific payment for fiscal year 2016-17 through the budget process.
- 6. Multnomah County has recently moved toward a system of entering into one-year agreements. Multi-year agreements that the parties have previously relied on for the collaborative administration of the SUN Community Schools Initiative are no longer possible. With this new process in place, under current requirements, PP&R will need to present an ordinance each year, for each annual agreement.
- 7. In order to efficiently manage this continuing and long-term relationship, the City's interests are best served by providing PP&R with the continuing authority to execute agreements for the SUN Community School Initiative that require payment to the County, where the Council has already authorized those payments through the normal budgeting process. Providing PP&R with this authority will reduce time needed by staff and Council to address matters that have already been determined through the normal budgeting process.

## NOW, THEREFORE, The Council Directs:

a. That the Parks Commissioner or the Commissioner's designee is authorized to execute agreements, once approved as to form by the City Attorney, with Multnomah County, that will allow the Parks and Recreation Bureau to provide funding to Multnomah County for the administration of the SUN Community School Initiative, in any fiscal year to the extent the Council has budgeted and appropriated funds therefor. The Commissioner or the Commissioner's designee is authorized to execute any amendments to those agreements, once approved as to form by the City Attorney, that may be necessary for the administration of the SUN Community School Initiative, so long as those amendments do not

result in financial obligations that exceed the amount budgeted and appropriated by the Council.

Section 2. The Council declares that an emergency exists because available funds are appropriated in the current fiscal year and the agreement needs to be executed immediately in order for the funds to be used for their intended purpose, therefore, this Ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its passage by Council.
