WAYOR fllay: I think there are some people here, probably all the people here, that are interested in $t$ is matter and they have a spokesman or spokesmen that can represent thea. The Council will be glad to heor thenf at this time.
-REV, ELBERT D RIDDICK: I am here in a threefold capacity, and I trust that four Honon and the Comissioners will remember that. It may be difficult for a few people to distinguich. I aa here, first of ail, as the rector of the Churchiof the Good Shepherd of Albina Incorporated. I arm here also as a nember of the Centrai East Portland Comrunity Club and also President of the Federation of Compunt ty Clubs.

Last night at our regular meeting we passed a resolution to be subaitted to thit Councif and I should like to. present thea. and I have been ushed to say, by the delegates at the meeting, and to make this specific that the Pederation, ks such, in presenting this resolution does not, enter finto the question of color or race. I trust that that is vell understood (Read)
"The Federation of Cominuity Cluos hereby protests the action of the Gartrell Comaission in attempting tio use, the property of the Neighborhood Park and Playground and the Centrai East Portiand Coramunity cluk house situated thereon in the district known as Albina for any but their origipal purpose, and respectiully requests the City Council to preserve both lunds and building for that purpose.
"Nothing hereinpefore stated is to oe construed is entering
Into the , uestion of distinction between color and ruce."

In other words our feeling is that the proferty so vought should de used as a recreational area for the children for whof it was orisinaliy pought. Speakife as rector of the church of the Good Shepherd, I have a ruport of the Central East Rortland Comanity Club. With yokr pernossion I. will read this staterient. (Read)
"The folloving Incidents have led to our appearance before yout

1. A highly-placed, well-know, and trusted employef of the park Burear visited ur. Frank Demrie, of Dervie Lros., on fusseli, itreet, Juring the week burore is. to inforit him that the property purchased for faiparkfand play round sife on plint Street was to de used to house tranclent negro vorkef. by the Cartrell coninis sion, club, the clud house heretofore used by the Centris East Forthand Comanity Club, and those issociated mit; thea, was to be turned over to necroes.
2. As a result, the first vice-prosident of the Federation of Comunity clubs whs contagfed by nyself with. a fewuest for his lassistance in blocking the proposal. He talked to Mr . Gartrell over the tele कhone wisturday, the 26 th of Eeptember, Ur. dartryl, for reasons known to himself, failed to do so. nfter waitind until Vedrest day, dir official celled Mr ; Gartrell aqain, und was liformed as follom: "There kus further ive plan to houve firteen negro units on the playeround property, with the further intention of later trunsferring aise :ixty-seven more negro units frdel Union fvenue to the same general idcality. Dut the Gonimision ould be willing to grant thowe and place, to we selegted by ourfelves in the inaudiute futrye, to show why there was no nedespity cor their proposed adtion."
3. However, sfrece this information, due to uf. Gartilell's diliyins, had reached us after a uesp meeting of interested residents hat peen heid; and since they had Comalifiun is to carry their protust to the City Council; and since the curtreld it necessary the creature of the city council, subject to its directions; we felt 1. neqessary to continue our buction here.
4. The property under question was purclased by the City from a special fund voted by the people for the purpose of supplying neighorhood parks and playgrounds for the children of various localities within the city. To no preempt if for a totally different purpose, obnoxious to the reeidents of the section, and destructive of the original purpose to provide safe recreation grounds for children, is to be found guilty or a breach of trust.
5. The club house in question-1s peculiwrly the resplt of the labors of the Wifte residents of the coanunity for thenselves add their childen. It 14 particularly the monument of the labors of the late oricer alike Lillis, who for a period of twenty yearsigave unstintingly of his time and efforts, far beyond the call of duty, to provide a place of wholesome recreatipn for the children he loved, and who loved him. His attitude, during his lifetime, to ard the question with wich ne are now faced is too well and tob widely known to need any gomant here. To expel the chilidran from a club house pade possible by the labor und gifts of their fathers, to prohibit its use by those who made its existence possible, would be an example of the ranifest and most vicious kind of bureaucratic injustice.

To deliberately plant a colony of negroes in the aidst of an established White comanlty is to deny the very foundations of that freadoa and equality of which the negro and his quandar friends so aisguidedly prate.

The truth is the negro needs to learn to nate himself worthy of the white companionship he craves, Until he doas, segregation will be practiced by white people in some form in very seIf-defense:

Por the presence of negroes in a connunity means inescapable; property devaluation. Frery white person tho is compelled to live in a comunity invaded by negroes and wh has experienced their more than unpleasant behavior; every white person who has had to sell property after such an invasion; and every real estate agent who has had to deal in such property knovis the bitter reality of this fact.
of crine:
A1so, the presence of negroes in any number means in inevitable ingrease crines, particularly against the person.

According to the official, report of the Comissioners of Police of Et Lau1s, the eleven percent of the populytion who are negroes perpetrated forty-seven per-cent or the crine in that one city alone. of particular erines, the negra comiitted $62 \frac{1}{2} \%$ of the murders, or approxinately six times as many murders as an equal number of hites; the negro conitted $20 \%$ of the manslaughter, or approsinstely twice as many as the whites; the negro comitted $59 \%$ of the attempted wurder, or over five times as many is an equel number of whites; and the negro comitfed $59 \%$, of the un'speakable crime of rape.

We not only grant our physicians the right to quarantine per ons whose diseases are a danger to the coimunity at large, we demand that they do so; and our President, in dereat speech at Chicago some two years ago, spoke of the necessity of quarantinind agcressor nations. as long as the negro continues to we the menace to the persons and the property of white people that his record up until no. has phoved him to be, he ought not to wonder at the demand for segregation.

The proressional negro agitator, by the professional negro agitator I mean ooth bluch and white, Your Honor forgets that the right of aspociation includes the rfght not to associste. The right to pe free frow those associutions opnoxious to aen's sense of right and decency. Even the negfo hinself insists on exercising that right, as witness the stringent social strati into inich they, divide themselves. For the negro to 10 ist on the supposed right to force his presence on the persons and the howes of those who do not desire him is to betray erininal ignonance of the very foundutions on which human fights are built, and to show an utter digregard of the welfare of his neichbor. dere the negro half the mion be cilains he is he vould know thit the first instinct or the gentlenani is to be so self-surficient that he is under ho necessity to impose hitiself on those who do no". want hid.

We clain thio ridht to be protected in one of the nọst sacred of fuman possession, the right of our hoaes; to their peaceable and iecure habitation, free from the threat inposed by the actions of your Comission. If the negroes wish homes, which is their right as it is ours, let then secure theip howes as the estabished whites of our goanunity, und of this shble city, secured theirs; bot by uofing as plague of Leyptian locust, floating on alien winds. the Gartrell tijerefore respectrully readest this Council to pever ie the policy of. purposes exclusively; and the the Cential properties shallbe freserved for park retined for tile use of those white residents of the city who orisibated it for theriselves and their children; and that the momory of, wh hongrable and hidiy esteemed orfice. of the Portl 'ha Police force be kept as he fould haye had it kept, in connection ith those facilities he did so wuch to produce for the chiliren he loved, by kefeping those facilities for those children.

The tentats of these unit: have not yet feen deterinined, af it will be sche tial before they are eady for oceupancy.
When the case arises thit there are surticient negro fanilies In need of housing, you may be sure that the Housing Authority that give every consider tion to their problew. I might iention that the units being cosstryoted on Russell and caziercial do that proserty ancer ony other building on not arfect the and as a patter of ract are belon the hill and do this affect the grounds now being used as a playground. ffer listenipg to the very able presentation made by our fighting parson froin Albina, fev, Riddick, If feel it is unnecessary for me to go into this any further than to say that those good-ladies and gentlemen who are here in the interests of their homes and the values of their homes, along with the hundreds of names on these petitions and the thousands more that will be on the petitions being circulated are evidence that we mean what we say in this, "e are going on up, if ur, Gartrell and this comilttee do not feel they can hear us, we are goins above them to see if the Government destroy the values of our properties over there, if they won't reiaburse the people over there and buy the properties outright.

This appears to be, I won't say a great era of spending unnecessary ${ }^{*}$ money, so we are asking them to take care of the neighbors in Albina when they are takine care of so many.

Oup club members paidorent for a club house down there for a nubber of years. Te volunteered our services to paint it, to remove wails minside afd make it as iarge as the house would hold, so we might have a club room for bdys and we resent the idea of that being taken away fro. the boys in thet comuinity.

Albina was, a city of its own long before it entered the corporate limits. They have never had a park before and that pay have been the reason for a hittle, wildness on the part of our childfen. They had no place to play. We are ging to fight to preserve that park for oufochityren if we have to 80 to court wifh an injunction and deternine whether Xpurchased for this purpose dan be turned over to this use.

We are all out for the war. I am, and I know my neighbors are. There are plenty of places that can oe arranged for without taking this away fron our children. I fay our children, mine have been away for a long time, I mean the children of the neighborhood.

We do resent this èfcort to infiltrate our neighborhood with this group of transients who have, many of them, I won't sky all of thet, shown their viciousness in thincs they have done there and eisewhere, and ge say this ithout any feeling against the old-timers. "The great kajority of colozed people in that neighborizood IJjacent to the railrond bridge are just as fine peopie as an you could. find. They obey the 1aw. They are fine pedsle, in fact I sold yy house in that neithborhood. I didn't do anything anyone else wouldn't do. The neishbors all around there were negroes. I have no opposition, no prefudice egainst them in that area but ve do object to them spreading over the district and we do object to taking our park progerty away from our children.

In presenting the petitions I will say there are many more to follow If you care to have then.

Whyod RILEY: I thina your approach to this is quite proper in this.
You have recosnized the fact that the City Council are as impotent as your conmunity ciub in the astter of diracting the pnited States Housing Adthority in any ritter that they may engage in and ve vare just as linpotent is the coundinity club. You hage presented petitions to ac so the re may represent you as eornuunity and present them to whatever ggency ne can find that can be of ussistance to your progr m. There is only one thing I think probably should be explaifed. he woulen't have to have a housing comalssion here appointed under the proyisions, of the Federal Housing Act. Thit wasn't necessary in this, that if ne didin't have it the Federal Government would send thelr own comission in. You aky remefoer my statement abopt carpet baggers. That is the reason, we felt we had better fake advantage of the iittle privilege that the Federal Government had grated the communtty and $\varepsilon$ et dur looai peolle appelnted on the comission fathen than hive, as F said at that time, rathen than have carpet basgers come in here.

I think that is the right policy.
