I sewed a new rip, she shared stories that brought back fond memories of my own mother."

Marie loves sewing and is delighted to be a volunteer sewer with Repair PDX, where she helps people continue using items they cherish, like a favorite purse or pair of jeans.

Repair PDX provides free

repair services to community members who bring in items they might otherwise throw away. From small appliances, to bike maintenance and mending services, Repair PDX not only offers participants a chance to fix things, it creates a space for connection and community.

Do you want to get rid of items that still have a little bounce left in their cushions? Good news! Portlanders are finding creative ways to get gently used items to people who want them. Plenty of free online tools and resources will help you find a new home for practically anything you want to toss.

Check out **www.portlandoregon.gov/bps/curbsider** for easy ways to donate to neighbors and organizations.

- Please don't leave items on the curb. They can get soaked by rain or damaged and quickly become trash.
- ★ Unusable bulky items such as appliances, furniture, large branches or stumps can be picked up for an extra charge. Contact your garbage and recycling company a week in advance for a cost estimate. www.garbagedayreminders.com
- ★ For discarded items abandoned in your neighborhood contact Metro's Regional Illegal Dumping (RID) Patrol at 503-234-3000. RID investigates and cleans up illegal dumps on public property, like curbs. They also offer tips, assistance and citations as appropriate. www.oregonmetro.gov/ridpatrol

BRIGHT TIME TO GO SOLAR

Homeowners can offset up to 80 percent of their initial investment in solar



INCLUDE

More than 8,000 homeowners across Oregon have installed a solar electric system with cash incentives from Energy Trust of Oregon. The cost of solar electric equipment has steadily decreased over the last several years. And the federal government recently extended the Investment Tax Credit (ITC), which returns 30 percent of the cost to install the solar energy system. With this combination of Energy Trust incentives and state/federal tax credits, Portland homeowners can offset up to 80 percent of their initial investment in rooftop solar.

THE FUTURE CENTRAL CITY *A great place to live, work and play*


From Goose Hollow to the Central Eastside and the Lloyd District to South Waterfront, Portland's city center is the heart of the region.

Nearly 30 years ago, community members, city planners, business owners and builders came together to create a blueprint for the Central City. Their thoughtful work shaped iconic community spaces such as Pioneer Square, Waterfront Park and the Transit Mall, and later laid the groundwork for the Pearl District and the Eastbank Esplanade.

The City is updating this blueprint to prepare for the next generation of big ideas for Portland's city center. We need to plan for twice as much housing and 50 percent more jobs than we have today. As part of the 20-year Comprehensive Plan Update, the Central City 2035 Plan will result in more vibrant urban neighborhoods; expanded office, industrial and manufacturing spaces; walkable shopping districts; easier access to the Willamette River; and healthier ways to get around the Central City.
