

Request for City Council Approval

In November 2002, Portland voters approved the Portland Children's Levy (PCL). The Levy was most recently renewed by voters in May 2018 for an additional five years (2019 – 2024). The Levy generates approximately \$18-20 million annually for programs benefitting Portland children in early childhood, after-school, mentoring, child abuse prevention and intervention, foster care and hunger relief. Administrative costs for the fund are capped at 5% of revenues and the fund obtains annual audits to assure compliance with the administrative cap. A copy of the 2018 ballot language for the Children's Levy is attached as "Exhibit A: Children's Levy 2018 Ballot Language."

An Allocation Committee governs the PCL and grants funds to programs serving children and families residing in the City of Portland. The Allocation Committee is comprised of a member of City Council (Mayor Wheeler), a County Commissioner (Jessica Vega Pederson), a representative of the business community (Mitch Hornecker), a citizen member appointed by the County Board (Felicia Tripp Folsom), and a citizen member appointed by the City Council (Julie S. Young).

Current PCL grants will expire on June 30, 2019. The Allocation Committee decided to consider renewal of current grants for an additional year (FY 2019-20) to allow for a longer planning process prior to starting a competitive grant round typically conducted after the voters have renewed the Levy. The extended planning process includes a qualitative study conducted by Portland State University to recommend grantmaking process improvements, and an extended period for community engagement around needs of children and families and preferred solutions. The Allocation Committee considered renewal for current grantees at their March 2019 meeting. PCL is now seeking City Council approval of these grant renewals.

The Allocation Committee considered grant renewal using the following performance information:

- Performance of grantee on PCL accountability metrics (service goals, client participation data including early exits, minimum dosage and data disaggregated by race/ethnicity, program outcomes, staff turnover); a template of the Performance Summary is attached to this memo as Exhibit B.
- Information provided in mid-year and annual written reports, along with information communicated in any meetings between grantees and PCL staff that provides further context for program implementation;
- Financial review including percentage of grant funds spent to date.

In March 2019, the Allocation Committee voted to award renewal funding \$18,969,819 for FY 2019-20 (July 1, 2019 – June 30, 2020); "Exhibit C: PCL Grant Renewals Approved by the Allocation Committee. Grants that were renewed included a cost-of-living adjustment of 3.9% to account for the effects of inflation in providing services.

The following two current grants were not renewed for an additional year due to performance concerns; these grants were initially funded in 2014 and renewed in 2017:

- 1. Bradley Angle House, Family Advocacy Project: not renewed due to failure to meet service goals and lack of stable leadership of the organization over several years.
- 2. Metropolitan Family Services, Home Visiting Program: not renewed due to failure to meet service goals.

The following three current grants were conditionally renewed as described below:

- 1. Self Enhancement Inc., Foster Care Program: grant was renewed for \$259,965 conditioned upon meeting service goal for number of foster youth served. Grant payments will pro-rated based on actual number of foster youth served.
- 2. Human Solutions, After-School Program for Family Shelter: grant was renewed conditioned upon family shelter securing a lease for ongoing operation of a shelter at a hotel site. Shelter site at time grant was made has closed due to weather damage to facility; Multnomah County is currently in the process of negotiating a lease for a hotel site.
- 3. The Pathfinder Network, Bounce Back After-School Program: grant was renewed conditioned on meeting annual service goals in 2018-19; performance in previous fiscal year was impacted by start-up issues and staff turnover.

PCL is requesting that City Council accept these recommendations of the Allocation Committee to fund the investments totaling \$18,969,815 as detailed in "Exhibit C: PCL Grant Renewals Approved by the Allocation Committee".

2018 BALLOT LANGUAGE FOR THE PORTLAND CHILDREN'S LEVY

CAPTION

Renew Portland Children's Levy for five years.

QUESTION

Shall Portland continue early childhood, child abuse programs; five-year levy \$0.4026 per \$1,000 assessed value beginning 2019?

This measure renews current local option taxes.

SUMMARY

Renews the Portland Children's Levy at current rate; supports proven programs preventing childhood hunger, preventing child abuse and neglect, helping children arrive at school ready to learn, providing safe constructive after-school alternatives for kids, and helping foster children succeed.

Funds can only be used for:

Preventing childhood hunger: giving hungry children healthy, nutritious meals and food.

Child abuse prevention and intervention: addressing juvenile crime, school failure, drug and alcohol abuse, homeless youth.

Early childhood programs: making childcare more affordable and preparing children for success in school.

After school, summer and mentoring programs: promoting academic achievement, reducing the number of juveniles victimized by crime, increasing graduation rates.

Children in foster care programs: helping foster children who have been abused and neglected succeed.

Accountability measures include:

- Investments subject to annual audits.
- Programs funded must be cost effective and have a proven record of success.
- Investments subject to oversight by a citizen committee.
- Administrative costs cannot exceed 5%.

It is estimated the levy will raise an average of \$23.68 million per year for five years.
