Purpose of proposed legislation and background information:

This appointment will fill two positions on the Electrical Code Board of Appeal as required by Portland City Code Title 26.

Mr. Whitehill

I appreciate and cannot express how honored I am that Brent Welland recommending me for the electrical engineers position on the Electrical Big Board.

In my 30 years as an electrical engineer I have been fortunate to have been given the opportunity to be the designer and engineer-of-record for many varying types of project. Some examples being new hospitals; light and heavy industrial facilities; military projects; restaurants; multi-housing; memory care; assisted living; agricultural grow facilities; criminal justice; and other project types.

I appreciate the difficulty and challenge of on-the-spot decisions that electrical inspectors have to make daily. Numerous times inspectors told me while they personally agree with the proposed method their hands were tied by the letter-of-the-code. The Electrical Big Board is a place where a proposed method can be evaluated based on its merit for meeting intent-of-the-code and not only the letter–of- the-code. And most importantly the proposal must be equivalent or better in meeting the primary purpose of codes which is protecting the public.

In the past I have challenge PGE on a ruling not supported by their published standard. The ruling had a very significant detrimental impact on owners yet had no safety value to PGE personnel or to the public. After writing and submitting a thesis to them on their ruling they backed off and reverse it.

If given the opportunity I will respectfully evaluate all proposals presented and analysis them based their merit in meeting the intent-of-the code and public safety. If they do not, I have any no problem saying no.
