#### SUMMARY ·

This summary will cover the arrest of Ronald Woods, (a bank holdup suspect) by the FBI, and Poltland Police at Unthank Park, North Shaver and North Kerby, June 23, 1970.

#### NARRATIVE

On June 23, 1970, approximately 6:15PM six (6) FBI Agents, along with district car 71, Portland Police, stopped a 1957 dark blue Oldsmobile 2 door, bearing Oregon license 7J8 319. The driver, Ronald Woods, was a suspect in a bank hold-up and it was believed the vehicle was used by Woods to commit the bank hold-up.

Woods was subsequently arrested on a assault and beat warrant. The vehicle he was operating was to be towed.

The tow truck arrived and attempted to hook up with the above vehicle. At this point four or five black male subjects, identified as William Clifford Grandy, Michael Ferguson, Lynn Ferrygood, others unknown, sat on the front of the oldsmobile and refused to let the tow truck driver hook on to the car.

Officer Traversi asked them to move away from the vehicle. William Clifford Grandy refused to move. The other people did move away. Mr Grandy was asked three times to move from in front of the vehicle. Each time he refused using loud and profane language to express himself.

Officer Traversi informed Mr. Grandy that he was under arrest for interferring with a police officer.

The situation became chaotic from this point. The events can best be evaluated from indivual reports attached to this summary, and from indivual testimony.

It was necessary to call on East Precinct and Traffic Division for additional manpower to assist.

Testimony from witnesses listed, will identify by name, persons involved in this incident and their participation in the events surrounding the arrest of Ronald Woods and William Clifford Grandy.

#### RE: 1522 SE Harold

Address supposedly being used as a Nurses Aide meeting for the free health clinic personnel from Russell and Vancouver

#### SIR:

While on routine patrol at approx 10:00pm, 6-18-70, observed Negro subj driving a 1955 Chevrolet, green, Oregon HBH 817 in the vicinity of 17th and Tacoma. He was driving suspiciously and the Officers attempted to stop the subj and he turned around the corner as if to elude the Officers and parked the car by the curb and shut the lights off and jumped over to the passenger side. EXEX First asked the subj what he was doing and he stated that he was waiting for somebody and then stated that no, he was just driving the car and was trying to lose us. Subj then stated that he did not have a drivers lic and did not want to get caught. Also had no ID on theperson and we ran a 2926 on the plate and it came back registered to a Sandra M. BRITT, 5250 N. Vancouver. Subj stated that Sandra Britt was at 1522 SE Harold attending a meeting for the people that were involved in the free health clinic at Russell and Vancouver and that he had come there with her and she had let him use the car to run down to the gas station to have the oil checked and that was what he was doing at this location now. At this time we took the subj to the location of 1522 SE Harold and stated that Sandra Britt was in the house attending this meeting. Writer then went to the door where a young white female subj came to the door. I then asked for Miss Britt and she came out immediately. At this time I was able to glance in the door and saw several females sitting in the house. Asked Miss Britt if she had & given anyone permission to use her car and she did not want to answer my question, and anything I did ask her she was very uncooperative about. She wished to divulge no information whatsoever and I took her out to the car and asked her if she knew the subj I had sitting in the back seat and she stated that yes she did and did tell us that this was R. B. Poston, negro male, dob 5-4-54 and that he had come to the meeting with her and that she had let him use her car to drive down to the gas station to have her oil checked."

When we questioned this Poston subj he kept giving us different dates of birth and finally stated that his dob was 5-4-54 and he was 16 yrs of age.

At this time Miss Britt wanted to know where her car was and we asked if she could pick it up and we told her that she could if she had a valid drivers lic. She MXXXX stated that she did but it was back in the car and asked if we would drop her by so she could pick it up. At this time we transported Miss Britt and the Poston subj back to her car and while looking through her car she stated that she could not find her lic. Upon our inspection of the car could find nothing except a couple of receipts with the name K. FORD on them. We asked Miss Britt who this K. Ford was and she stated that it was Kent Ford and **kknk** we then asked her what her relationship with him was and she stated that she was his fiancee. We asked her questions about the clinic and when they were supposed to get married and she would not answer any of my questions and then took Miss Britt and the Poston subj back to 1522 SE Harold and told herthat she would have to get a licensed driver to drive her car away. While the writers were there we took down the lic numbers of the vehs parked around the house and presumably of the people who were inside attending the meeting. A record check was run on this Poston subj and he had August 69, curfew; 2-61, Larc of auto; November, 66, bike theft; 6-64 B & ID; Juvs gives his date of birth as 1-19-54 and also a record check was run on Sandra M. BRITT and she has no record with our files only compl cards.

BLACK PANTHER

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THIS DOCUMENT HAS BEEN PREPARED BY THE FBI AS A BRIEF STUDY OF THE BACKGROUND, TACTICS, AND OBJECTIVES OF THE BLACK PANTHER PARTY. THE ORGANIZATION'S OWN PUBLICATIONS WERE THE SOURCE FOR MOST OF THE MATERIAL REPRODUCED.



## I. FOUNDING

The Black Panther Party, with headquarters in Oakland, California, was founded in 1966 by two Oakland Negroes - Huey Percy Newton and Bobby George Seale - both at that time at Merritt College in Oakland. The name and symbol of the new party were taken from the Lowndes County Freedom Organization, an Alabama political party known informally in 1965 as the Black Panther Party.

From the writings of communists, revolutionaries, and black militants, Newton and Seale allegedly selected ideas around which they could build a revolutionary frame that suited the needs of their party. Influential writings included those of Mao Tse-tung, Chinese Communist leader; Frantz Fanon, West Indian psychiatrist who advocated violence for Algerian nationalists; Ernesto "Che" Guevara, one-time lieutenant of Cuba's Fidel Castro and a principal architect of 20th century guerrilla warfare; Malcolm X, American black nationalist who advocated violence to obtain Negro "freedom"; and W. E. B. DuBois, Negro educator who became a member of the Communist Party, USA, at the age of 93.

The organization was at first called the Black Panther Party for Self-Defense; however, the "Self-Defense" was removed in 1968 in an effort to project a more politically oriented image to prospective sympathizers and supporters.

As head of the new Black Panther Party, Newton assumed the title Minister of Defense, and Seale was named Chairman. When guestioned about the membership of their organization, Newton and Seale gave the since oft-repeated reply: "Those who know don't say. Those who say don't know." The militancy of the group, however, had an immediate appeal to the discontented, restless youth of Oakland's ghettos.

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## **II. BLACK PANTHER OBJECTIVES**

The Black Panther Party "Platform and Program" is repeated in each issue of the official Party publication, The Black Panther.

# October 1966 Black Panther Party Platform and Program

# What We Want What We Believe

1. We want freedom. We want power to determine the destiny of our Black Community.

We believe that black peop mine our destiny.

#### 2. We want full employment for our people.

We believe that the federal government is responsible and obligated to give every man employment or a guaranteed income. We believe that if the white American businessmen will not give full employment, then the means of production should be taken from the businessmen and placed in the community so that the people of the community can organize and employ all of its people and give a high standard of living.



We believe that black people will not be free until we are able to deter-

3. We want an end to the robbery by the CAPITALIST of our Black Community.

We believe that this racist government has robbed us and now we are demanding the overdue debt of forty acres and two mules. Forty acres and two mules was promised 100 years ago as restitution for slave labor and mass murder of black people. We will accept the payment in currency which will be distributed to our many communities. The Germans are now aiding the Jews in Israel for the genocide of the Jewish people. The Germans murdered six million Jews. The American racist has taken part in the slaughter of over fifty million black people; therefore, we feel that this is a modest demand that we make.

#### 4. We want decent housing, fit for shelter of human beings.

We believe that if the white landlords will not give decent housing to our black community, then the housing and the land should be made into cooperatives so that our community, with government aid, can build and make decent housing for its people.

5. We want education for our people that exposes the true nature of this decadent American society. We want education that teaches us our true history and our role in the present-day society.

We believe in an educational system that will give to our people a knowledge of self. If a man does not have knowledge of himself and his position in society and the world, then he has little chance to relate to anything else.

#### 6. We want all black men to be exempt from military service.

We believe that Black people should not be forced to fight in the military service to defend a racist government that does not protect us. We will not fight and kill other people of color in the world who, like black people, are being victimized by the white racist government of America. We will protect ourselves from the force and violence of the racist police and the racist military, by whatever means necessary.

7. We want an immediate end to POLICE BRUTALITY and MURDER of black people.

We believe we can end police brutality in our black community by organizing black self-defense groups that are dedicated to defending our black community from racist police oppression and brutality. The Second Amendment to the Constitution of the United States gives a right to bear arms. We therefore believe that all black people should arm themselves for self-defense.

8. We want freedom for all black men held in federal, state, county and city prisons and jails.

We believe that all black people should be released from the many jails and prisons because they have not received a fair and impartial trial. 9. We want all black people when brought to trial to be tried in court by a jury of their peer group or people from their black communities, as defined by the Constitution of the United States.

We believe that the courts should follow the United States Constitution so that black people will receive fair trials. The 14th Amendment of the U.S. Constitution gives a man a right to be tried by his peer group. A peer is a person from a similar economic, social, religious, geographical, environmental, historical and racial background. To do this the court will be forced to select a jury from the black community from which the black defendant came. We have been, and are being tried by all-white juries that have no understanding of the "average reasoning man" of the black community.

10. We want land, bread, housing, education, clothing, justice and peace. And as our major political objective, a United Nations-supervised plebiscite to be held throughout the black colony in which only black colonial subjects will be allowed to participate, for the purpose of determining the will of black people as to their national destiny.

When, in the course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume, among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the laws of nature and nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights; that among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. That, to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed; that, whenever any form of government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the right of the people to alter or to abolish it, and to institute a new government, laying its foundation on such principles, and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their safety and happiness. Prudence. indeed, will dictate that governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and, accordingly, all experience hath shown, that mankind are more disposed to suffer, while evils are sufferable, than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But, when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same object, evinces a design to reduce them under absolute despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such government, and to provide new guards for their future security.

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## **III. RISE OF BLACK PANTHER PARTY**

Proclaiming a legal right to bear arms, the Panthers by early 1967 had begun to appear in public wearing black leather jackets and black berets, openly carrying shotguns, rifles, or pistols, and shouldering bandoliers of ammunition.

Calling the police "pigs," the Panthers began a buildup in Negro areas of the idea that police departments, especially that in Oakland, were dedicated to the brutalization and harassment of minority groups, and, acting as an appendage of white government authority, were working toward the eventual annihilation (genocide) of the Negro race.

#### Invasion of California State Legislature

The first incident that brought national attention to this group occurred on May 2, 1967, as the California Legislature was in session in Sacramento. Approximately 40 members of the Black Panther Party, carrying loaded rifles, pistols, and shotguns, and some wearing bandoliers of ammunition about their waists or draped over their shoulders, burst into the Chamber. They were protesting a bill being introduced on that date outlawing the carrying of loaded weapons in public and were proclaiming their right to bear arms and criticize the police. Before they were arrested, they passed out mimeographed leaflets calling on all Negroes to end the "terrorist" oppression of colored races by white America and referring to the preparation of concentration camps in the United States as a beginning of genocide.

#### Police Officer Meets Panthers--and Death

The Panthers became more militant with the passing of time. At 5:00 a.m., October 28, 1967, two Oakland, California, patrol officers, John F. Frey and Herbert C. Heanes, made a routine traffic violation car stop. While the officers were awaiting the results of the car registration check by radio, the driver, Huey Newton, got out of the car. Suddenly, shooting broke out. Officer Frey was killed; Officer Heanes was wounded critically; and Newton received a stomach wound. He stopped a passing automobile and had the driver take him to a hospital where he was taken into custody and hospitalized. After a state trial, which began July 15, 1968, Newton was sentenced on September 27, 1968, to serve from 2 to 15 years on a charge of voluntary manslaughter.\*

#### "Free Huey" Campaign

Two days after Patrolman Frey's death, the Huey Newton Defense Fund was established at a meeting of a section of the Negro community of Oakland.

The cry of "Free Huey" became a clarion call. The imprisoned Newton was built up in the public eye as "black and bold in defense of his people." Each

\*It was ruled later that the presiding judge in this trial erred in instructions to the jury. Newton was released August 5, 1970, and scheduled for retrial.



Early in 1967, the Panthers were joined by a recent parolee from the California prison system,

LEROY ELDRIDGE CLEAVER author of a best-selling autobiography, Soul On Ice, staff writer for the magazine Ramparts, and admitted Marxist – Leroy Eldridge Cleaver.

In Soul On Ice, Cleaver wrote: "I sought out his (Marx's) books...It was like taking medicine for me to find that, indeed, American Capitalism deserved all the hatred and contempt that I felt for it in my heart ..... "

After Newton was jailed, although he remained the undisputed leader, it soon became apparent that Cleaver, designated Minister of Information, was projecting a major leadership image. The Party began to further widen its publicity, nationally and internationally, and enlarge its radical support and revolutionary intent. As an example of this spreading influence of the Panther Party, the 1968

National Election ticket of the Peace and Freedom Party, a coalition of radical groups, included Cleaver as candidate for the Presidential nomination; Newton as candidate for the 7th Congressional District of Alameda County, California; Kathleen Cleaver, 18th Assembly District, California State Legislature; Bobby Seale, 17th Assembly District, California State Legislature. Cleaver received a national total of almost 200,000 votes. Only a small percentage of the California electorate cast their votes for Newton, Seale, and Kathleen Cleaver.

On the evening of April 6, 1968, Cleaver and several Panthers became involved in a shoot-out with Oakland police officers. The incident resulted in the death of a Panther, the wounding of two police officers, and the wounding and arrest of Cleaver. Cleaver's parole was revoked immediately and he was returned to prison. After much publicity, he was later released on bail by a Superior Court Judge who ruled that the jeopardy of his parole status stemmed "from his undue eloquence in pursuing political goals...offensive to many of his contemporaries." This decision was overruled by the District Court of Appeals and upheld by the California Court of Appeals. Cleaver was ordered to return to prison by November 27, 1968. Electing to become a Federal fugitive, he disappeared in late November, 1968, going first to Havana, Cuba, and later to Algiers, where he has established residence.

#### International Committee to Defend Eldridge Cleaver

Soon after Cleaver's arrest in the spring of 1968, approximately 150 prominent individuals sponsored the establishment of an International Committee to Defend Eldridge Cleaver. The committee intended to dispatch a team to Europe to gain

bringing its own axe to grind, such organizations as the anarchist New Left group named Students for a Democratic Society; the Trotskyist Socialist Workers Party and its youth group, the Young Socialist Alliance; the Communist Chineseoriented Progressive Labor Party; the Communist Party, USA, and its youth affiliate, the W. E. B. DuBois Clubs of America; and militant campus groups, black and white, began to gather in support of the Panthers, who were willing not only to defy the establishment, but to destroy it.

#### Rise of the Black Panther Party

In May, 1968, the hard-core membership of the Black Panther Party was estimated at only 125, and Panther activity was confined largely to the San Francisco-Oakland, California, area. However, because of the dramatic shoot-outs, the "Free Huey" Campaign, the funds established for the defense of both Newton and Cleaver, the widespread publicity, and the support given readily by white radical groups and individual sympathizers, the Black Panther Party began to grow rapidly, not only in membership but in militancy and influence. Chapters began to appear in major cities throughout the country. By the end of 1968, the membership had reached nearly 2,000, with additional thousands of sympathizers and supporters.

## **IV. LEADERSHIP**

Organizationally, the Black Panther Party is set up to be under a Central Committee composed of the following positions:

- Chairman, held by Bobby George Seale
- Chief of Staff, held by David Hilliard
- Minister of Education, held by Raymond (Masai) Hewitt
- Minister of Culture, held by Emory Douglas
- Field Marshal, formerly held by Donald Lee Cox

The position of Assistant Chief of Staff, not included among the Central Committee, is occupied by Roosevelt (June) Hilliard. Under the Central Committee, the chain of command extends to leaders and officers of local chapters.

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## National Committee to Combat Fascism

Set up to coexist with Black Panther Party branches in various cities in the United States are chapters of another organization called National Committee to Combat Fascism. In actuality, there is little difference between the two. This group, a Panther Party front, was set up as the result of a revolutionary conference, called National Conference for a United Front Against Fascism, held in Oakland, California, in July, 1969. The conference, sponsored by the Black Panther Party and assisted by the anarchist Students for a Democratic Society and the Communist Party, USA, was called to form a coalition of black and white radicals, described as "oppressed people."

The National Committee to Combat Fascism is considered by Party leaders to be the "political organizing bureau" of the Black Panther Party. Its specific task allegedly is to raise the political level of the people and educate them against the system.

### International Section

On September 13, 1970, the International Section of the Black Panther Party officially opened in Algiers. Joining Cleaver on the staff were his wife, Kathleen, and Field Marshal Donald Lee Cox, a fugitive from justice. Cox faces charges of unlawful flight to avoid prosecution for conspiracy to commit murder, based on a warrant issued on April 20, 1970, at Baltimore, Maryland. He also failed to appear on May 14, 1970, in San Francisco, to answer Federal firearms charges.

This section, in its entirety, was expelled from the Black Panther Party by Huey Newton on February 27, 1971. The expulsion resulted from tensions and differences between Party hierarchy which led to disruptive factionalism.

#### V. FUNDS

The money by which the Black Panther Party operates comes from a number of sources. There are substantial private contributions; fees for public appearances, such as campus speeches, radio, and television appearances; payments for magazine articles; collections for trials and bail funds in this country and abroad; subscriptions and individual sales of the Party's official organ, The Black Panther; fund-raising activities sponsored by sympathizers and supporters; sales of recordings of interviews and speeches; and financial aid from radicals and extremists.

According to the press, there is reason to believe that the Panthers, to obtain additional funds, are engaging in criminal activities, such as burglaries and robberies.

## **VI. "SOCIALISTIC" PROGRAMS**

Panther Party leaders insist their primary aim is to serve the "people," meaning ghetto blacks. To establish good intent, Party officials have set up a series of community services aimed at recruiting members and sympathizers and building Party influence in ghetto areas. These programs, described by the Panthers as "socialistic" programs, are supposed to be carried out by all Party branches and include: "liberation schools" to give "our people a knowledge of self"; free health clinics, with money, medical supplies and professional services donated by laymen and professionals in the community; free clothing programs, with clothing donated by the community; Community Information Centers, to "answer the basic needs of the people"; and a monthly free shuttle bus service for families of blacks in prison. Few of these programs actually are carried out, and those that have been attempted have been mostly unsuccessful.

The program that has received the most publicity is the "breakfast program," devised as a further means of indoctrinating Negro youth in Panther teachings of racism and rebellion. As expressed in The Black Panther, June 14, 1969, "The youth we are feeding will surely feed the revolution." Breakfasts are held for ghetto children either at churches, housing projects, Panther Community Information Centers, or other space that can be obtained free of charge. Panthers usually ask local businessmen to donate food or money to this program, boycotting stores that refuse to participate. At these functions, children have been known to sing such chants as: "I am a revolutionary. I am a revolutionary. There's going to be some barbecue if Huey's not set free. Power to the people."

#### **VII. TACTICS**

The Black Panther Party is a violent revolutionary group whose members provoke confrontations with law enforcement officers and whose leaders incite racial hatred and preach urban guerrilla warfare.

#### Target: Police

Panthers claim that black communities are occupied by the police in the same way and for the same purpose that foreign troops occupy conquered territory and that these forces, operating under "establishment" orders, are engaged in gradual annihilation of the black race. Blacks, according to the Panthers, must, through urban guerrilla warfare, use guns to liberate themselves from the ever-present repressive enemy. Children in Panther "schools" do their exercises to the rhythm of: "There is a pig upon the hill — if you don't kill him the Panthers will."

Numerous claims have been made that the Black Panther Party is an innocent victim of police persecution and genocide. This charge is rendered absurd by fact. During 1970, 6 police officers were killed and 22 wounded through acts of violence traced to the Panthers. One officer, in 1969, was killed by a Panther with a shot-gun blast at point-blank range as the officer lay wounded and helpless on the ground.

Out of 20 members named by the Panther Party as "killed in cold blood" by the police, four were killed by members of a rival black extremist group on the west coast; one died of barbiturate intoxication; one was shot and killed by a store owner during a robbery attempt; one was killed by his wife over a love affair he was having with a female Black Panther; and another was allegedly tortured and killed by Panther Party members. Of the remaining twelve, two were found dead on the street, the victims of unknown assailants, and ten were involved in shoot-outs with police officers.

#### Attacks on Others

Panther attacks have not been limited to the police. While claiming their intent to protect the black community, Panthers have assaulted and threatened citizens who have tried to assist the police.

Neighborhood stores have been forced to "contribute" food supplies and money under fear of Panther violence. Many other persons have also been victimized, as shown by the fact that in 1969 alone 348 Panther members were arrested for serious crimes, including murder, armed robbery, rape, bank robbery, and burglary.

On April 21, 1969, 21 members of the Black Panther Party were charged in New York in a 30-count indictment with conspiring to bomb public places and murder policemen and with possessing dangerous weapons.



#### Weapons Caches

Stockpiles of machine guns, sawed-off shotguns, rifles, hand grenades, thousands of rounds of ammunition, Molotov cocktails, gunpowder, and accumulations of bayonets, swords, and machetes have been confiscated from Panther offices.

#### "Revolutionary Suicide"

On August 7, 1970, Superior Court Judge Harold Haley, the Deputy District Attorney, and three other persons were tied together with piano wire and dragged from a San Rafael, California, courtroom and taken as hostages by three armed Negro convicts, one of whom was standing trial for stabbing a San Quentin prison guard. The escapees were assisted by the defendant's 17-year-old brother who supplied them with weapons for the escapade. Judge Haley, who had a sawed-off shotgun taped to his neck, and the other hostages were forced into a waiting van. When the authorities tried to stop the kidnappers, the judge was brutally murdered; the Deputy District Attorney was injured seriously; and another hostage was slightly wounded. Three Negroes were slain and one was wounded.

Immediately thereafter, Huey Newton declared the killing of Judge Haley as being of "historical" importance to the Black Panther Party. This declaration was based on the Panther belief that all black prisoners, regardless of their crimes, are political prisoners and should be released.

FRANK, owner of FRANK CHEVROLET, who stated that he was informed by one of his employees ARTHUR WORLEY that a threat against the company was overheard.

MR. FRANK states that ARTHUR WORLEY Informed him while he was sitting at the SILK HAT Restaurant across the street from FRANK CHEVROLET, "I'm kk going to get the Panthers

and I'm going to burn FRANK CHEVROLET down". This statement was overheard to be repeated several times. MR. FRANK states that the WORLEY subject reported the incident to him whereupon MR. FRANK ordered WORLEY to return to the SILK HAT to try and obtain a name of the subject. Apparently WORLEY contacted one of the employees of the Silk Hat who gave the name. He It was also related that the JOHNSON subject appeared to be guite intoxicated.

MR. FRANK states this incident occurred approx 3:30 p.m. this date.

MR. FRANK states that \$962 in 1967 the BLAKE JOHNSON subject brought a vehicle to the body shop for repairs. And 9/25/67 an unpaid bill of \$27.65 was turned over to a collection agency. It is MR. FRANK's guess that the JOHNSON subject is still holding a grudge re this incident.

MR. FRANK states that his purpose in calling was that if anything should happen to the building that the JOHNSON subject should be considered a prime suspect.

INCIDENT AT UNTHANK PARK 6/23/70 at approx. 5 PM

Sir: While on routine patrol, heard via radio the request for a cover car in the viginity of N. Kerby and Shaver Sts. Working District 73, located at N. Alberta and Gantenbein Sts. my partner, Officer Wickwire and I responded to the call for cover. Coming to the area by the route of N. Kerby to Shaver St. and east on Shaver to the park. Parked my vehicle approx. 100 feet from the park itself and knowing Sgt. Davis and other officers who were at this time in the park and was attempting to arrest one subject, writers made an attempt to assist in the arrest by keeping the people in the crowd that was yelling and trying to interfere in the arrest from interfering.

Shortly after writers arrival, writers started receiving miscellaneous missiles being broken glass and cold pop bottles, being thrown inthe direction of the officers however, after the arrest was made, writers were given the orders to assemble at N. Missouri and N. Fremont St. to meet car 80, being Sgt. Davis. Writers proceeded to the stated point and remained there until the word came approx. a half an hour later to resume normal patrol.

SIR: At approx 2:05 A.M. dated 6/20/70 made a routine traffic stop at the location of NE Union Ave and NE Dekum in front of BILLY'S TAVERN. The car was occuppied by 3 colored subjects and had been stopped for the reason that the driver had run the red light at NE Union and Portland Blvd. As we were talking to the subjects, the owner of BILLY's TAVERN came out of it as he was closing and approached me and immediately wanted to know what had been going on. At this time I told him that this was just a routine traffic stop and that there was no problem. He told me that he was very nervous about the officers stopping any cars an in front of his place and that it was his understanding that no traffic stops would be made on Union Ave in front of his business. He seemed very nervous and upset about the whole incident and gave me the impression that possibly he had been under pressure from an outside group re fire bombings to his business. He stated that he was considering staying at that location throughout the night for fear that something might happen to his business and then later on stated that possibly it would be best if he even left town until things had cooled down. this time his wife stepped in and stated that he was being ridiculous Aand they left at that time for home.

Upon arriving at work at 7:30 p.m. this date talked to Sgt. Fortner **#M# \$#####** in regards to the statement the subject had is made where it was his understanding that no traffic stops were is to be made in front of his place of **base** business. Sgt. Upon talking to Officer Dailey and Kopach who are working special detail the past week, they stated that **ky** they had talked to the owner of the BILLY'S TAVERN and **x** at that time he stated he had not been contacted; however he had heard that a few taverns had been. **M#** They stated that he seemed quite relaxed and threatened that he would kick anyone out that even came to talk to him, that he was not worried. Possibly this person has been contacted since the 2 officers spoke to him and is now being put under pressure. This report was made at the request of Sqt. Fortner. No other information at this time.

Also on going back to the location after receiving information that a fire had been lit at that location, writers observed a veh used in previous arsons in the Albina area, this vah being a 56 Ford F 2P6209 parked at the curb just east of 11th on NE Skidnore. This is a black over red Ford with blue paint splotches. Also the veh is missing a bood. The veh was parked bet a garbage truck and another veh and no one was moving around the location.

Surveillance was kept on this veh for a perios of time, however no subja came to the veh and the writers left the area.

Nothing further at this time.

He stated that the fire at this time had consumed approx 3 sq feet and for this reason he took his garden hose out and extinguished the fire. He stated that he had called the Police as he was very concerned over the circumstnaces due to the fact that this is vacant lot also is occuppied by a vacant home which has been gutted by vandals previous to this. The aside listed HUHKX susps were provided by Officer Kanzler, Car 74, who stated that these subja had been seen loitering around another vacant house at x02 4009 ME Grand Avenue. He stated that the aside listed susp auto had been parked at NE 11th and Skidmore vacant at the time that this arson attempt was made. After checking the location where the fires had been on this lot I proceeded inside the vacant home here and found evidence of individuals having been insid: the basement area of the home in the past day or so. Then went back in service at 9:46pm.

# Sir:

Working spacial duty on 6-8-70, 10:19 pm, we monitored a call of a box alarm at 3328 N. Gantenbein. Upon arriving at the scene, we were the first car on the scene, observed flames rising from inside of a vacant house. Immediately called for fire department as we did have a working fire. Upon their arrival, the flames were immediately extinguished. Upon investigating inside, we found that there were two broken bottles that were obviously fire bombs in the northern portion of the house. On the southern portion laying by a window was a large half gallon bottle, containing what appeared to be toilet paper and obviously a burned out fire bomb. Upon the arrival of the fire investigator, the fire investigator did conduct the investigation, however, prior to his arrival, we had contacted Identification division, Officer Munson responding from that division. Upon talking to mwitnesses prior to the arrival of the fire investigator, a Mr. Edward Caldwell, Rte 1. Box 134, Troutdale, Cregon, was contacted. Mr Caldwall had been staying at 260 N. Ivy. He had been in the back portion of thesh house which is the south portion, taking a bath when he had heard a loud crash, heard a subject say "Let's get out of here." He at this time jumped out of the bath tub and upon observing in a westerly direction on Gantenbein street, observed a veh speeding westbound on Gantenbein. gThe witness stated that he believed this car to be a Ford. Stated that the year was somewhere around a 58, an older model of Ford.

Upon arrival of the Fire Investigator, this information was given to him. Further witnesses were contacted at the addresses of 3316 and 3320 N. Gantenbein. Information obtained from these witnesses included in investigator's report.

The suspect auto was obtained from these witnesses, also a description being make and model unknown, having a black top and an orange or reddish colored bottom. These two witnesses were females and are not familiar with make and models of cars, however, the gentleman listed above did seem very certain that the car was a Ford and an older model. This information was broadcast to the Dist. cars.

The dictating officers are aware of a car that does match this description. This vehicle stays at 3016 N. Kerby, the office of R.L. Anderson. This veh was observed at approximately 9:15 pm, date, by the dictating officers at the Chevron Station, NE Union and Cook street. At that time it appeared to be occupied by one person, the operator of the veh. This subj was viewed from a distance, however, appeared to be about 6-1, fairly thin build, approx 18 to 20 yrs of age.

The lic. number on this vehicle is Oregon 2P-6289. It is a black top convertible, however, the convertible top is extremely shiny, hard finished and could be mistaken for a hardtop. The bottom is a very oxidized red, having a very orange appearance. This veh is a 56 Ford. Dodd/diddid

Upon clearing the scene of the fire, we contacted #30, giving him this information and after contacting him, immediately went by the address of 3016 N. Kerby to ascertain if car was at that location. At approximately 10:40 pm, when we did drive by 3016 N. Kerby, the car was not present, however there were one to two persons inside of the resid who became quite excited in our passing, peering out through the windows and watching us as we went on up the street. We were in a private vehicle at the time.

We continued to look for this vehicle with negative results until at approx 12:30 am, 6-9-70, we observed the veh parked in front of 3016 N. Kerby and observed the figures of a number of persons inside of that address. One of the persons standing by the window was recognized as R. L. Anderson.

Due to the past record of this subject and the very close location of the office at 3016 N. Kerby to the scene at 3328 N. Gantenbein, we feel that this vehicle should be considered a very strong suspect vehicle. At this time we are unable to give the names of the operator or all of the persons staying in this resid, however, we do know that Irvin Tillus spends considerable amount of time at this resid, possibly further information could be gained from community relations officer or Intell. division for detail.

Prior to leaving shift, we notified the dist. car 61 of this vehicle. Requested that if they see the vehicle on the street, they attempt to identify the driver and/or passengers of the vehicle.

After standing around for approx. 1 min or 2 min., MR MC CUEN states that when all the customers had left, the above described NM asked MR MC CUEN if he was the Mgr of the Store. Mr. MC CUEN stated, "No, I'm not the Mgr., I'm the Esst. Mgr." The above described susp. asked if there was anyone in the store who was higher in rank than the compl. and he stated, "No." and the susp. asked Mr. MC CUEN if he could talk to him, in private. MR MC CUEN state d that "Yes, there is a place where we can talk in private," But due to the fact that M/ the safe was open in the cæhier's cage and there was a considerable amount of money in that area, MR MC CUEN refused to allow the above individual to come into that area. He chose to go to the alternate place which is located in the back of the store. MR MC CUEN and the above descr. individual subsequently went to the back room, where the following was explained to MR MC CUEN by the above described individual.

He stated that he was an undercover agent for the Better Bureau of Investigation, and he was working with the Black Panthers. The NM stated to the compl. that he wished him to cooperate in effort to buy the Better Bureau of Investigation to apprehend some of the PANTHERS who were apparently waiting him outside the store in an automobile. MR MC CUEN was states that the above described individual requested MR MC CUEN to give him \$2500 in cash, for the purchase of some guns

which were to be purchased by the BLACK PANTHERS and if the plan worked out were to be confiscated by the PPD and the money returned to the compl. The plan involved the susp. going out to t/t an area in Sauvies Island, where the above described  $\pm x$  NM alledges an shipment of arms was supposed to be due the



# BLACK PANTHERS.

Upon denial of the above described mans request of \$2500 in cash, money, he  $\sqrt{4}$  continued to talk and finally asked the compl. if he could slip out a back door. The compl. was then took the susp. to the basement where he was allowed to exit through the rear basement exit.

MR MC CUEN stated that he could definitely recognize the susp. if he came into the store again, and that he was a very neatly dressed individual and that he appeared to have been shaven and a razor line around the outline of the hair line area. He stated the susp. had no watch and that he appeared very calm and convincing in x his story. The compl. also states that the above individual has come into the store on previous occasions and it was requested by the writers that in the event that he returned to make an attempt to identify this subj. for future information.

He states that the Wonder Bread Bakery located at N. Fremont and Vancouver is supposed to be the next fire. He had not heard when it is to be other than it is supposed to be soon. He states if he learns any additional information he will call tomorrow night at the same timeapproximately 11PM. He was instructed to ask for the Larceny Detail.

He refused to identify himself. The sound of his voice and speech indicate he would be a Negro male.

I contacted an informant, in the northeast 15th and Going area in regard to THOMAS MILLS known negro militant. MILLS was living at 1483 NE Going in the upstairs apartments. To the knowledge of my informant he has recently moved from that address. They will attempt to secure his new address for me. They stated that while he was living there he was visited frequently by people who were driving a blue automobile with Minnesota plates. All they could give me as to type of car was that it was a two door sedan.

This informant also observed at 1465 NE Going two subjects, one white male and one negro male, carrying several shotguns into the house. This happened about a week ago. The white male's name is KELLEHER, Daniel Joseph. His dob is 8-29-33, he is described as 6 1½", 185 pounds, brown eyes, brown hair, medium build, light complexion. The informant says that Mr. KELLEHER is a notorius liar and has in the past passed himself off as a secret service man. The informant also states that it seems like he is not really quite all there in the head. The house at that address is listed as belonging to a BRUNNER HURST. There is no record in files on this subject. Mr. KELLEHER has one FIR card in files which states that hee was supposed to be in a group that threatened to rough up members of the band at the Riptide Club. He claimed his occupation at this time was private investigator. This happened April 17, 1967.

# NARRATIVE

SIR: This date Det. Caldwell of the Auto Theft Detail received information from an informant that several nbc subjects were unloading rifles and amunition from a white Cadillac into a house on Northeast Ainsworth near 7th. This informant stated one of the colored subjects dropped one of the guns; being an AK47. This particular gun is unfamiliar to the writing detective. This informant described this house as being on Ainsworth and if a person drove north on 7th would run directly into the house at Ainsworth and the house was green in color.

In checking this area it was determined that 7th street does not junction into Ainsworth coming from the south. However, 8th St. does and would run into a bluish-green well kept residence at 741 N.E. Ainsworth. In checking on 2 cars parked in front of this residence it was determined that this house in all probability is occupied by white residents. One of the cars observed in front of this desidence was a '63 Cad. registered to a CLARENCE T. WOLF and a ROBERT A. and JOAN M. DELKER. In checking thru Records it was determined that these subjects are white.

If a person came from the north on N.E. 7th and continued across Ainsworth there is a house on the southside of Ainsworth where a person would run into; this being 710 N.E. Ainsworth. The possibility of this being the house was discussed with Det. Caldwell and he thought that possibly the informant was mixed asto his directions.

While checking this area the writers observed a 1960 white Cadillac convertible come to that address and a colored subject, unknown to the writers go into the address. This car is registered to a ROY M. DANIELS, Rt. 1, Box 281, Aurora. This name was checked thru Records with negative results. This house at 710 is a plate green color.

There is a green composition shaked house on the northwest corner of 7th and Ainsworth, this being 649 NE Ainsworth. This house is in rather bad state of disrepair and is directly to the east of 637 NE Ainsworth, which/at one and thought to still be the residence of former police officer JERNIGAN. It is thought possibly it would be advisable to check with the utilities companies to determine the occupants at 710 and 649 NE Aonsworth. Also to check thru the State Police and determine who now has possession of the 1960 Cadillac Convertible registered to ROY M. DANIELS in Aurora. It should have been mentioned earlier in this report that this informant informed Det. Caldwell that this house had at one time been a house of prostitution. In checking thru the Vice Detail we find that there were several cards for 710 NE Ainsworth; the latest being June 17, 1969 when a PATRICIA ANN THOMAS nbc, DOB 10-8-50 was taken to Bess Kaiser Hosp. after jumping from the second floor window of this home while under the influence of narcotics.

There is also a card dated March 12th, 1969, listing the arrest of 2 juveniles near Jefferson Highschool in possession of marijuana; one of these being a ROBERT FORD 14 years with the address of 710 NE Ainsworth, DOB 5-20-57. It is not known by the writers if this ROBERT FORD is any relation to the militant KENT FORD. NOT.

# Details:

Information was received from Kenneth Theis, security guard with the Commission of Public Docks, who relayed the information that on June 11, 1969 at approximately 8 P.M. at Terminal #4, Berth #5, security guard Beardsley had observed five to seven Negro, males firing guns into the river just north of Terminal #4. He continued his rounds and then used a pick-up and drove to the vicinity and obtained a motor vehicle license number. The number, LDL 453, is registered to a '67 Chev, 2-door, Thomas J. Mills, Jr., 1483 N.E. Going St.

Subsequent information on this incident disclosed that there were in fact seven Negro males involved in this possible target practice and included Thomas Mills, Kent Ford, Thomas Johnson, Percy Hampton, Ralph Salazar and two unknown Negro males. The afore-mentioned have been associated with the Black Panther Party and other militant, extremist, black elements in the Portland area.

Security guard Beardsley contacted Multhomah County Sheriff's office to make a report, but there is no knowledge as to the report made.

It is requested that in the future, if this element is observed in the vicinity, to call Radio and dispatch a district officer immediately.

On several occasions we spent upwards to 30 to 45 min. parked in localles is o that we could observe the back entry way of GARY WORTH PLYMOUTH DEALER\_ SHIP and also the back lot area of Fred Meyers Inc. on Union Ave. & Killingsworth Ave. On both locations, we did not observe any extra heavy traffic of vehs nor a repeat of vehs into the area. # Details:

The following is a list of individuals who participated in a demonstration at the Multnomah County Courthouse on October 7, 1970 at which signs and handbills were passed out in reference to the upcoming trial of ALBERT WILLIAMSas identified in earlier reports. Persons involved in the demonstration of this date include PETER TUNO, ROBERT WOLHEIM, JEFFERY BAKELY, ALICE HEDGEPETH. ROGER SUTTON SMITH, a Negro woman identified as ALBERT WILLIAMS mother and approximately five other we were unable to identify.

On October 8, 1970 information was received that the White Panther Party members would demonstrate in the vicinity of the Multnomah County Courthouse and at a given time(approximately 11:30 A.M.) would burn a United States flag in the Park Blocks east of the County Courthouse.

Upon arrival at 11 A.M. observed no one demonstrating. at approximately 11:30 A.M. a small group started arriving to demonstrate. These included MICHAEL SLATER, ERIC DILLMAN, BABETTE JACOBSON, MICHAEL A. JEFFERY of the White Panther Party and JEFFERY BAKELY, PETER TUNO AND SHEILA LEA, who are associated with other leftist groups, demonstrating. There were approximately six others who were unidentified. They were selling the SUNDANCE White Panther newspaper and demonstrating around the block. This demonstration was conducted without incident and a there was no evidence of flag burning.

DENDE, FRED DENTON, CHUCK COLLINS, JR., EDDIE JOE, ROBERT LEE JOE, RAYMOND Sir: By Rad9o at 7:54pm. arriving 7:54pm, clearing at 8:40pm. to Washington High School gymnasium, reganding several unwanteds. On arriva at the W. end of the gymnasium, in the box office area, we observed several young nbc subjects includinghe abue five, participating in an argument with special officer Davidson, and vice principal, Jones. Apparently a group of young black males, none of whom are students at Washington High School, crashed the front door and entered without paying the admission fee. "ubjects were stopped, and requested to leave, and from there it was nothing but utter confusion.

Several of the subjects sated that they had paid their admission, but apparently no one could prove it as ticket stubs were not given.

We were coveried on this call by Car 59, Morrissey/Snyder, and car 51, FREM Ferreira/Moist, as well as 55 Sgt. Dimick. We did not know exactly what was going on through out the entire purktion course of events, except that special officer Davidson was doing his best to get the subjects, including the above 5,out of the building. However, each time he attempted to do so, they voiced their disapproval only, demanded their money back, which is doubtfulthat they paid in the first place. The school officials at Washington Hgih School were absolutely passive during this entire situation. They seemed fearful of offending anyone, even though they were severely taken advantage of by this small group. Jones had no control over the group, whatsoever, and Davidson was most successful, although he did not really know what to do with them either. The subjects never did leave until theball game was over.

It seems to he that an understanding should be reached between the Portland Bureau of Police, and school officials, regarding this type of incident. Obviously the subjects were doing nothing but taking advanage very skilfully of the Washington school officials, and Officer Davidson. Not only did they take physical and verbal advantage of the officials, but also took some of their money, and refunds that they probably did not deserve. I would suggest that more decisive action be taken in the future by the school officials. The police presents were hesitant about handling the situation as it should have been handled, on initiative, as the passive mood of the school officials would probably Wanke have resulted in non support of any police action at the time.

Alsthough there were no xnikik incidents of any serious consequences at the time the disturbance was in progress, there were assaults approx. one half hour after the ballgame let out.

Sir: While on routine patrol at 9 p.m. while proceeding south on 14th from Stark we were stopped by 28W who had in his vehicle the assault victim JAMES ANDERSON. ANDERSON was bleeding from the mouth and appeared to have been assaulted rather viciously. At this time it was also learned that car 59 Officers Morrissey and Snyder had an assault victim with them stemming from the same place at the same time involving the same suspects.

ANDERSON states that he was waiting for a ride home with a couple of girlfriends on the west side of 14th just south of Stark street next to Washington High School. A basketball game had **EXAMPRANE** concluded approximately 30 minutes prior. At this time a vehicle proceeded southbound on 14th from Stark containing several **Max** young nbc subjects. This vehicle stopped opposite ANDERSON and one of the subjects inside the vehicle began asking ANDERSON for money. ANDERSON kept stating that he did not have any but the nbc subjects insisted and became very obnoxious in language towards the victim and the girls present. Finally the several nbc subjects got out of the car and began striking the victim. ANDERSON states there were four or five that were actually involved in striking him with their fists and kicking him with their feet. After being knocked down several times the subjects kept insisting that the complainant give them his money. They then reached into his back pocket and removed his wallet, opened it and found that there was no money there and threw it into the bushes. The victim did have a quarter in his hand which he gave to the subjects at this time.

At this point another male subject (the one car 59 had) began to **XNKHRXXXXXKEXX** interject into the fight and was subsequently assaulted by the same subjects.

2karkkyxafkexxEkxa It was shortly after the subjects left that we arrived to investigate the situation.

At 7:54 p.m. date we had received a call to Washington High School regarding several unwanteds. At that time there was a basketball game in progress. The above named suspects were some of the unwanteds involved. None of them are from Washington High School and all were causing trouble and apparently had no interest in the basketball game. They were all wearing black power symbols and had crashed the gate without paying admission fee. The incident is covered under a separate miscellaneous report. The very brief description given by RM ANDERSON fit several of the subjects who were involved in the earlier disturbance. The names that we obtained initially are the ones listed above. It is not known for sure whether or not any of these subjects were involved in the assault on the victim but there is a good possibility that they were.

Since the victim stated that he would be able to positively identify the subjects arrangements were made with Homicide and Robbery Detective Johnson to have the victim view mugs at approx. 10 p.m. date. The victim will be transported to detective division by his father for that purpose.

One of the men assisting in the lunch program then went outside and questioned the aside subject Richmond, He did not deny having the revolver (38 cal), but he stated he did not have it on him at this time. He had apparently passed the gun to one of his associates. A short time after Richmond was confronted by the incident involving the gun, he came back by the school and at this time had what appeared to be a 38 cal revolver in his belt on the left side. Richmond showed the revolver to the helper at the school and told him he had purchased it at G.I.Joes. Richmond was at this time or at the time the gun was witnessed, in a blue 60 chev, lic. unk. Subjects then left the scene.

9. We want all black people when brought to trial t tried in court by a jury of their peer group or people from their black communities, as defined by the Constitution of the United States.

We believe that the courts should follo. United States Constitution so that black people will receive fair trials the 14th Amendment of the U.S. Constitution gives a man a right to be third by his peer group. A peer is a person from a similar economic, social, religious, geographical, environmental, historical and racial background. To do this the court will be forced to select a jury from the black community from which the black defendant came. We have been, and are being tried by all-white juries that have no understanding of the "average reasoning man" of the black community.





# BLACK PANTHER PARTY

The Dlack Panther Party within the California prisons is practically non-existent at this time. Since the release from prison of Huey Newton, the organization has gradually fallen apart. This was partially caused because of the new way of life Newton pursued, and the high cost involved drawn from party funds.

They also came out with a new non-violent policy, choosing to work within the system instead. They felt that through their involvement in politics they could have a type of government they wanted. They ran several members for public office in Oakland, California, but were defeated at the polls.

-Because of the non-violent policy they lost most of their prison following, who being more violent by nature, have since joined forces with the Black Guerrilla Family.

The Black Panther Party is still headquartered at 8501 East 14th Street, Oakland, California. Elaine Brown is trying to pull the party back together but is not having too much success. All indication at present are that the Black Panther Party is practically non-existent at this time in the California Prison System.

I. I. Iaw officer making application is Robert A Schwartz, Sgt, Detective Division, Portland Police Bureau. Authorizing the application are Capt John E Nolan, Chief of Detectives, and Donald I Mc Namara, Chief of Police.

B. REASONABLE GROUND TO BELIEVE A CRIME DIRECTLY OR IMMEDIATELY EFFECTING THE SAFTY OF HUMAN LIFE

HAS BEEN COMMITTED OR IS ABOUT TO BE COMMITTED. During the past several months, evidence has been collected that points out that certain hiearchial members of the local black panther parties have been involved in a program of collection of funds from local businessmen for a breakfast program in the black communittee. Police reports indicate that KENT FORD, FREDDIE WHITLOW, SANDRA BRITT, LINDA THORNTON, JEFFERY FIKES and PERCY HAMPTON, as well as other unknown negro males, have by intimidation been obtaining money from the Albina business, for the black panther breakfast program. The business people in the area that have given to the program, largely do son because of fear of retaliation from this group, either in the form of vandalism, fire bombings, or bombings by explosive devices, \_\_\_\_\_ of violence in this area two explosions have caused property damage and danger to life within the recent months, in this area. On 8/22/70, Mc Donald's Drive-in Restaurant, located at NEUnion and Fremont, suffered a loss, due to explosion, probably by dynamite, at the hands of unknown persons. Reliable informants indicate that thex afore mentioned people had direct knowledge of this explosion and they have also been directly involved in the conspiracy to commit the explosive act. Sometime later, on \_\_\_\_\_, Lampus Co, located at NE Union, also suffered damage in the middle of the

night, due to explosive devices. This considerable damage, although restricted to property, could well have injuried anybody passing by.

- III. Within the same time frame, several arson fires have occurred in this section of town, one of which was Grandma Cookie Co, on \_\_\_\_\_\_. In this arson fire, where one arrest was made, there was a severe loss of property and danger to the firefighters and residence living in the area. The top shop solicited by the black panther organization, their breadfast program, were refused and, approx two months later, suffered loss by fire under mysterious circumstances. Most recently, an elderly woman died in an arson fire in the NE section of town (date \_\_\_\_\_, case #\_\_\_\_\_). A reliable informant has named the perpetrators of this fire; these are to be known associates of the black panthers.
- IV. Police report 70-50404 indicates that MR RUNIAN, who operates an 88¢ store, located at 3716 NE Union Ave, reported that he had been solicited by KENT FORD, a leader of a local black panther chapter, and asked to contribute to the breakfast program. When refused, seven or eight pickets began picketing in front of his business, among the pickets, MR PERCY HAMPTON, K JR was identified as carrying a sign and blocking traffic, both incoming and outgoing, from the business establishment. At one point, MR HAMPTON publicly advocated burning the business down. These utterences by HAMPTON are almost identical to those chanted by the pickets at Mc Donald's Drive-in, prior to the Mc Donald's bombing.
  - V. Over the period of the past several months, specifically and generally past 14 months, the city of Portland, inthe Albina area, has suffered several million dollars loss, due to fires of arson origin. In the spring and summer of 1969, blackp panther associates

were convicted of at least 10 fires with the loss of approx 2½ million dollars and the attendant threat to life. During that time, several juvenile suspects were taken's into custody, many of whom are now associated with the black panther organization. In the last few months, there has been a series of residential and dwelling house fires, also of arson origin, and at least one occasions, an automile frequently seen at the black panther headquarters was a suspect car in one of these first degree arson cases.

VI. Recent months, many anonymous phone threats have been made to businesses in the Albina area and these threats generally involved the intended commission of arson by fire bombing or the use of explosives to destroy businesses. / Many of these case, the businesses threatened are those that have been solicited by the black panther breakfast program committee (those persons originally named in this section) and have refused to participate in the program. Threats have been made to the following companies: MC DONALDS Restaurant, NE Union and Fremont; FRITOLAY INC, 2045 NE Union Ave, EARL MARK'S MOTOR CO, 2021 NE Union Ave and TRADEWELL STORES, 3535 NE 15th Ave. On very recent occasion, the special police officer at Fred Meyer VII. Store NE Union and Killingsworth had occasion to cause the head of the black panthers, MR KENT FORD, to be arrested and, shortly thereafter, police reports reflect that reliable information was received through anonymous informant that this special officer's property and life were in danger from the black panthers by use of explosives. The informant reported conversations which involved direct threats against the man's life and property. This information, from the same informant, also, personally had knowledge of dynamite available for the avowed purposes. A second reliable informant from a

different source stated that the black panther organization hiearchy great were in possession of dynamite, which had been obtained from the sixy state of Washington. He described this as a large quanity. A third reliable source verified this information. The second indicated informant further stated that the Leu Williams Cadillac Agency was to be dynamited with the consent of black panther organization and by one of their members over an alleged grievance that had occurred earlier. Of police reports, informants, occurrences of violence, we believe there are reason able grounds that a crime directly or immediately affecting the safty of human life has been or is about to be committed.

(II) REASONABLE GROUNDS TO BELIEVE THAT EVIDENCE WILL BE OBTAINED. When soliciting by the Black Panthers, they often demand the businessman to call 282-5115 with his decision as to how much money is to be contributed. This number is listed to SANDRA BRITT, a known weak member of the Black Panther Party and the wife of Black Panther leader KENT FORD. This address is also known to be the regional office for the Portland Chapter of the Black Panther Party and a base of operations for their program. Many threats of injury to life and property have been made by telephone to businessmen not participating in the breakfast program. The threats have been very brief and normal channels open for tracing and recording are impossible to initiate.

(III) NO OTHER MEANS READILY AVAILABLE FOR OBTAINING SUCH INFORMATION.

Intensive investigating techniques have been unsuccessful in securing sufficient evidence to support an indictment. A number of businessmen are reluctant to discuss the problem with the police out of fear of retaliation by the Black Panther Party. Although some information has been obtained through confidential informants, these informants will not testify, due to fear of retaliation.

#### FINDINGS OF FACT

8 Plaintiff is an Oregon corporation engaged as an independent 9 local franchise dealer, commonly known as "McDonald's Hamburgers," 10 in the business of preparing and retailing food for take-out and 11 on-premises consumption at its restaurant located at 3510 N. E. Union 12 Avenue, Portland, Multnomah County, Oregon. Plaintiff's franchise 13 was issued by McDonald's Corporation, an Illinois corporation, which 14 has franchise outlets in other parts of the United States. McDonald's 15 Corporation has no control over plaintiff's operation except to 16 17 establish minimum quality standards of the food purchased by plaintiff 18 to be processed and sold at its retail outlets. In all other 19 respects plaintiff operates completely independently of McDonald's 20 Corporation.

II

23 On August 1, 1970 defendants Kent Ford and Linda Thornton, acting 24 in cooperation and concert with the other named defendants, established 25 a picket line at plaintiff's restaurant located at the premises above 26 described. The picket line was established without prior notice by 27 the defendants to plaintiff of any grievances that defendants had or 28 might claim to have against plaintiff.

#### III

On the 1st day of August and after the picket line had been
 established and active picketing was being conducted by defendants,

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1 Kent Ford and Linda Thornton met with "McDonald's" general manager, 2 Irving C. Laviske, to inform him the purpose of the picketing. 3 Defendants Kent Ford and Linda Thornton demanded that the plaintiff 4 contribute \$100 a month to three alleged charities in the Albina 5 area -- the Childrens' Breakfast Food Program, Fred Hampton's Peoples 6 Clinic, and the Malcolm X Dental Clinic, for a total of \$300 amenth 7 8 and defendants informed plaintiff that if it did not make the demanded 9 contributions defendants would continue picketing and boycotting 10. for the purpose of compelling plaintiff to contribute as requested, 11 or in the alternative to drive McDonald's out of business. During 12 the course of the conversation plaintiff offered to contribute 13 foodstuffs and beverages to the Childrens' Breakfast Program, as 14 had been done by plaintiff to other organizations in the community 15 from time to time in the past. The defendants thereupon stated an 16 17 alternative demand of one cent of each dollar of gross sales per 18 month at plaintiff's location described above. Upon Laviske's state-19 ment that he would have to consult other officers and stockholders of 20 plaintiff before making any commitment for financial contributions 21 in any form, picketing was discontinued.on orders of defendants Ford 22 and Thornton. The defendants thereupon set a time, 11:00 a.m., 23 August 4, 1970, by which plaintiff must agree to defendants' demand 24 25 for monthly financial contributions or picketing would be resumed. 26 On August 4, 1970, Laviske requested further time to consult with 27 other stockholders and officers of plaintiff concerning defendant's 28 demands. A further meeting was scheduled for Thursday, August 6, 1970 29 with defendant Ford, but he proved unavailable on that date. On 30 Tuesday, August 11, 1970, at approximately 10:30 a.m. Laviske 31 32 informed Ford that the plaintiff would not make a contribution of Page 3 - Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law

money as demanded. Thereupon picketing was resumed by defendants at approximately 11:30 a.m., August 11, 1970, and continued until 3. the restaurant was forced to close for repairs on the 22nd day of August, 1970 because of damage resulting to its building from an explosive device placed in close proximity to said building by persons presently unknown. At this time there is no evidence directly linking the defendants to this explosion.

IV

During the course of picketing on the 1st day of August and 11 between the 11th day of August and the 14th day of August, 1970 12 when this court issued a temporary restraining order, the defendants 13 'carried placards and signs reading: "Picket McDonald's," "McDonald's 14 Exploits Black People," "McDonald's is Used as a Base Area for Pig 15 Attacks on the Black Community - Boycott!" and up to and including .16 17 August 11, 1970 from time to time chanted "Burn it down. Burn it 18 down. Burn McDonald's to the Ground." The picketing during these 19 days occurred both on plaintiff's premises and on the public side-20 walks adjacent thereto. On one occasión, one of the children 21 picketing used obscene language toward a patron of plaintiff who 22 went through the picket line. On a number of occasions, one or 23 24. more of the picketers grabbed onto the sides of automobiles as they 25 drove into plaintiff's lot. Several times a ten-year old girl 26 associated with the picketers tossed mud at cars as they drove on 27 to plaintiff's lot, and once tossed a bottle after a car leaving 28 plaintiff's lot. On another occasion, this ten-year old girl and 29 an eighteen-year old shoved a patron of plaintiff in the back. On 30 two occasions, defendant Ford had words with plaintiff's employees, 31 32 and on one of these occasions said to Billy Ray Davis, a black

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employee of McDonald's as Davis was taking down the American flag 1 2 at sundown "Get your hands off the white man's flag, nigger . . . 3 If I catch you touching the white man's flag again, I'm going to 4 kick the shit out of you". In other instances defendants used 5 vile, obscene, revolting and insulting epithets against McDonald's 6 customers. During the course of the picketing one of the pickets 7 said to an assistant manager of plaintiff, "You know if you would 8 9 just contribute \$350 to the fund then this would all come to an end. 10 However, if you don't, it may get worse." This picketer did not 11 identify himself by name, but had been active in the picketing 12 procedures.

No fights occurred during the course of the picketing, no arrests were attempted, and when Mr. Laviske requested aid of the police he was advised that the picketers had a right to use the sidewalks in a peaceful manner, and that if any trespasses occurred to his property he could swear out a Complaint against the offenders. Mr. Laviske chose to seek legal advice and to proceed with this suit for injunction.

The only demand ever made upon plaintiffs by defendants Ford 23 and Thornton before the commencement of the picketing was for the 24 . 25 contribution of money to the three specified alleged charities. 26 Neither the defendants purporting to act on behalf of the Black 27 Panthers, or any other associations, committee, group or organization 28 representing or purporting to represent the black citizens of 29 Albina community ever gave notice to plaintiff prior to the actual 30 commencement of picketing of any grievance asserted by them, or by 31 the community as a whole against the plaintiff. 9 McDonald's is under no legal or other obligation to contribute 10 money to any enterprise in the Albina area or elsewhere for which 11 the defendants have demanded a contribution, nor is it under any 12 legal or other obligation to withhold the use of its premises at 13 any time from policemen or any other duly authorized officers of 14 the City, County or State who may wish to make use of its parking 15 areas during periods of rioting, violence or other emergencies 16 17 and in fact has no control over such use by the enforcement 18 authorities in a time of emergency. For practical reasons, plaintiff 19 has requested that the police not use the premises as a gathering 20 point in the event of any future emergencies. 21

Plaintiff has no control over the issuances of franchises by the out-of-state McDonald Corporation. No evidence exists in the record of these proceedings that McDonald Corporation has practiced racial discrimination on a national basis in the issuance of its franchises.

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29 From the foregoing Findings of Fact, and based upon the opinion 30 of the court attached, the court draws the following

#### CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

Page 7 - Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law 1 cannot be carried out.

Because of the physical coerciveness of picketing a court has the right to limit the number of picketers in a public area including sidewalks adjoining or surrounding a private business subject to the picketing. The defendants and anyone acting under their direction or control are enjoined from engaging themselves or directing any other person to engage in

Any picketing based upon a failure of the plaintiff to 1.) 9 10 make contributions to any charity, whether existing in the 11 black community or not, sponsored by the Black Panthers 12 or not, for the reason that donation to charities and 13 other similar activities is a personal right or privilege 14 of any individual or company in our society and is not 15 the subject of an important public interest or right. 16 There exists no public or private right to compel 17 18 contributions from anyone to any charity or community 19 activity.

2). The defendants are also enjoined from

(a) intimidating, obstructing, molesting, harassing,

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which said defendants Kent Ford and Linda Thornton are enjoined from carrying on themselves.

3) The defendants may:

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engage in any lawful expression in the exercise (a) of free speech so long as it is done in a peaceful and orderly fashion. If the expression of free speech is to be undertaken in the form of picketing, they may picket in numbers not to exceed 5 at any one time. This . court has reduced the number of allowable picketers from 10 to 5 because of the limited sidewalk area adjoining the McDonald's property. The defendants can exercise their right to free speech as effectively with 5 people as they can with 10. The greater numbers tend to produce physical coercion. The picketing may be done only on the public sidewalk and may not interfere with the ingress or egress of the customers or employees of McDonald's. Meetings organizing the picketing may not be held in the ' area surrounding the McDonald's premises. No picketing or distribution of leaflets may be carried out on the McDonald's premises. No shouting at customers will be allowed as this is not only coercise but disruptive of the customers' or employees' right of privacy and may create a public disturbance.

4) Any violation of this court's injunction by the defendants
shall subject the violator to the contempt powers of this
court. Upon a finding of violation, the punishment for
contempt is 6 months in the County Jail per violation,
and confinement can be ordered to run consecutively for

14 Defendants Kent Ford and Linda Thornton originally induced 15 picketing of McDonald's in an effort to coerce monetary contributions .16 from McDonald's. The contributions were to go to selected black 17 community projects sponsored by the Black Panther Party. Picketing 18 to coerce contributions to any form of charity is not in the public 19 interest and is unlawful. International Brotherhood of Teamsters, 20 Local 695, A.F.L., et al v. Vogt, Inc., 354 US 284, 77 S Ct 1166, 21 22 1 L Ed 2d 1347.

23 If the picketing were limited to this one claim -- that McDonald's 24 refuses to contribute to Black Panther charities -- all such picketing 25 could be enjoined. But the defendants wish to engage in picketing 26 for additional reasons not originally expressed to McDonald's. This 27 raises a question -- are the defendants to be restricted forever from 28 picketing McDonald's on any basis, in other words, a blanket injunction 29 30 as sought by the plaintiff ? Is this court to say to the defendants, 31 your original motive was wrong (as it was); therefore, you will not 32 picket for a purgatory period of two years, one year, six months, Page

1 - Opinion

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90 days, 30 days on any basis? Are the defendants to be allowed to make any allegations against McDonald's even though there is no truth in fact to the allegations? This proceeding raises these most difficult questions and must provide the answer by carefully fitting together the pieces after a collision of co-existing rights -- the right of McDonald's to be left alone, and the right of the defendants to exercise free speech.

9 It is clear that picketing involves more than free speech. As 10 was stated in <u>Amal Food Emp U Local 590 v. Logan Valley Plaza</u>, 11 391 US 308, 88 S Ct 1601, picketing involves elements of both 12 speech and conduct (patrolling), and because of its devastating 13 economic results picketing can and should be "...subjected to 14 controls that would not be permissible in a case of free speech." 15 (391 US at 313).

17 In Machesky v. Bizzell, 414 F2d 283 (CCA 5 1966), the United 18 States Court of Appeals, Fifth Circuit, through the words of <sup>19</sup> Circuit Judge Bell stated at page 289:

"Numerous Supreme Court opinions attest to the fact that First Amendment rights are not private rights of the appellants so much as they are the rights of the general public."

and went on to quote from the Amal Food Emp U Local 590 v. Logan

24 <u>Valley Plaza</u>, supra,

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"We start from the premise that peaceful picketing carried 26 on in a location open generally to the public is, absent other factors involving the purpose or manner of the picketing, 27 protected by the First Amendment ... (Page 290) The right to picket is not absolute. It must be 'asserted within the limits 28 of not unreasonably interfering with the rights of others to use the sidewalks and streets, to have access to store 29 entrances, and where conducted in such manner as not to 30 deprive the public of police and fire protection' Kelly V. Page, 5 Cir., 1964, 335 F2d 114, 119. These interests can, 31 of course, be protected by state injunctions narrowly drawn (emphasis added). The injunction here, however, has not 32 struck such a balance. It prohibits all picketing in the Page 2 - Opinion

1 designated business areas of Greenwood, for whatever purpose and in whatever manner carried out. This overshoots the 2 \* \* \* mark . 3 The court, in further criticism of blanket injunctions, stated 4 (Page 291): 5 "The injunction here in question goes even further than 6 .prohibiting protected picketing. It enjoins 'loitering or congregating \* \* \* to induce, persuade, or coerce any 7 person or persons not to trade or to do other business with \* \* \* complainants \* \* \*'. This, for aught else appearing, 8 prohibits the distribution of leaflets and even speech directed 9 toward the boycott effort." 10 The court in Machesky struck down the state injunction as 11 unconstitutionally overbroad in that it lumped the protected with 12 the unprotected rights. 13 The composite answer from these decisions is that state 14 injunctions involving First Amendment rights may not be blanket, 15 but must be carefully and narrowly drawn. 16 Turning to the proposed subject matter for future picketing 17 18 of McDonald's as expressed by the alleged head of the Black Panther 19 Party in this area: 20 "1) McDonald's has a national policy of practicing racism in 21 awarding franchises to minority people;" 22 This court has received no evidence to prove or disprove this 23 allegation. This allegation is an expression of opinion and, of 24 course, as such, subjects the person making such a claim to the 25 laws of defamation in the event the allegation is false. Such an 26 expression will not be enjoined. 27 "2) To demand the number of black employees of McDonald's 28 to be in proportion to the number of black people that 29 trade there;" 30 McDonald's is located in the City of Portland, County of 31 Multhomah, State of Oregon at the intersection of N. E. Union and 32 Fremont. The court takes judicial notice that this restaurant Page 3 - Opinion

1 adjoins the so-called black community area and that the percentage
2 of black citizens in the 8 tracts surrounding the McDonald's
3 restaurant ranges from 8.4% to 66.6%. The testimony during the
4 proceedings revealed that at the time of the picketing in August,
5 1970, McDonald's employed 8 black people and 12 white people, and
6 there was credible testimony that at other times the black employees
8 had exceeded the white employees in number.

In the case of Hughes, et al v. Superior Court of California 9 10 for Contra Costa County, 339 US 460 (1950), Justice Frankfurter 11 approved a preliminary injunction restraining citizens from picketing 12 a store to compel "the selective bring of negro clerks, such hiring 13 to be based on the proportion of white and negro customers who 14 patronized plaintiffs' stores". Interestingly, attorneys supporting .15 the petitioners' position included Arthur J. Goldberg and Thurgood .16 Marshall. The court reasoned that if the picketers were upheld in 17 18 their demand for proportionate hiring then other races, white, yellow, 19 brown and red, would have equal rights to demand discriminatory 20 hiring on a racial basis. Justice Frankfurter went on to say (Page 464) :

"To deny to California the right to ban picketing in the circumstances of this case would mean that there could be no prohibition of the pressure of picketing to secure proportional employment on ancestral grounds of Hungarians in Cleveland, of Poles in Buffalo, of Germans in Milwaukee, of Portuguese in New Bedford, of Mexicans in San Antonio, of the numerous minority groups in New York, and so on through the whole gamut of racial and religious concentrations in various cities.... The differences in cultural traditions instead of adding flavor and variety to our common citizenry might well be hardened into hostilities by leave of law."

In this important case, Justice Frankfurter quoted from
 <u>Palko v. Connecticut</u>, 302 US 319, 327:

31 "Industrial picketing is more than free speech, since it 32 involves patrol of a particular locality and since the very

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presence of a picket line may induce action of one kind 1 or another, quite irrespective of the nature of the ideas 2 which are being disseminated." 3 Certainly the subsequent explosion at the McDonald's premises 4 and the assaulting of a customer by those not named as defendants 5 is proof of this point. 6 Picketing to demand proportional hiring on the basis of race 7 is unlawful and under the authority of Vogt, supra, may be and is 8 9 in this case enjoined. 10 "3) That McDonald's systematically excludes black employees from supervisory managerial positions;" 11 This is an allegation that may be expressed by the defendants. 12 13 "4) That McDonald's refuses to aid the community in self-help programs;" 14 On its surface, contribution to a Children's Breakfast Program 15 savors up foremost the flavor of Christmas giving and the feeling 16 that if a business is making a substantial profit in a neighborhood 17 18 it should contribute to such well-meaning enterprises. 19 . First, no law compels anyone to give to any particular charity 20 or community enterprise. Further, there may be good reason for 21 not contributing to a Black Panther sponsored breakfast for youngsters. 22 Recently Columnist Jack Anderson had this to say about the Children's 23 Breakfast Program: 24 25 "... the Panthers attend white fund-raising parties and titillate the drawing-room gatherings with the Panther strut 26 and ghetto slang. They bait the white liberals mildly by calling them 'honkies' to their faces. But behind their 27 backs, the Panthers preach raw racism. 28 "They happily accept liberal money to feed hungry ghetto 29 children and, indeed, they serve free breakfast to an estimated 10,000 youngsters each month. But the free food 30 is merely an enticement to attract the children to revolutionary kindergartens where they are taught to hate 31 whites, to commit crimes and to fight the police. 32 Page 5 - Opinion

1 "The Panthers publish a children's coloring book, for example, which features drawings of policemen being killed. 2 The pictures were drawn by Jack Arthur Strivers, one of six blacks arrested in connection with the sniper shooting of a 3 Sacramento, Calif., patrolman, Bernard Bennett, on May 9." 4 Perhaps Mr. Laviske had good reason not to wish to contribute 5 to a Panther operation subject to the all too well remembered 6 analogy of the Hitler Youth Movement. He may be justified in 7 feeling that while the children are having their stomachs filled 8 9 with food they are having their minds filled with hate. The 10 defendants are enjoined from picketing on the basis that McDonald's 11 refuses to contribute to community programs.

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That McDonald's is one of the businesses responsible for police harrassment and brutality in the community;"

14 This is an absurd allegation. How can McDonald's be 15 culpable of police harrassment or brutality. This allegation stems 16 from the isolated instance when McDonald's parking lot was used 17 by the police as a gathering point during riots over a year ago. 18 Many expressions of free speech are absurd and are not enjoined. 19 This expression will not be enjoined. 20

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"6) Since McDonald's is deriving a profit from its business in the community, that its profits should be cut unless it agrees to better the community".

23 Again this is a general expression of free speech and if this 24 is the feeling of the defendants, they legally can express it. 25 Going beyond the proposed subjects for future picketing is 26 the anticipated expression "boycott McDonald's". It is impossible 27 to segregate the lawful and unlawful reasons for anyone to boycott 28 29 If people want to say "Boycott grapes" or "Boycott McDonald's. 30 McDonald's" and that boycott is based in substantial part in 31 feelings which can be legally expressed, this court rules that 32 such an expression is lawful. 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1 It is interesting that the leader of the Black Panther 2 Party sells a newspaper on the sidewalk adjoining McDonald's 3 during his picketing endeavor which professes to be the official. 4 Black Panther News Service. This defendant, seeking the protection 5 of the United States Constitution, has avowed to overthrow that 7 same Constitution and the government behind it by violent, 8 revolutionary means. This newspaper has contained such expressions

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"Black men. Black people, colored persons of America, revolt everywhere! Arm yourselves. The only culture worth keeping is a revolutionary culture. Change. Freedom everywhere. Dynamite! Black Power. Use the gun. Kill the pigs everywhere.

"... we will not dissent from American Government. We will overthrow it. "

Issues of "The Black Panther" regularly contain quotations from the writings of Chairman Mao Tse-Tung of the People's Republic of China and feature Mao's statement that "political power grows out of the barrel of a gun."

20 Most shocking is the memorializing of John Jackson, James 21 McClain, William Christmas and Ruchell McGee as great heroes 22 for precipitating the killing of a Superior Court Judge and the 23 paralyzing of a Deputy District Attorney in San Rafael, California.

The Black Panthers are currently launched on a campaign to 25 "free all political prisoners" and "death to the Fascist pigs". 26 Political prisoners are those legally incarcerated or imprisoned 27 for violations of our criminal laws. Fascist pigs include police 28 29 officers, prosecutors, judges, businessmen; and so on. The 30 papers are filled with statements of hate for all white people 31 and blacks they call "Uncle Tom's", filled with articles on how 32 to use every form of weapon and explosive. Anyone who does not Page 7 - Opinion

recognize the terrible violence being conjured up by the Black Panther Party has been deluded. It has always been the heritage of our country, and one of its greatest strengths, to provide free expression for all citizens, even those dedicated to the destruction of the same government guaranteeing that right. 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Panther chief to serve time

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — Black Panther Party leader Huey Newton was ordered Monday to surrender July 9 to begin serving a prison term for his conviction on charges of being an ex-felon in possession of a handgun.

Alameda County Superior Court Judge Joseph Karesh rejected a bid by Newton's lawyers to keep their client free on \$50,000 bail while the conviction is appealed.

After the hearing Newton, who faces up to three years behind bars for the 1978 conviction, told reporters, "I feel he (Karesh) is under pressure and doesn't have the fortitude to be a man of his own ... I am surprised at the judge for not having any spine.

"He knows that nothing has changed; there are still many questions left to be answered in the appellate court."

Deputy District Attorney Tom Orloff, who strongly urged that Newton be ordered to prison, told Karesh, "There comes a time when the law must put a period after a sentence."

#### Activist to speak

Harry Edwards, an activist in the black power movement in the 1960s, will open a four-part lecture series on the roles of blacks in the United States at Portland State University at 4 p.m. Wednesday, Jan. 19. The address will be in the Smith Memorial Center and there is no admission charge.

## Ex-Black Panther takes lessons in Mormon faith

SALT LAKE CITY (UPI) - Former Black Panther Eldridge Cleaver says he. hasn't yet joined the Mormon Church, but he is "extremely

interested" in the religion.

"I have been studying the teachings and doctrines of the church and getting to know the people, and I am really enthusiastic about what I have been learning," Cleaver told reporters Wednesday.

"I am extremely interested in the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints," he said. "I find appealing the (Mormons') serious approach to holy scripture. This is the thing that grabs hold of me. There are many religious people today who pay little attention to holy scripture.'

The 45-year-old ex-convict and author of Soul on Ice has been in Salt Lake City for several days meeting with church leaders and attending seminars on constitutional government at the Freeman Institute.

The institute is a conservative anticommunist organization founded by former Salt Lake Police Chief Cleon Skousen, now a professor of religion at Mormonowned Brigham Young University. Skousen's organization recently developed close ties with the Rev. Jerry Falwell and his Moral Majority.

Mormon Church leaders acknowledged two weeks ago that its missionaries had been giving lessons to Cleaver, who once was an avowed Marxist and information director for the Panthers.

Cleaver fled the United States after a 1968 shootout with Oakland, Calif., police. He lived for eight years in France, Algeria and Cuba and made trips to North Korea and North Vietnam. He returned to the U.S. five years ago to face attempted murder charges stemming from the shootout. But he was placed on probation after pleading guilty to a reduced charge of assaulting police officers.

Cleaver told reporters he has been studying many religions since his return from exile. He said his interest in the Mormon Church is "strictly for religious value."

"I feel that my spiritual journey in the past five years has led me to this point," he said. But he added that he will not make any plans to join the Mormons until he has completed his study.

Blacks were denied full participation in the Mormon Church until 1978, when President Spencer Kimball received a "revelation" opening the faith's priesthood to all worthy males, regardless of race.

Cleaver said he was impressed that the church could change its policies, and does not consider it a racist organization.

He praised both Skousen and Falwell as great teachers dedicated to saving the country and said he can see nothing wrong with religious leaders participating in politics.

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"I think that one of the things that caused this country to get into some of the messy problems we have is because for a long time a lot of religious people checked out of politics and left it to the atheists," said Cleaver.

"And the atheists screwed the whole thing up."

But Cleaver said that when he goes to church, "I leave my political beliefs outside the door. I go into a church for spiritual nourishment."

#### Geronimo Pratt

### Black Panther's Fight For Freedom Exposes Government Cover-up

Like so many Black people, Pratt's roots are in the deep South. He grew up "separate and unequal" in rural Morgan City, Louisiana, the youngest of eight children in a close-knit, hard-working religious family. Determined to see their children educated, his parents managed to put all his brothers and sisters through college.

When his father became too sick to work, Pratt, then 17, enlisted in the Army to earn money to support his family. He did two battle tours in Viet Nam, rising to the rank of Staff Sargeant. His ability as a scout and his mix of American Indian and Afro-Haitian ancestry led to a nickname that stuck — "Geronimo."

Along with two purple hearts, two air medals and many other decorations, Geronimo returned in 1968 with serious criticism of U.S. treatment of Third World people. He started UCLA, where he met Bunchy Carter, a leader of the Black Panther Party. Geronimo studied Black history, joined the Party, and determined to dedicate his life to our continuing struggle for freedom.

These were the years when Black people were increasingly active in fighting their oppression. Throughout the country programs emerged to combat the wretched conditions people are forced to live under, programs ranging from free breakfasts and health care to new educational and cultural activities.

From the community, from the prisons, from the campus...came the demand for the right of Black people to determine our own destiny. A movement grew for Black pride, Black power and Black liberation.

Because of the Black Panther Party's role in this struggle, J. Edgar Hoover named it "The greatest threat to the internal security of the country" and the main target of the FBI's Counterintelligence Program — COINTELPRO. The stated purpose of this infamous program was to stop the Black movement by "discrediting" and neutralizing" its leaders. Previous Black targets of the FBI included Martin Luther King, Malcolm X, Andrew Young and Dick Gregory.

Hoover had his FBI agents come up with "hardhitting proposals aimed at crippling the BPP." They forged letters and used other dirty tricks to turn local Black groups against the party, until their rivalry exploded into violent conflict that cost many Panthers' lives, including Bunchy Carter's. After Bunchy was killed in January, 1969, Geronimo took his close friend's place as head of the party in Los Angeles.

In 1969, police raided and wrecked Panther offices across the country.

On Dec. 4, 1969, Chicago police murdered Panther leader Fred Hampton in his sleep. An FBI informer who had been head of security for the Chicago Panthers provided a floor plan of Hampton's apartment, showing where he slept.

In the pre-dawn hours of Dec. 8, 1969, 350 heavily armed police attacked three Panther offices in Los Angeles. At one location the Panthers held the police off for five hours until people from the community came forward to protect them. At another, Geronimo narrowly escaped death.

Following the raid, Geronimo and 17 others were charged with conspiracy to murder the police. But when the case came to trial, the jury found that the Panthers had acted in self-defense and acquitted them of all major charges.

Alarmed by the massive public outcry against the murder of Fred Hampton and other police attacks on the Panthers, government officials feared that another attempt to kill Geronimo or jail him on political charges would only create one more revolutionary martyr. So they moved against him in a way which would throughly discredit him as a leader of his people.

In fall of 1970, they suddenly brought forth an informer who claimed that two years earlier Geronimo had confessed to a senseless murder committed in the course of a \$30 robbery on a Santa Monica tennis court. This agent was a former L.A. deputy sheriff, now believed to have had ties with the FBI.

The FBI and police knew through informers and wiretaps that Geronimo had actually been in Oakland at Panther meetings at the time of the murder. But they hid the evidence.

They also concealed the documents which show that Geronimo was a target of COINTELPRO and the coordinated covert operations which all levels of government mounted against the Panthers. These programs did not become public knowledge until Congress investigated the FBI and CIA several years later in the aftermath of Watergate. The jury in Geronimo's case, which took 11 days to reach its verdict, might well have acquitted him had it known the truth about COINTELPRO.

The lawsuits which Geronimo initiated from the hole at San Quentin have started to expose a massive official attempt to hide the truth about how these programs were used against him. In one suit of U.S. District Judge Samuel Conti held a California Deputy Attorney General in contempt of court for lying <u>about</u> the existence of the state's political intelligence files on Geronimo. The judge called it "a scenario of deceit, deception and cover-up."

Geronimo has been joined in his legal battles by a team of lawyers from the National Conference of Black Lawyers, the National Lawyers Guild, and the National Task Force on COINTELPRO Litigation and Research. They are preapring to petition the state court in Los Angeles for a writ which would overturn Geronimo's murder conviction. The lawyers work for free, but need money for expenses to keep going.

Geronimo and his wife Ashaki are the proud parents of a baby girl, Shona Pratt, born Aug. 12, 1979. Geronimo is making bold plans now for the future of his family and his people.

Geronimo is a strong leader of a strong people. We need him beside us in the 1980s as we renew our struggle for full liberation.

Geronimo Pratt is a political prisoner fighting for his freedom. His story shows how far government agencies have been willing to go to stop movements for social change, particularly the Black struggle. The campaign to free him is an example of our ability to fight back and win.

The full weight of my office is behind Geronimo's struggle. I call on all of you to join us.

In 1969, Geronimo Pratt, a UCLA law student, rose to national prominence as a leader of the Black Panther Party. Documents recently uncovered by his lawyers show that FBI gave "constant consideration" during those years to "counterintelligence measures toward neutralizing Pratt as an effective BPP functionary." After failing several times to stop his work and discredit him, the FBI and police finally framed Geronimo for a crime that they knew he did not commit.

Not content with imprisoning Geronimo, these same agencies worked with the California Department of Corrections to keep him in solitary confinement. For seven straight years Geronimo was locked in a dingy 4' x 8' cell  $23\frac{1}{2}$  hours a day. He was forced to visit his family and friends in handcuffs and shackles; his contact with the outside world was from behind a glass screen. But Geronimo fought back with a federal lawsuit which forced his release into the general population at San Quentin.

In February, 1978, a board headed by Ray Brown, who worked against the Panthers as head of the Oakland Police red squad, refused to set any parole date for Geronimo. This flagrant abuse only strengthened Geronimo's determination and built broader support for the fight to vindicate him through unconditional release.

Geronimo and his lawyers and supporters are now winning this fight. If public support continues to grow, Geronimo will be free this year.
# Black Panthers prowl the city's streets no more

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — More than a decade ago, they prowled the streets of Oakland, Calif., in shiny black shoes and black leather jackets, berets perched jauntily on their heads, starched blue shirts tucked into pressed black slacks.

They said their purpose was to try to prevent police brutality. J. Edgar Hoover, then director of the FBI, branded the Black Panthers "the most violence-prone of all the extremist groups" and declared a sort of secret war.

Today, the Panthers roam no more. The men and women who used the credo, "Political power grows out of the barrel of a gun," have filtered into every pore of American society.

Former Panthers work in congressional offices in Washington, D.C. An ex-party member is running for mayor in a North Carolina city and another ran for the state legislature in Massachusetts. Eldridge Cleaver, the former Panther minister of information, has said he wants to run for mayor of Oakland.

There are ex-Panther postal workers, school teachers and legislative assistants. One former Panther is a troubleshooter for a computer firm. Another owns a plumbing company.

Bobby Seale, who helped organize the black power group in 1966, lectures to college groups and lives in Philadelphia, where he is finishing a barbecue cookbook and is about to start a novel, a thriller about a black activist and some other '60s types. He also frets about bills and sending his three children to college.

"As a functional organization, the Black Panther Party is non-existent," Seale says in the midst of a weightlifting workout at a Germantown YMCA. "I spent eight years in the Black Panthers and I've had my fill of that. But I haven't given up the struggle."

In the 1960s and '70s, the struggle began with law books and tape recorders, as the Panthers sought to record how police were doing their jobs. In little time, the Panthers' practice of patrolling the Oakland community to guard against purported incidents of police brutality led to bloody shootouts. Lawbooks were put aside for pistols and shotguns.

The FBI launched a secret campaign of "dirty tricks" involving fake Panther documents and letters, infiltrators and informants. The campaign, part of the FBI's COINTELPRO operation to disrupt and discredit civil rights and antiwar organizations and their leaders in the 1960s and '70s, was disclosed by a Senate investigating committee in 1976.

In 1969, Black Panthers Mark Clark and Fred Hampton were killed in a predawn police raid in Chicago. Police said they were searching for weapons.

Clark's and Hampton's relatives and survivors of the raid sued city, state and federal officials and were awarded \$1.85 million last March.

Seale claims law officers killed 26 Panthers and that the Panthers killed their share of police and FBI agents. "They wounded 60-odd of us, we wounded 32 of them," he asserted. "I think the reason we killed less and wounded less was because they had... more equipment."

Bobby Rush, one-time Panther deputy minister of defense and former leader of the Chicago chapter, is an alderman in Chicago.

"The Panthers created an image of defiance and organized defiance and resistance to police forces that did not take into consideration the rights and basic human dignities of the black community," Rush said in a telephone interview. "A lot of the reform in police departments across the country today is directly related to the heated controversy of Panthers vs. police."

Over the years, the Black Panthers switched from bullets to ballots, seeking elective office and supporting others.

"They canvassed the community where they felt they could be most effective and helped in getting the vote out and generally supported my candidacy," Oakland Mayor Lionel Wilson said, recalling his 1977 campaign.

"I think that the Panthers, as leaders in an activist program, brought to the attention of many people many of the inadequacies and inequities in terms of race relations and how minorities had been treated," he said. "That's the real legacy they left."

For some, the legacy was jail.

Elmo "Geronimo" Pratt, who once headed the Los Angeles Panther chapter, is trying to have his 1969 murder conviction overturned, arguing that he was framed by the FBI and the Los Angeles Police Department. He is serving a life sentence at San Quentin prison.

Huey P. Newton, who helped Seale found the party, is appealing a 1978 gun possession conviction. He was released from prison in 1970 after serving almost three years for the murder of an Oakland police officer in 1967. The verdict later was overturned because of errors by the trial judge.

He also was tried twice for the 1974 slaying of a young prostitute. The charges were dropped after both trials ended in hung juries.

Newton went into self-exile in Cuba shortly thereafter. He returned to the United States in 1977.

Cleaver, author of "Soul on Ice," was charged with assaulting a police officer in an Oakland gun battle in 1968. He jumped his \$50,000 bail and fled to Algeria.

He returned in 1975, saying he'd had a "religious conversion." He pleaded guilty to the charges and was given probation and ordered to do 2,000 hours of community service.

# Black Panthers launch national comeback

After more than six years of retrenchment, costly legal battles, dwindling membership and often divisive leadership struggles, the Black Panther Party—the selfstyled "Vanguard Party of the Revolution" —is reemerging from its Oakland, California, stronghold.

In a largely unheralded move, the party recently took over a large storefront office here. Situated between two ramshackle Baptist churches in the middle of Watts, this city's black ghetto, it is the first Panther chapter to be organized outside Oakland since the turbulence of the late 1960's.

Other chapters have opened more recently, notably in Las Vegas, which has a large black population, nad in Chicago. Party officials say more chapters will be formed as resources become available.

But the opening of the Los Angeles chapter on January 17 was particularly symbolic of the new phase in the party's growth.

It was on that date in 1969 that Bunchy Carter and John Huggins, leaders of the local Panther organization, were murdered at UCLA by members of Ron Karenga's "U.S." black nationalist group. Just two months earlier, FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover had ordered his Los Angeles agents to use the "U.S." group in "hardhitting counter-intelligence measures aimed at crippling the BPP (Panthers)."

In the ensuing violent history of the Los Angeles chapter, 11 Panthers were slain, more than in any other chapter.

The climax came in a December 1969 shoot-out with the Los Angeles police that lasted five-and-a-half hours. In the end, 18 Panthers were arrested and more than \$172 million in bail money was paid out over the next two years.

By 1972 the Los Angeles office was closed and two years later all Panther activity in Southern California-and most of the rest of the nation-had ceased.

The highly successful Cointelpro (counter-intelligence program) of the FBI had resulted in the deaths or exile of many Panther leaders and members. What few chapters remained outside Oakland were later closed due to real or suspected infiltration by police and an almost total breakdown in communications and control from the party's Oakland headquarters.

While the party refuses to divulge membership numbers, the FBI claimed that the party rolls had shrunk from some 1,500 to a core of just 200 by 1975.

Some former leaders, such as Eldridge Cleaver and David Hilliard, were expelled. Co-founder Bobby Seale left the party under strange circumstances and Huey Newton, the still-acknowledged leader and chief party theoretician, jumped bail in 1974 and went into exile in Cuba. Since then, the day-to-day leadership has fallen to Elaine Brown, a dynamic and articulate woman in her mid-30's.

According to Brown, the long period of retrenchment was necessary to cut losses and "secure our base area—secure in the sense of being entrenched in the community. Now we've done that and we can afford to think about something else."

In fact, the Panthers have become a potent political force in Oakland, a city roughly 50 percent black and 70 percent minority.

Brown won 41 percent of the vote in a 1975 race for city council and was recently named to the executive committee of the Oakland Council for Economic Development, an influential, corporatedominated group charting the rebuilding of the city's downtown center. She claims to have a close working relationship with Gov. Jerry Brown, whom she supported in his presidential bid.

John George, a black attorney long active in Oakland politics and now a member of the Alameda County Board of Supervisors, says the Panthers have survived in Oakland because they continue to "express the needs of the most exploited sections of the population. The conditions they were speaking for in the beginning remain the same, in fact worse," he says, including unemployment, inflation and housing.

"The leadership of the Panthers, from Newton to Elaine Brown," says George, "recognized that to survive they had to



keep in touch with people's needs."

To do so, the Oakland Panthers launched a series of ambitious.community projects, including a highly successful alternative school, free food programs for the poor, free transportation for the elderly, an ambulance and para-medic service and medical and dental clinics.

They also entered the local electoral arena by running their own candidates and supporting others. "Voting is the most fundamental conscious political statement a person can make," Brown says. "If I can get you to walk out of your house to vote, I can get you out of your house for something else."

Today, claims Brown, "there is not a black who can get elected to office in Oakland without us."

She predicts the Panthers and their sympathizers will "take control of Oakland in five years," including the management of the city's lucrative port, the second largest containerized port in the world.

New chapters, she says, will focus on the peculiar needs of each city, and local leaders and members will be carefully screened. In the past, she says, "it was too easy for reactionary elements and police and FBI infiltrators to enter the party." Bob Duran, an organizer of the new Los Angeles chapter, says his office has "a lot of discretion because the conditions are so much different in Southern than in Northern California." Panthers from the Oakland office have been sent to Los Angeles and other new chapters to assist with organizing and administration.

The first project of the Los Angeles office was to give away 500 bags of groceries as a "gesture of our understanding of what the people's needs are," says Duran. Such gestures, say the Panthers, also demonstrate the inability of the government to serve such needs.

Other projects in the planning stage include programs modeled after the Oakland chapter's medical and dental clinics, martial arts and tutorial programs and alternative school. "It all depends on the resources we can develop," says Duran.

Since the opening, hundreds of curious young people have passed through the office seeking information. Letters of support have arrived from numerous community groups, including a food cooperative, the Watts Summer Festival and even a credit union.

A church next door has given the Panthers a key and carte blanche use of their facilities whenever they are available.

Spokesmen for the Los Angeles Police Department and the local FBI claim not to have been aware that the Panthers have returned, despite allegations by Panthers that the office has been under close surveillance.

Elaine Brown confidently predicts that this time around the Panthers will take hold wherever they set up chapters and come to represent "a concrete alternative" to the problems of the crime-and-povertyinfested ghettos. She views the community self-help programs as the key to entrenchment.

"We don't get the ear of our people by walking down the street with our gun operation and scaring half of them to death," she says.

"The party believes in mass participation, not dead heroes."

"The Vanguard Party," she proclaimed recently in the Black Panther newspaper, "still lives to fight another day. It's building a base in Oakland, by any means necessary, a base for revolution. The Black Panther Party is alive and well and living all over America."

### Black Separatists Led By Felon

Ron Karenga is a black revolutionary who some years ago founded US, a Los Angeles-based organization whose purpose was to promote black nationalism and a black nation within the United States and to train blacks for revolution. In the early Seventies, Karenga was convicted and sent to prison on charges of torturing two of his women followers whom he suspected of plotting to poison him. In July 1973, the Second District Court of Appeals upheld the conviction of Karenga on "charges of assault with a deadly weapon." At that time he was already in prison for the torture of Deborah Jones as a "disciplinary measure."

Currently Ron Karenga is a history professor at San Diego State University and is busy promoting something called "Kwanzaa." It is a term that Karenga coined from the Swahili word *kwanza*, meaning "first fruits," conceived by him in 1965 as a celebration in which blacks could express themselves "politically and culturally." Kwanzaa has acquired its own symbols and 7 guiding principles, prominent among which are *ujima* ("collective

work and responsibility") and *ujamaa* ("cooperative economics").

Nokukhanja, a young black woman who has celebrated Kwanzaa since 1970, explains of this business that it is "individual blacks coming together with a larger group of black people to build a black nation . . . " In other words, Kwanzaa is less a "celebration" and more a push for black "collective work," socialism, and the old Stalinist con about creating a separatist black nation.

### **Red Agitation In Hawaii**

Angela Davis, a member of the Communist Party, U.S.A., recently addressed two large audiences at the University of Hawaii, trying as always to foment trouble. She told the gatherings, each reportedly attended by some 2,500 people, that the "problem of housing and land was perhaps one of the most explosive questions confronting the Hawaiian people." According to the Communist People's World, this problem comes from the land-tenure system in Hawaii where "you can only rent land for fixed periods of time - twenty-five or thirty years. At the end of the term the owner may raise the rent and rents have been raised astronomically."

Comrade Angela sought new members for the National Alliance Against Racist and Political Repression, a Communist Front which she serves as a "co-chairperson." There is "great enthusiasm" for the work of this Front, boasted Davis. "After I spoke at the University a meeting was called by interested people to organize a chapter of the Alliance. Thirty people showed up, joined the Alliance and formed a new chapter."

#### **Members Unknown**

A spokesman for the Justice Department said that current membership was estimated at under 1,000. He said that this compared with a peak strength of 1,500 to 2,000, but he did not say when he thought the peak had been reached.

The Panthers themselves never discuss membership figures. But in 1967 and 1968 they did estimate that some 35 Panther chapters had been formed across the country, and their comments about the chapters indicated a total membership of about 5,000.

### **Trials Upcoming**

He was convicted in a previous trial and served time but the conviction was later reversed because of various errors by the trial judge.

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From the material I have read on both sides, this much is clear: Eldridge Cleaver, speaking for the Algiers and New York faction, has accused the Panther National Office in general and Huey Newton and David Hilliard in particular of "abandoning Party principles" by carrying on Panther affairs undemocratically, squandering party funds on personal luxuries, and most importantly, reducing the Panther revolutionary strategy to one of legal support rallies and court battles, thus discarding the development of an armed urban guerilla movement.

The Oakland faction so far has limited its comments to personal attacks on Cleaver and his followers, though the content of the attacks, if true would make Cleaver a murderer and his supporters conscious agents of the FBI out to ' destroy the Black Panther Party.

### CHRONOLOGY

In <u>mid-January</u> of this year, Elmer "Geronimo" Pratt was expelled from the Panthers. Geronimo was a leading member of the Los Angeles chapter. He was one of the Panthers who successfully held off a police attack on the chapter office in December, 1969.

January 19, the East Village Other, an underground paper in New York City, printed a letter addressed to the Weathermen, written by members of the Panther 21 still in jail, Though the letter was a response to what they considered to be the Weathermen's loss of militancy in the "New Morning, Changing Weather" statement, it also included some criticism of the Panther leadership -- "self-proclaimed vanguard parties".

February 8, Michael Tabor and Richard "Dharuba" Moore, two of the four members of the Panther 21 out on bail, didn't show up in court. The judge immediately severed their cases and threw Afeni Shakur and Joan Bird, the two other Panthers out on bail, back into jail.

February 13, the Panther paper came out, condemning Tabor, Moore, and Connie Mathews (who married Tabor 2 months earlier) as enemies of the people for splitting and causing Joan Bird and Afeni Shakur to be thrown back into jail.

February 26, Huey Newton appeared on a morning TV show in California. It was arranged that the show (a call-in type) would have Eldridge call up from Algiers. Eldridge started talking about the deep divisions in the Party and how people were being lauded one week and expelled for no rational reason the next. Eldridge placed the blame for this on David Hilliard and demanded his removal as Chief of Staff.

Later that night, Huey called up Eldridge in Algeria. Huey said that he was upset at the way Eldridge had bared internal party disagreements on public TV and expelled the whole intercommunal section. Eldridge taped the conversation and released it with the video tape that was played on March 4.

<u>March 1</u>, the New York Panthers issued a statement expelling David Hilliard, Panther Chief of Staff. They accuse him of corruption and totalitarian leadership. They say that Huey Newton and the other members of the Central Committee in California - Emory Douglas, Minister of Culture and Ray "Masai" Hewitt, Minister of Education, will be put on trial before the people to judge their revolutionary commitment. The majority of the 40-odd Panther chapters around the country including the one in Portland seem to be supporting Huey Newton and the National Office. This is not suprising since most Panthers have never met the principal members of the opposing group. Eldridge has been in Algiers for two years, and the New York Panther leadership has been either in jail or tied up in court since April, 1969. In addition, Cleaver's program of immediate armed actions must seem premature in black communities where the need to survive in the face of rising unemployment, inflation, housing shortages, and tremendously inadequate social services comes first at this point.

A newspaper like the <u>Bridge</u> which is put out by an all-white staff and read by a mostly white audience can do little about the Panther split but report that it has happened. We can only hope that both groups now claiming to be the Black Panther Party turn as quickly as possible to the mammoth task of building an America fit for human beings to live in.

March 4 a video tape from the intercommunal section was played for the press in New York. Eldridge ran down what he thought were the differences in ideology between the Algiers and New York faction as opposed to the California faction. He felt that the California faction was too much into mass organizing and not enough into the military aspect of guerilla warfare. Don Cox said that David Hilliard and Charles Garry, chief Panther lawyer, knew that the Baltimore Panther conspiracy bust was going to happen and didn't do anything to warn the people involved. Pete O'Neil, a Panther from Missouri, pointed out that even though the Panthers have become a national organization, everyone on the Central Committee was from California.

<u>March 5</u>, the Panther paper printed an article which was headlined "Free Kathleen Cleaver". A story inside by Elaine Brown said that Kathleen was being kept hostage by Eldridge who had murdered her lover. It also said that Eldridge had taken and discarded many mistresses.

March 8, a New York Panther, Robert Webb was found dead on 125th St. in Harlem. Webb was a Panther since 1967 and he had left California to work in New York. He was one of the organizers of the press conference at which the video tape was played. He was murdered after getting into a fight with some people who were selling the Panther paper. The New York Panthers accused "dope fiend" Huey Newton of sending "robots" from the West Coast to murder Webb. The California Panthers accused the New York Panthers of setting up Huey and Hilliard for a conspiracy to murder Robert Webb. <u>On March 11</u>, a second video tape from Algiers with Kathleen Cleaver, Michael Tabor, and Connie Matthews was shown to a New York audience. Connie Matthews mentioned that there was a lack of democratic centralism in the Party and that criticism led to suspension. Michael Tabor complained that the Party measured revolutionary commitment by how many papers a Panther could sell. He said that the East Coast started formulating these criticisms after Geronimo was expelled.

On March 20, the latest Panther paper comes out. Its front page article and centerfold are devoted to a scathing denunciation of "Eldridge Cleaver and his conspirators" from the San Quentin prison branch of the Black Panther Party. The statement which warns Cleaver that "death is the only solution to the problem you pose" is endored by all members of the Panther Central Committee with the exception of the three (Kathleen, Eldridge, and Don Cox) in Algiers. The paper also reports that the Intercommunal Section of the BPP has "defected" from the Party.

Williams believes the money is to be merely a gift from PSU. He was informed of the committee's plans by Rude Batties, chairman of the committee.

The Free Breakfast Program was started by Black Panthers to feed children in poor areas each weekday.

The program which depends on donations of time and food to operate, worked well in other large cities and is being tried in Portland. Most of the food comes from merchants in the area.

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# Veil Of Secrecy Shrouds Attorney General Mitchell's Visit To Portland

U.S. Attorney General John N. Mitchell paid his first visit to Portland Saturday since taking office in 1969 as the Nixon administration's top legal officer.

A veil of secrecy was maintained over the public offi-cial's schedule as police and FBI officers all but sealed the Hilton Hotel where he spoke to the National District Attorneys Association.

The 53-year-old attorney general with whom President Nixon practiced law prior to the 1968 compaign arrived punctually for a hurriedly scheduled 5:15 p.m. press con-ference at the Hilton.

He fielded questions effortlessly and without a trace of humor. It was business all the way.

#### **Enforcement** Backed

Questions centered on pornography (the topic of Mitch-ell's talk to the district attorneys Saturday night,) civil rights, crime in the nation's capital and steps to control it, and pollution.

On pornography the attorney general made it clear he did not favor fewer restrictions, enforcement.

The attorney general told some 300 prosecutors that ac-tion can be taken against smut peddlers on the local level by investigating unlawful employment of juveniles in the making of sex photographs and films.

"As a practical matter," "As a practical matter," said the slow-speaking, pipe-smoking Mitchell, "individual states have little power to stem the flow of offensive ma-terial mailed to their socidate terial mailed to their residents from other states."

But Mitchell said the administration is moving on two bills which would limit the distribution of obscene materials to juveniles, and make it a feder-al crime to mail "offensive" material to householders who object, whether or not the material is legally pornographic.

MITCHELL also hinted that the administration will not give a friendly reception to an upcoming report of a Presidential Commission on Obscenity and Pornography which is expected to recommend relaxation of pornography statutes.

"The commission has been criticized on the ground that its chairman and its chief counsel have been members of the American Civil Liberties Union, whose opposition to antiobscenity laws is well known.

"But whatever the validity of this criticism, I want to emphasize that the administration's bills are not based on any assumed connection between obscenity and antisocial behavior.

"THEY ARE BASED on two cherished values of our society - the right of parents to supervise the upbringing of their own children, and the right of the homeowner to be free in his own home from a barrage of pornography that is both offensive and unwanted."

Response to Mitchell's talk, from observation of applause, fell mostly in the "polite" range.

# MitchellUrges Pornography War While Protesters Chant Outside

### Crowd Asks (2) U.S. To Free Black Panther

U.S. Attorney General John N. Mitchell called for a stepped up war on pornography Saturday while 200 protestors chanted outside the heavily guarded Portland Hilton Hotel.

Mitchell spoke before the 1970 National District Attorneys Convention and left immediately for Portland International Airport after his speech.

His movements into Portland and back to the airport were shrouded in secrecy.

were shrouded in secrecy. As protesters shouted "Free Bobby" Seale (a Black Panther leader on trial for murder in New Haven, Conn.) and "Kill Mitchell" outside the hotel, the attorney general sipped scotch, ate steak and verbally blasted pornography inside.

#### Aims Outlined

Mitchell spelled out the Nixon Administration's determination to halt the rising tide of obscenity in a speech to 250 district attorneys and their convention guests.

He said new legislation, some of it already law, is not based on any assumed connection between obscenity and social behavior.

It is based, he said, "on two cherished values of our society — the right of parents to supervise the upbringing of their own children, and the right of the homeowner to be free in his own home from a barrage of pornography which is both offensive and unwanted."

Also, he added, the new laws had been drafted with recent court decisions in mind.

Mitchell emphasized he did not share the views on pornography reportedly endorsed by the President's Commission on Obscenity and Pornography which allegedly seek fewer restrictions on erotic films, books and magazines.

The report has not been released officially.



Had more than one of the 18 commission members been appointed after Nixon took office, he indicated, the commission's findings might have been quite different.

He also reminded the district attorneys that the chairman and chief legal counsel of the commission were both members of the American Civil Liberties Union, a group which has opposed antiobscenity laws.

### Theater Crowded

The 200 protesters who marched outside the sealed hotel eventually turned their attention to the Broadway Theater across the street where membrs of International Association of Theater and Stage Employes Local 159 were picketing in a labor dispute. Urged on by a small cadre of dissenters, the demonstrators briefly invaded the theater but soon retired to the sidewalk in front.

Some tried to block SW Broadway in front of the theater. Two leaped on the hood of a passing car, but were dumped by the frightened driver who sped away. Others in the crowd urged marcher's to "cool it."

# **Egypt Steals a March**

"If Nasser is smart, he will accept the U.S. peace proposal," a Western dip-lomat in Cairo noted last week. "That will put the Americans right on the spot, because then they will have to get the Israelis to fall into line." Apparently Gamal Abdel Nasser had the same idea, for a few days later the Egyptian President announced his country's willingness to go along with the peace initiative made last June 19 by Secretary of State William Rogers. It was an exquisitely deft gambit. By accepting the U.S. proposal, Nasser was forcing Israel to make the next move. And as the Israelis saw it, they would be damned if they didn't follow suit-and damned if they did.

From the Egyptian point of view, the beauty of Nasser's ploy was that he gave away virtually nothing. Although he declared that he "unconditionally" ac-cepted the U.S. plan for a Mideast cease-fire, it appeared that, in fact, Nasser had carefully hedged his position to rule out any concessions to Israel. His announcement came near the end of a long, rambling and appropriately militant speech in Cairo marking the eighteenth anniversary of the revolution that overthrew King Farouk. And even as he embraced the Rogers proposal, Nasser added a vital quid pro quo: that United Nations mediator Gunnar Jarring should obtain "his instructions and guidelines from the Big Four powers." Some ob-servers interpreted this to mean that Nasser was insisting on the sort of dictated settlement that the Israelis have re-

jected all along. Changes: Other smokescreens had been laid down for Nasser by his close confidante, Mohammed Hassanein Heikal, Egypt's Minister of National Guidance and the editor of the authoritative newspaper Al Ahram. In publishing a previously secret letter from Rogers to Egyptian Foreign Minister Mahmoud Riad, Al Ahram made a few small but crucial changes in the wording of the U.S. peace initiative. Secretary Rogers had referred to eventual "Israeli withdrawal from territories occupied in the 1967 conflict." In Al Ahram, this came out as "the occupied territories"-indicating that Egypt still insisted that Israel would have to give up all of its wartime gains. In addition, the Rogers letter had suggested that Israel and the Arabs "will find it necessary" to hold face-to-face negotiations at some future point; Heikal's newspaper replaced "will" with "may" in deference to Egypt's distaste for a direct meeting. And in printing Rogers's proposal of a cease-fire "for at least a limited period," the newspaper inserted the parentheti-cal phrase "three months," thus potentially allowing Egypt time to build up its military strength along the Suez Canal

without fear of reprisals by the Israelis.

Some U.S. diplomats believed that these semantic changes were not very important. They argued that the alterations could have cropped up in the translation from English to Arabic, or that they may have been designed merely to placate Arab firebrands. Still, Heikal's rewrite raised doubts about just how unconditional Nasser's acceptance had been, and the revisions were substantial enough to persuade the State Department to release, for the first time, its own text of the letter from Rogers to Riad.

Uncertainty: If Nasser's intentions remained somewhat obscure, there was no question about the negative stance of the more militant Arabs, particularly the Palestinian commandos, who stoked the Mideast fires again last week by hijacking a Greek airliner (box). The position of the Soviet Union was still hard to pin down. Nasser recently returned from three weeks of medical treatment and strategy sessions in Moscow, and there was speculation that his patrons in the Kremlin had prevailed upon him to adopt a somewhat more flexible attitude to-ward Israel. "My feeling," said one U.S. official, "is that Moscow is ready to reduce the fighting and perhaps encour-age negotiations." Russia's reply to the U.S. peace initiative was handed to Secretary Rogers last week by ambassador to Washington Anatoly Dobrynin, and the message was said to be more or less "positive." But there was no indication of just how far the Russians would go in supporting the U.S. peacemaking effort.

For the moment, Russia and the Arabs could afford to sit back and wait, for with Washington pressing Jerusalem for its response, Israel had been placed in a painful dilemma. The Israelis did not want to shoot down the U.S. peace move, but they were equally reluctant to go along with it-least of all on Nasser's terms. The government of Prime Minister Golda Meir has consistently refused to accept any territorial preconditions, and it has always insisted on face-to-face negotiations. Any major role for the Big Four is also unacceptable to Israel. "In that forum, what do we have?" asked a top-ranking Israeli diplomat. "Russia will support Nasser 100 per cent; France, 80 per cent, and Britain 60 per cent. And America?" He waggled his palm back and forth. "America is uncertain. So where the hell does that leave us?

The strongest Israeli fire was reserved for the limited cease-fire proposal. "A cease-fire with a terminal date," declared Foreign Minister Abba Eban, "is a period of feverish activity with a determination to derive maximum military advantage from every day." Instead, Eban repeat-

### TRIALS: 'Ice Him'

It was as eerie a piece of testimony as anyone ever put before a jury. Midway through the second week of testimony in the New Haven Panther murder trial, the state won permission to play two twenty-minute tape recordings, and suddenly the courtroom was filled with a gasping, whimpering voice—the voice, so the prosecution said, of the victim in the last tormented hours of his life.

The defendant in the case is a 24year-old New Haven Panther leader named Lonnie McLucas, the first of eight party members to go on trial in the torture-murder of Alex Rackley, a Panther underling suspected of having been a police informer. The tape recordings were made, according to the prosecution, while Rackley was tied to a chair in New Panther headquarters. Haven Thev opened (NEWSWEEK, March 30) with a Panther woman describing his interrogation by party brethren: "[Rackley] got some discipline in the areas of the nose and the mouth ... Answers to their questions came after a few buckets of hot water." And later came the voice identified as Rackley's own, broken and sobbing, ticking off the names of some suspected informers in the New York party. Another voice asked why he hadn't reported them earlier. "I was scared, brother" came the reply. "... The brother," came the reply. "... The brothers were talking about shooting me."

**Swamp:** The week's star witness, Warren Kimbro, 36, a Panther who has pleaded guilty to second-degree murder in the Rackley case and turned state's evidence, said he, McLucas and George Sams Jr. (who has also pleaded guilty) took Rackley to a swamp 25 miles from New Haven and led him to the edge of a river. Sams handed Kimbro a gun and told him: "Ice him-this is from national [headquarters]."

Kimbro got no more specific than that about where the execution order originated. Sams, a man once declared a "dangerous mental defective," says it issued from the party's national chairman, Bobby Seale, but Kimbro said he had slept through Seale's supposed visit to the party's New Haven headquarters. That, however, was small comfort to McLucas. In the swamp, Kimbro said, "we walked a little way, and George said now' and I pulled the trigger." He winced at the telling. Afterward, he went on, McLucas was sent back to make sure Rackley was dead. And, as Kimbro told the tale, McLucas- did precisely that: there was a report; then McLucas came back to the car and said he had shot Alex Rackley "right in the chest" to finish the job.

### THURMOND THREATENS

### **BY KENNETH CRAWFORD**

It is an arguable question whether Sen. Strom Thurmond of South Carolina did President Nixon a service or a disservice by characterizing the Administration's school-desegregating policies as "arbitrary, vindictive and anti-South" and predicting the President's defeat in 1972 unless these policies are reversed.

Since a President needs enemies as well as friends to balance his total image, the question boils down to this: is Thurmond more decorative as enemy or as friend? In the Deep South, of course, he is a useful friend, as he demonstrated at the Miami convention in 1968 and with less authority in the subsequent election. But in most of the country, Thurmond's enmity is a badge a Presidential candidate should wear with pride and profit.

For Thurmond is an unreconstructed, unapologetic paladin to a fractious minority determined to keep the schools forever segregated. If alliance with this minority is the price of a political Southern strategy, it is a price the President could not afford to pay even if he wanted to. He can try, as he has, to soothe the South by slow enforcement of court orders, by nominating Southerners for the Supreme Court and by indicating that he understands a sectional attitude rooted in history, but further than this he cannot go. The objective of desegregation, if not always the practice, is fixed national policy in the year 1970.

### GOAL

An electoral majority is committed at least to the goal. In the North the commitment is hypocritical to a degree because black and white housing patterns permit most big-city schools to remain more or less segregated. But the voting booth is not a confessional for hypocrites. Many parents who oppose busing for their own children still consider themselves integrationists in principle, the principle applying to others.

Given the delicacy of the problem, Mr. Nixon's ambiguous handling of it has been politically, perhaps even socially, effective. There has been some progress and not much violence. The groundwork may have been laid for quickening the tempo of progress.

Until recently, it appeared that the President was doing as much as the courts would let him do in pursuit of a Southern strategy and trying to remake the Supreme Court in such a way that he could do more. Thus the Justice Department's tolerance of delays in school integration, Vice President Agnew's Waspish criticism of colleges with open-admissions policies and the Administration's anti-inflationary cutback of programs benefiting the Negro poor.

For some time the Philadelphia Plan to open the building trades to minority workers was the Administration's most notable contribution to Negro welfare. But now the Justice Department is pressing suits against Southern school districts; the Treasury has ruled that private schools cropping up all over the South as havens for all-white classes are not entitled to tax exemption; and Attorney General Mitchell is saying that the integration problem will be "behind us" by 1972, put there, presumably, by strict enforcement of court orders.

### ANGER

What seemed to set Thurmond off was a report, later denied by Mr. Nixon, that 100 Justice Department lawyers would invade the South in the fall to supervise the reopening of schools. The denial calmed the senator down a little. But Southern Republican state chairmen and congressmen, gathered in Washington, refused to be calmed. They were particularly angry about the loss of tax exemption for private academies. Some of them predicted that the Administration would suffer for its "desertion" of the South in upcoming Congressional, state and local elections.

Perhaps so. As for 1972, it is difficult to see what the President has to lose by displeasing Thurmond. George Wallace is reinstalled in the Alabama governorship, his poll ratings are about as high as they have ever been, and there is no good reason to believe that he won't carry again the same five Old South states he carried in 1968. To compete for them would hurt the President too much in other areas. Whether Wallace can extend his turf into other Southern and border states, even with Thurmond's help, will depend upon events neither he nor Mr. Nixon can control.

Granted that the tide of national opinion is running in a conservative direction, it seems unlikely that Thurmond is the man to ride it. He is too anachronistic to threaten persuasively. On balance, the President should be better off without him. 50.03N0370

Further info that after the club had folded, the Atlas people had gone to the vacant club to repossess their restaurant equipment and at this time found that the bulk of the equipment was gone from the building. Among other things, these included tables, chairs, and an expensive automatic ice making machine.

Approx. 1 week ago an appt. was made with MR. SHEPLAR of the Atlas Co. and he did come to the front office and discuss this matter with Sgt. Clark and writer. It was learned that they had sold numerous restaurant supplies to the Teen club, and the purchase was covered under a standard contractual agreement which was signed by NATHAM PROBY. Mr. SHEPLAR stated that the terms of the contract wars never fulffilled, and in fact very little money was received on the purchase of these items. Further stated that several months ago, the Atlas People went to the club with Proby who unloked the door and then left, and at this time the Atlas people did remove from the building the remainder of the items that were there, however they discovered at this time that many of the items which were sold to the club were not on the premises.

SHEPLAR stated that they had been in contact with PROBY who stated that someone must have broken in and stolen the remainder of the items. SHEPLAR then stated that several days after PROBY had been arrested by this dept. for obtaining property by false pretenses, he did drive by their firm and at this time lean out his car window and tell one of the company employees to report to MR. SHEPLAR that he, MATE PROBY thought he knew where some of these items were from the Teen Club and would contact SHEPLAR the next day to see about recovering these items. SHEPLAR reports that PROBY never did contact him regarding this.

A discussion of this info followed, and it was determined that a possible course of action would be to confront PROBY with the fact that he had admitted knowing where some of the items were, and asked him to see that these items were returned to the Atlas Co., thus mannance another possible court situation.

This AM, SHEPLAR did come to the Fraud Detail Office, and at this time

did accompany writer to the home of Nathan Proby, where it was discovered that he was not at home so a message was left with the subject at the house for him to call the writer at the earliest convenience. Writer was in the office later in the AM, and did receive a phone call from PROBY wanting to know what the situation was and at this time I informed him that he should attempt to recover the items that were missing from the closed Teen Club that belonged to the Atlas Supply Co. At this time, he stated that he thought he knew where the chairs were, and that the chairs would be in the Black Fanther Headquarters, and that he would further contact Kent Ford alleged Black Panther leader and see about recovering these items. A short time later, he called back stating that the chairs were in fact in the Panther Club as he saw them there. and that I should go and recover them. I at this time told MR. PROBY that I didn't feel that this would be a proper course of action, and suggested that he again attempt to handle this on his own.

A short time later, FROBY called again and reported that he did recover 5 chrome dinette type chairs from the Black Panther Headquarters, and at this time he was going to return the chairs to MR. SHEPIAR. Further stated this was all the equipment he could recover as he had info that the ice machine in question had been taken to Seattle along with some speakers.

It should be noted that it is believed by this writer that there was another Portland firm in the same position of the Atlas Co. in that they had sold the club some stereo and amplification equipment which later seemingly disappeared, and this could be possibly the speakers that PROBY referred to. At the time of this last conversation by phone, PROBY indicated to writer that he was rather upset as he didn't like to be pushed around, and if it continued he was going to get mad.

Approx. 3FM this date, did by phone contact MR. SHEPLAR at the Atlas Co. and at this time learned that the chairs in fact had been returned. At this time SHEPLAR requested a private meeting with me and he sounded quite upset. At this time, I drove to his place of business on N. Williams Ave. and met with him and he stated that when PROBY did return the chairs to the company, all the leatherette seats had been freshly slashed with a sharp instrument, and further PROBY was very loud, obnoxicus and threasning. PROBY went on to state that he got into quite a conversation with PROBY, and PROBY indicated that the Panthers were very unhappy about these chairs being removed from their headquarters. Further info is that the woman, name unknown, who runs the company was also approached in her office by PROBY and at this time he indicated that there should be no further pushing to recover the rest of this property, as the Panthers were very upset and he indicated in conversation to this woman that they could possibly suffer damage to their place of For m#1. 5

business and lots of problems from the Panther element. At this time he reportedly made reference to groups of negro militants in this city at this time from the IA area who were well armed and well equiped with bombs and dynamite and fire bombs, etc. At all times. PROBY indicated that he was just passing on info and feelings that he felt at the Black Fanther Heedquarters and at no time did directly personally threaten anyone at the Hotel Supply Co.

After relaying this info to MR. SHEPLAR, requested that for the time being we back off immediately on any other attempts to recover any of the rest of the items still missing from the zeen Club. This was readily agreed to by the writer. SHEPLAR assured me he would be in contact if any unusual events occurred around their place of business.

Upon returning to the Det. Office in the absence of Sgt. Clark and Lt. Still, this info was given to Capt. Nolan and Denuty Chief Steele, and Deputy Chief Steele said that he would be in contact with the North Free. Commanders who are responsible for the patrol of this particular area where the Atlas Co. is and see that these people are aware of the info received by writer this date.

No further info at this time.

However, it seems that if there is an authority concerned with maintaining some degree of order - and protection for the civilized law-abiding segment of society --that the office of the District Attorney should be advised of what is happening.

He said that they did not outspokenly threaten either he or the business, however, upon being denied the contribution and departing the office, the colored male was heard to say "We'll be back". MR. KEEFER advised us that he immediately dictated a letter to the District Attorney's Office, copy of which is attached. MR. KEEFER stated he would be willing to cooperate in any way to combat this situation and would notify this office of any future contacts. Photographs of current known Panthers and associates were shown to MR. KEEFER, however, he was unable to make a positive pick. These photos did include that of KENT FORD and SANDRA BRITT.

Sir: Writers were directed by Lt. Still to investigate the manner in which donations were being solicited from businesses in the Williams Avenue area by NM's for the childrens' breakfast program.

We contacted the manager of Grandma's Cookies, BILL WITTENBERG, of 7715 SW North Vale Way, 246-5236. MR WITTENBERG informed us that a couple of months ago, a young female Negro, he descs as approximately 20 yrs, 5-2, 110 lbs, dark long hair, attractive, came into his office with a subj he later identified from photographs as KENT FORD. The girl did all the talking and asked for help for the breakfast program for the Highland Center. The girl had a flyer-type pamphlet with crude printing on it, about 8 x 11 printed on newspaper-type paper. MR WITTENBERG took the girl's name and telephone number, wrote it on the flyer and told her that he would investigate and call her back regarding the donation. MR WITTENBERG stated there were no threats made; however, he did feel very uncomfortable while the people were in the office and was glad when they left. MR WITTENBERG has not heard from these people since that time.

We then talked to a RONALD J. HENNE, 4618 NE 30th Ave, 282-5806, White, 30 yrs, employed at Grandma's Cookies. MR HENNE advises that about two days prior to the fire at Grandma's Cookies, he (HENNE), and DEBBIE WRIGHT, WF, of 605 S. Tampa Way, Vancouver, Wash, were in the Grandma's Cookie lunchroom. Reference was made to the recent fire at Allied Plating by MR HENNE, and at that time, DEBBIE WRIGHT said the fact remains that Grandma's Cookies are still on the list. HENNE did not question WRIGHT regarding her statement. He stated she did not appear to be mad, she only made the statement as a matter of fact. WRIGHT is employed at Grandma's Cookies on the evening shift and is of often observed being picked up by colored subjs and receives several telephone calls from people with a Negro accent.

While at the Grandma's Cookies, we received information from MR WITTEN-BERG regarding a underground newspaper from Seattle, Wash. This paper is published by the University of Washington and in the editorial last Thursday, made reference to the Grandma Cookie sign in Seattle. This is a large sign about 50' long and 20' high. The editorial in the paper stated Who cares about Grandma and her fucking cookies? If GRANDMA'S COOKIES .....

they don't take that sign down, we will blow it down.

A copy of this paper is being sent to MR WITTENBERG in Portland, and he will turn it over to this department when it arrives. The name of the editor was not available at this time.

SIR: Received information that STEVE PETERSON was talking to an adult, and was informing him of different situations that were happening in the neighborhood. One of the situations in question was that the REDMOND (sp?) k boys, (known to PPD one under indictment on a charge now ) had a stolen motor in his veh, and that the serial number and etc was eradicated to prevent identification. He also went into some of the tos other activities of REDIMANS (?) and himself.

Some of these are known to the writing officer to a be true, and it a is unknown how the informant would receive this information unless STEVEN or one of his friends had told him. It seemed a little too factual for someone else to mention it rather than STEVEN, so naturally formed the opinion that the informant is reliable in this situation, but on prior occasions has shown that he has a semi-radical type nature.

The informant stated that STEVEN was at his house, and informed him of some of the activities that he had been involved in, including BID, and some of the activities of other youngsters in the neighborhood. It xz could not be substantiated whether his younger brother ROBERT was with him on the arson situations or not, but the following story was related to the writing officer.

STEVEN PETERSON was at the anonymous informants house approx 1 wk ago, and he did inform the informant during casual conversation that he was paid to set fire to two businesses by the owners of those businesses. He did set another fire, but that was for fun, and he related the story to Reed College. He did not frown?on this and ??? commit himself to the informant that he was the one that set fires at Reed College that he leaned in that direction.

The informant also told me that the PETERSON boy explained how he was setting the fires, and he told him that he was using **xk** a quick fuse and some newspaper and other waste type materials. He did not use a highly inflammable material, due to the fact that he thought that the investigators could spot this.

The PETERSON boys have been known to the writing officer for a considerable length of time now, and have suspicioned that they have been involved in considerable amount of activity, including the activity around Reed College. It is unkn though, whether they have been involved in any arson there.

The REEX Records for the STEVEN PETERSON, the older of the two boys, stands as the following: 12-8-69 trespass, 12-2-69 Protective custody, trespass, 8-16-68 BID, 3-11-69 BNID, 10-2-67 BNID, 12-31-66 vandalism.

The younger brother ROBERT's Record stands as 8-16-68 BID, 4-16-68 69 Assault, 5-16-69 assault, 19x2x 10-12-67 BNID, 7-12-67 disorderly conduct.

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Sir: While at the scene of an accident was contacted by a person who stated in substance that the bartender at the Kenton Club, 2025 N. Kilpatrick, wished to see me when I finished. Upon finishing with the accident however I was contacted by another subject who lived at 2035 N. Kilpatrick stating that there were two dogs chained up behind that building and he was unable to get in to his apartment. After completing this call I went to the Kenton Club and made contact with Mr. ED MEADOR, dob 4/1/02, 6034 N. E. 17th, AT 2-3795. Made contact with him at 5:55 p.m. date.

Mr. MEADOR informed me that he had received a telephone call at approx. 4:45 pm. from a woman who appeared to be negro who asked for a JOHN MARS. Mr. MEADOR said that there was no one there by that name and then the woman said that this man was a "nigger" and x "you would have to see him there". Mr. MEADOR said no again and she stated in substance to Mr. MEADOR "We'll get you you white mother fuckers". Mr. MEADOR stated that he told her that he was a negro too and she said "That's all right we'll get you too you mother fucker".

Mr. MEADOR stated that approximately five minutes earlier at 4:50 p.m. a man called and said he was a Black Panther from the Black Panther headquarters and further stated "We're going to blow you out of there you mother was fuckers" and then hung up.

The officer taking the information cleared from radio and was given a 12-2 auto accident at N. Fessenden and N. Oswego and km at that time I requested to meet a North precinct sergeant at that location.

Upon arrival at the location of the accident I contacted Sgt. James T. Davis of A Relief North precinct and relayed the information to him that I had obtained. Sgt. Davis then took the investigation of this complaint and made contact with the proper authorities regarding the threat.

ENFORCE The LAW Cops an initial to enforce the laws. Some laws. Cops are hired to prevent crimes. Some crimes.

You never saw a cop run into a store and arrest the owner for charging high prices. You never saw a cop beat landlord over the head for raising your rent \$20.



The same people who make the laws, hire the cops. The last time you hired a cop was the last time you made a law. And that was never. If you made the laws, you'd obey them. And you wouldn't worry about the cops.



But you <u>are</u> worried about the cops. They stand around your school, if you go to school, or on the block, if you don't. If you work and go on strike, they hang around the picket line as guards for the management. If you don't like the war in Vietnam and demonstrate against it, they often beat your head. Hard, any of us like cops. They enforce ... ws we don't like, which were made by rich people who don't like us, because we don't think that some people should be rich off the sweat of other people's backs.

One of the laws we don't like is the law that turns us into cops--the draft law. As far as the Vietnamese are concerned that's just what American GI's are--cops. The Vietnamese have been fighting for hundreds of years, against the Chinese, the French, the Japanese, and the Americans, for one basic thing--the right to make their own laws.



The rich people in America--the same fat dudes who make the laws about what goes on in school and where you can picket or strike and how and when, don't want the Vietnamese to make up their own laws. They know that the Vietnamese would pass laws saying that American businessmen and their armies had to get the hell out of Vietnam and stop trying to turn their country into a little American suburb.



And when they do kick America out, Vietnamese cops will be a lot different from ours. Maybe the Vietnamese won't have any cops. They won't have a small bunch of armed men messing over a lot of others. The people's police force will be the whole Vietnamese people.

There is a saying that "Political power grows out of the barrel of a gun." Think about it and you'll see that it's true. The only thing that's allowed American businessmen to mess over the Vietnamese for so long is the U.S. Army with all its guns.

It's the same back home. Rich people run this country. They buy politicians and cops. Their politicians pass laws that run our lives and their cops make sure we obey them.

You can't get into office if you don't have millions of dollars or the backing of people with millions of dollars. The people who get elected don't owe a thing to ordinary people. The political debts they owe are debts to the businessmen who paid for their newspaper ads and TV time and the plane trips around the country--the \$1000-a-plate people.

### Panther fund-raising methods reflect a split personality

WASHINGTON — The Black Panther party, its treasury no longer filled by conscience-stricken white liberals, is now turning to two dramatically different fund-raising techniques, the bigtime college lecture circuit and a swelling campaign of burglaries by the party's new underground organization.

Although Black P an the r leaders have publicly denounced criminal activity, Panther-Watchers are convinced of the party's recidivism toward its former policy of "expropriating" funds through burglary in the old Bolshevik tradition. The new Panther

Nor is this mere rhetoric. Panther lawlessness has been rising, both in attacks on police and with the Panther underground resorting to crime to support its financial requirements. In the past four months, party members have been arrested and charged with 15 separate robberies and burglaries across the country—in Charlotte, N.C., Cleveland, Memphis, Buffalo, Winston-Salem, N.C., Dallas, Philadelphia, San Francisco, Seattle and Toledo.

But those 15 occasions may only be the tip of the iceberg. Nobody knows how many Panther crimes in the same period have not resulted in arrests or how many other arrested suspects are in fact convert Panthers. That's because the Panthers, since Newton's release from prison six months ago, have been perfecting an underground organization functioning in isolated units of two's and three's.

In sharp counterpoint to this is Newton's new plan to cash in on the lucrative college lecture circuit after an unsuccessful tour last fall. Arrangements for the new tour are being handled by a new Back Panther Front, incorporated under New York law in September as Stronghold Consolidated Productions, Inc. Thus, a university can write a check for a Newton lecture to a seemingly respectable front without the onus of a cancelled check transferring student activity funds to the Black Panthers.

While in overall command of these underground activities, Panther leader Huey P. Newton is also launching a new lecture tour aimed at radical white students at prestigious colleges and universities. The Panthers, not very impressive in organizing such activities, have taken on an old-Jine Communist with experience in student-organizing to run Newton's tour.

These two wildly opposed methods of fund-raising reflect the two faces of Black Pantherism. Although at heart a revolutionary organization of 1,000 armed black militants with tremendous appeal among jobless and nihilistic Negro slum youth, the Panthers have always relied for support from wellmeaning but gullible white liberals, atrend that reached its peak late in 1969 , in the ludicrous session with Black Pan-

Stronghold Consolidated's corporate headquarters is the law firm of Lubell, Lubell, Fine and Schaap at 103 Park Ave., New York. Running the show is lawyer David G. Lubell, identified in sworn 1958 congressional testimony as a Communist Party organizer at Boston area colleges and since then active in the National Lawyers Guild, often cited as a Communist front.

The present road show that Lubell is trying to book does not come cheap: A standard lecture fee for Newton of \$2,-500 plus expenses for Newton and two Black Panther traveling companions, David Hilliard and Connie Matthews.

Apart from a date at Cuyahoga Community College in Cleveland, Newton's winter bookings are predominantly at white eastern colleges: Princeton, Columbia, and Syracuse. In addition, he will engage in a discussion early next month at Yale, where he also hopes to land a lecture. Surprisingly, Newton's ersatz Marxism and incoherent delivery in last fall's lectures have not greatly diminished his popularity on fashionable college campuses.

Yet, the \$2,500 lecture fee amid the halls of ivy looks like the last vestige of the radical chic phenomenon which brightly blazed until the Leonard Bernstein affair. The lecture tour, therefore, may be only a temporary expedient. The future of the Panthers lies in its new underground organization in the inner city, where fund-raising is conducted through the barrel of a gun.

# Come See About Albert

Albert Williams is Black - a 19 year old man charged with "Assault with Intent to Kill". His trial starts Tuesday, June 30, 1970 at 9:30 a.m. in the Multhomah County Courthouse. Albert Williams' plight and the events leading up to it, are the most recent in the on-going, ever escalating crisis between the Black community and the police force of Portland.



Last Feb. 18, Mr. Williams was standing outside the Elack Panther Party. headquarters in Albina when a police cruiser pulled up. The police, Stan Harmon and another officer, claim they recognized Mr. Williams and knew that a warrent was out for his arrest on a charge of "petty larceny" (the only warrent ever produced by the police was dated after Feb. 18th.) Mr. Williams went into the office and the police followed. What then happened is unclear. The police claim Mr. Williams fired at them with a rifle. Other witnesses claim his hands were in the air (in a sign of surrender) and he had no weapon when Officer Harmon shot him twice.

Why did this happen? Why does the Black Fanther Party exist? Why is there greater and greater hostility between every police force and every Elack community in this nation?

In the City of Fortland, 5% of the population is Black, while only .8% (6 out of more than 700) of the police are Black. There are even fewer people of other racial origins. Who says racism isn't a problem in Portland?

#### COME SEE ABOUT ALBERT ....

For white kids, police bassles are a drag. They search our cars without a warrant on Friday and Faturday nights if it looks like we're having fun. They "clean-up" the parks for Ivancie, the guy who makes it hapen--to us! Sometimes, when we actually disturb the machinery that they use to keep us in line, like we did at FSU and at the Induction Center, they come down border and smash our heads.

For blacks, the police are a much more serious problem. Usen the police are patrolling Albina, they are an occupying army and behave as such. There is vary little love lost between City Hell and the black community. The police in Albina know that they have the support of Schrunk and Ivancie when they behave like racist animals. Lest summer, at the start of the Rose Festival the higher ups in the city decided that a show of force was necessary in the chetto. And there was a riot, a police riot.

The police drove around Albinc, arresting hundreds of young blacks. They brandiched chatguns, called blacks by racist slurs that don't bear repetition, and tried to frame Black Panther Kent Ford on a charge of "riot."

The trial tack place in February. The police, among them Clyde Harmon, lied blatantly, contradicting themselves so often that even an allwhite jury couldn't bring down a conviction. The police ware enraged at this failure of "law and order." They immediately stepped up harrassment of the black community. A week later, Stan Harmon, brother of Clyde, broke into the Panther office and shot 19 year old Albert Williams twice, and seriously endangers: his life by delaying his modical treatment.

In typical police sigle, they turned the truth around and charged Albert with assault with intent to kill. The actual facts will come out at the trial. Come and hear the story for yourself, see what kind of "justice" is dispensed to blacks and young people in Portland courts. There will be a demonstration on the day Albert's trial opens, Tuesday June 30th. People are gathering at noon in the park across from the Multhomah County Courthouse (SW 4th 2 Hain). People chould also try to go to the sessions of Albert's trial, every day starting at about 9:30 am. When the police come down on any of us, black or whith, we have to react as if they had attacked us all. Demand Freedom for Albert Williams and for all political prisoners!!

It is well known that because of employment and housing discrimination, and racism in education, Black people are poorer, have fewer jobs, worse jobs, lower paying jobs, own a comprepenty and are concentrated in one section of the city - Albina. In Albina, the property - both residential and commercial - is mostly owned by whites who don't live there. This property is maintained to extract the greatest profit at the lowest cost.

. In this property oriented society, one of the prime functions of the police is to protect property even over life. During civil disorders, police are authorized to shoot people for stealing 6 packs of beer and cartons of cigarottes.

Finally every survey of police attitudes indicates a high degree of prejudice, fear, and hostility towards people of color.

The reasons are obvious - incidents such as the one involving Albert Williams and the police occur because white police with racist attitudes have been brutalizing Black people in defense of white property, white laws and white values all his life and long before. He has no reason to believe "the policeman is his friend". He has no reason to believe he would be treated fairly by unite courts with juries made up of white people who have never been to Albina. Black people are more likely to be convicted, more likely to receive prison sentences, and receive longer sentences that Whites charged with the same crime. The poorer White people are, the more they get treated like Flack people.

White America (White Portland) cannot expect to use white police with racist attitudes to enforce White laws and protect White property against Elack people without causing trouble and violence. Slavery, lynchings, Medgar Evers, Martin Luther King, Fred Hampton, the 2 students in Jackson, the 6 people in Augusta, and Albert Williams are part of our history and society. How much longer will Whites be foolish enough to allow this dehumanization and violence against people of color to continue?

Much of what is true for Blacks is true in less degree for White youth and women. They are not respected, believed not capable of making decisions for themselves and powerloss. The Chicago Conspiracy Trial, the Kent State 4 and the police riot at the Park Blocks indicate that White power and police will lashout just as violently to any threat or attempt at change. The history of workers being brutalized in strikes also indicates this. (The police said after the Park Blocks brutality, "It's an unpleasant part of my duty, but I just follow orders." That's what the Nazis said at Nuremburg.)

Violence against Black people, young people, working men and women can only lead to greater resistance and rebellion.

### THE CASE

Last February, Sgt. Stanley Harmon shot and seriously 19 year old Albert Williams at the Black Panther Party Headquarters, 3619 N.E. Union. Harmon was officially seeking Williams on a two-month old warrant for petty larceny.

#### These are the details:

When Williams entered Black Panther Headquarters, Police Inforcements were called to surround the building. Williams was inside on a balcony with a rifle. Friends persuaded him to put the rifle down. Eyewitnesses have testified that Sgt. Harmon jumped up on a desk and shot Williams as Williams set the rifle down. Williams was shot through the arm and liver. When he was hit, the rifle discharged and the bullet hit the ceiling. Witnesses heard Harmon shout, "I got him! I finally got him!"

Instead of being taken to Emmanuel Hospital, a few blocks away, Williams was driven in the backseat of the squad car to Portland Adventist Hospital on 60th at Belmont. They refused to treat him and he was eventually taken to Multnomah County Hospital where he remained on the critical list for four days. He was charged with assult with intent to kill Harmon!

years the black community has attempted to have Harmon transferred to another precinct because of his persistent brutality towards black people. Instead, Harmon has been promoted to detective duty in the black community.

The evidence clearly shows that Albert Williams is innocent of the charge. The charges should be dropped and punitive action taken against Harmon. The evidence also clearly shows that the attack on Albert Williams in the Panther Office is not just an isolated incident

### INTIMIDATION

When United States Attorney Poole of San Francisco was fired, he observed that a national conspiracy does exist – a systematic program to "get" the Black Panther Party and its supporters.

National leaders of the BPP have been murdered (Fred Hampton in Chicago, Carl Hampton in Houston), held a year without trial (New York 21), railroaded into prison (Bobby Seale, Huey Newton), and driven into exile (Eldridge Cleaver). Party offices throughout the nation have been shot-up, children attending the breakfast program have been arrested, medical clinics have been attacked.

Why is there a systematic attack on the Black Panther Party? The Panthers have been a leading force in the black community for economic, political and social change. Through boycotts and education, they have shown the black community that the wealth it creates leaves the black community in the hands of white business. They have shown by example how black people can begin to build institutions that serve people rather than exploit them. They are pointing the way to freedom and they are pointing out those who stand in the way. The Black Panther Party is intolerable to those who have an interest in keeping the black community oppressed. The centers of economic power are also the centers of political decision making. And this is where the police and the courts come in: their version of "justice" means intimidation and oppression. Even if Albert Williams is aquitted, he has already spent eight months in prison. This mockery of law won't end until blacks and whites insist that they won't sit back and watch it happen.

### Panther Leader Tells of Group Goals

By Bill Hedlund

The following is an edited and much shortened transcription from a tape recorded interview with <u>Kent Ford</u>, chairman of the Portland chapter of the <u>Black Panther Party</u>.

The Bridge: What position do the Panthers take in regard to black studies in the universities?

Ford: Black studies? It is a bourgeois cop out, its just what you said, black "studies." It doesn't integrate you into the world at all. You can know all the facts and all the history about the people but that still does not do you any good because you still don't have your freedom.

The Bridge: What lines of education do you feel are more relevent?

Ford: Education along the Marxism-Lenninism line of socialism. In other words, teach people to be individuals, to live together, work together to build for the betterment of humanity;

not the advancement of some corporation.

The Bridge: Is a coalition between students and the black community desirable to you?

Ford: Of course not. The students from the black community go to the white middle class universities, bourgeois universities, to get integrated with the system. We look at them as foreign exchange students. They go there and learn skills, then go back into the white community to work for corporations and never come back to serve their own community.

The Bridge: How about a coalition with students in general?

Ford: I would agree to a coalition between students to a coalition between students and the Black Panther Party. If they really want to come into the community and do something meaningful, learn how to get down and work with the people, come to us and we'll show them. You see the thing is they go down there and theorize about what's going on in the black community.

This is what black studies teaches them; when in reality they come from bourgeois families in the first place and go to school to stay in the bourgeois class.

- The Bridge: Do you anticipate any involvement on the part of the Panthers at either the convention in San Diego or Miami? Ford: Not at this time. In the first place the Republican and Democratic parties are just a matter of the most racist and least racist,' and that's what your voting for. The Bridge: What is the

single most important problem facing the Black Panther Party?

Ford: Well the single most important problem facing us is in reality the problem facing black people. The problem of sicle cell anemia. How to treat this disease. We have the problem of income; jobs, unemployment. Political problems. You see you cannot really isolate these things. You cannot deal with them separately. Another thing is the poverty program. The people don't really get a chance to run these programs. These are problems facing the grass roots people too. You see these poverty programs, all they do is create jobs for good-will Negroes, and that's all they do. And Nixon knows this! The people he puts in charge of these programs, all they do is hire their friends. It's the black bourgeois that administer these programs, not those who are closest to the problems.

The Bridge: What problems do you encounter recruiting members into the Panthers, from the black community?

Ford: That segment of the black community turned off by the Panthers are really those who want to integrate into the white community. The ruling class is never really going to let them integrate at all, they are going to use them against us. In reality we are not a mass membership organization. We are a small elite group. We don't go around looking for members, or go around handing out membership cards.

The Bridge: What do you feel whites can do to genuinely help the social-economic situation in the black community?

Ford: Until capitalism is ended, white people cannot really do very much for us. That is the white ruling class.

The Bridge: What are your feelings regarding the hostilities shown Penny Jackson when she spoke at the Sylvania campus? Ford: Well that's a long story. but I figure this way; Penny was invited out there she didn't ask to come. She was a guestspeaker and those dudes should not have tried to change her while she was speaking. She is a sister who has lost two brothers to the revolution, I think she is entitled to respect for that aside from being invited there in the first place.

The Bridge: There was a much different reception for her at the Cascade campus. Do you feel PCC is a segregated school? Ford: Of course. In the first place do you see where they built that college? What they did in our community was convert an old gymnasium for us to go to school in. Why I know dudes who run out of gas trying to get to that Sylvania campus. A black man is nothing but a continued on page 3

Continued From Page 2 foreign exchange student anyway, trying to come out with white middle class values, that's all. The Bridge: What are some specific proposals the Panthers have to improve relations between the black and white communities here in Portland. Ford: I would like to see the people downtown stop-trying to make a political thing out of everyting. I'd like to see them really come down to the community level, let those people that are really in tune with the needs of the people run the poverty programs so that they are meaningful for the people they should be serving. So we won't have winces walking the streets and brothers going to jail. because they ripped something off just in order to live because they could not get a job. That Metropolitan Steering Committee, I'd like to see closed down. I'd like to see everybody over their fired, and kicked out. They've turned into what you would call a clan, into a "godfather" 'type thing. Everybody's looking out for PSMSCs own intrests, that's all it is, it's just like on big syndicate over there. Same way with model cities, you have the major and his Negroes getting together, I'd like to see this investigated. I'd like to see this money put into the community. I would like to see the police disarm themselves in the black community. We should have our own precinct. I am not saying we should run it but it should be in our own area. I'd like to see better judges downtown, judges that really understand the black community and

our socio-economic problems; judges that stick a black person with the same sentence they would a white person instead of twice the amount of time. Where were the people from police community relations when Cheryl James was taken in? At nearly any given time you can go to the pool hall and see two or three of them in there shooting pool. We'd like to have adequate

medical facilities, aligned with the needs of the people. Ones that treat you like...human beings. We'd like a hospital over here that would treat you because you were sick, not because you could pay for it.

The Bridge: The Panthers sponsor a free medical and free dental clinic in addition to a free breakfast progam. Have you received any hassles from the city, over these programs?

Ford: Yes, they tried to close us down, on the matter of collecting donations. The first time we applied for a permit they sent back word that I was untrustworthy and not of good character, so they denied the permit. We took it to court and finally got the permit. You see, they thought we wanted these donations to buy guns and ammunition to wage war. In reality all we want are facilities that serve poor people, black and white facilities as adequate as those the white ruling class has made for themselves. When they start closing down our clinics, that's when we make our move. The Bridge: What is your average in donations per month?

Ford: Just enough to pay the utilities. Some times the lights get turned off. Man, we're just trying to survive, that's all.

"Its About Time" sponsors a "Books Behind Bars" program which sends reading materials to prisoners across the U.S. We also have an extensive archive that includes BPP newspapers, photos, buttons, posters, videos and other materials. The committee also sponsors community video and film showings and other public events and is part of the National Coalition to Free the Angola 3.

"It's About Time" hosted the 35<sup>th</sup> year Anniversary and Reunion of the BPP, a conference on political prisoners, in Washington DC in April, 2002.
