

 - Data sharing & research that informs local policies



Action Plan for an Age-Friendly Portland

- Action Plan was accepted in 2013 by Portland City Council via resolution
 - Action Plan intended to: "Inform City Council and City bureaus in the course of decision making related to long-term planning and capital improvement projects in the City"
 - Resolution directed the Advisory Council to oversee and monitor the implementation of the Action Plan.


