- 12 miles long
- Multiple P&Rs two in Portland
- Final planned MAX line for region
- 43,000 riders in 2035
- Budgeted at \$2.6B \$2.8B

- Barbur or Naito S of I-405
- Barbur or adj to I-5 Burlingame to Capitol Highway
- Barbur or adj to I-5 from Capitol Hway west to City limits



Initial Route Proposal (IRP)

- New Requirement by FTA
- Initial suggestion for the light rail route
- Published in DEIS to solicit comment
- It is NOT the Locally Preferred Alternative (LPA)
