# **About National Register Nomination Reviews**

The Commission recommendation is neither a land use or a final decision. Commissioners must disclose potential conflicts of interest before each review.

Procedure for each National Register Reviews:

- Staff presentation
- Public comment, question, and answer
- Commission discussion and recommendation
- Assignment of Commission letter

Commission letters to be sent to State Advisory Committee on Historic Preservation by June 12 (SACHP hearing is June 19)

# A Note About the National Register **Listing Process**

The National Register of Historic Places is the Nation's official list of historic resources. The listing process is intended to evaluate the historic significance and physical integrity of nominated resources. The Historic Landmarks Commission is asked to provide comments on the following topics:

- Integrity
- Description
- Significance and context
- Facts and sources
- Supporting materials

Although Oregon law requires local governments to apply demolition protections to National Register resources, these regulations are not considered in the federal listing process.



1017 SW Washington Street

Nominated to the National Register as locally significant under criterion A for Community Development and C for Architecture under the MPD "Historic Resources in Downtown Portland, 1915-1931."

Commercial retail/office building

45,000 SF, 5 story, quarter-block unreinforced masonry, ~80 feet tall


Originally built 1906, redesigned in 1931 by local architect Richard Sundeleaf in Zig Zag Moderne style




421 SE 10th Avenue


Nominated to the National Register under criterion C for representing an International Style banking building with Northwest Regional style details

5,857 SF, 1 story, with H-shaped plan and prominent waved-shaped monitor


Exterior materials include wood siding, stucco, and scalloped aluminum screens

Constructed in 1962 and designed by local architects Reese & Blachly







Perspective rendering (1961)


Ground floor plan






1st Floor Plan




Mike and Katie Lasich Residence and garage contributing to historic district


