Mayor's Budget Guidance

- \$10 million increase in Housing Bureau current appropriation level targets (CAL targets)
- 5% reduction from general fund bureaus (exempting public safety)
- Realignments from other bureaus to assist in housing and homelessness crisis

2016-17 Budget Summary

- Housing Bureau Base Budget: **\$113M**
- Decision Packages: +\$40.7M
- Increase in CAL target: +\$10M

Base Budget 2016-17: Housing Investment Production & Preservation

Preservation and Asset Management: \$30.5M

• Loan products provide financial support to developers who purchase existing rental homes and agree to rent them to people earning 60% of area median family income or less

• Fair Housing: **\$500K**

• Programs improve public's understanding of Fair Housing law and increase utilization of legal advocacy by historically underserved populations.

•New Affordable Rental Homes: \$48.3M

• Loan products provide financial support to developers who build new rental homes and agree to rent them to people earning 60% of area median family income or less

Housing Development & Finance Support: \$2.4M

• Investments that complement new construction, preservation and rehabilitation.

Decision Packages 2016-17: Housing Investment Production & Preservation

• Fair Housing – Safe Housing Hotline: +\$35K

• Provide assistance to 1,600 people per year

Multifamily Rental Rehabilitation: +\$5M

- Approximately 400 multi-family rental properties (representing over 1,200 individual units of rental housing) in East Portland have outstanding code violations cited by the Bureau of Development Services
- An allocation of \$5 Million is will address identified code violations in approximate 350 units and ensure ongoing affordability for a minimum of 10 years.

Housing Investment Fund: +\$10M

• Average subsidies suggest \$10M would produce at least 100 new affordable rental units for 60 years

Base Budget 2016-17: Homeowner Access & Retention

Healthy Homes: \$1M

• Remediation of environmental health hazards in homes that may impact occupant health (lead hazards and structural safety issues).

• Home Retention Services: **\$2.9M**

• Foreclosure prevention counseling, home repair grants, and home repair loans

• Homebuyer Financial Services: **\$3.1M**

• Homebuyer education and counseling services, and homeownership financial assistance

• Tax Exemption and Fee Waiver Programs: **\$597K**

• Administration of limited tax exemption programs for single and multi-family residences, system development charge waivers, and Mortgage Credit Certificate program

Decision Packages 2016-17: Homeowner Access & Retention

• Single-family Home Repair: +\$500K

• Approximately 60 households in East Portland receive grants to help retain their homes.

Lents Stabilization Initiative: +\$330K

• 3-year Limited Term program coordinator to stabilize low-income households at risk of displacement

Homeowner Retention Services: +\$300K

300 homeowners receive retention case management

• Shared Housing Program: +\$200K

• 400 new rental housing opportunities

Healthy Homes Program: +\$TBD

Base Budget 2016-17: Housing Access & Retention

Shelter and Emergency Services: \$2.8M

• Staffing and operation of year-round and winter emergency housing programs for men, women and youth, including facility-based transitional housing, youth funds passed through to Multnomah County

Housing Access and Stabilization: \$700K

 Programs funded in this category include benefits acquisition, 211 Info, Street Roots, and tenant education

Homeless Rapid Rehousing: \$5M

• Short-term rent assistance to prevent homelessness, as well as housing placement services and short-term rent assistance to help move people from the streets and shelters to stable homes

Supportive Housing: \$6M

• Limited-term rent assistance (up to 24 mos.) and services primarily for chronically homeless individuals and families with disabilities

Decision Packages 2016-17: Housing Access & Retention

- Continue one time only packages from 2015-16
 - Veterans Rental Assistance: +\$500K
 - 150 Veterans housed or prevented from homelessness
 - Maintain Women's Winter Shelter Year-round: +\$750K
 - 115 beds of shelter provided
 - Landlord Recruitment Retention/Response: +\$300K
 - Increased units available for people exiting homelessness
 - Intensive Street Engagement: +\$1.2M
 - 50 high barrier households moved into housing, campsite cleanup
 - Home for Everyone Staffing: +\$95K

Decision Packages 2016-17: Housing Access & Retention

Continue fall budget adjustment packages from 2015-16

Housing Choice Success Fund: +\$400K

- Assist 250 voucher holders with housing expenses and 225 high barrier families with housing search
- Emergency Shelter Options: +\$1.2M
 - 400 low barrier shelter spaces

A Home for Everyone proposals

- Housing Placement and Retention: +\$3M
 - 450 people housed or prevented from homelessness
- Safety off the Streets: +\$5M
 - 650 individuals sheltered, one-time renovation costs, plus operations
- Other AHFE Investments: +\$2M

Base Budget 2016-17: Administration and Pass-through

- Administration and Support: **\$6.9M**
- Economic Opportunity: \$2.1M
