TIMBER JOEY of the Portland Timbers needs a whole lot of fuel to pump up Timbers supporters for the big games. Sawing through logs after every goal takes a lot of energy!

Though he doesn't use his chainsaw in the kitchen, he plans ahead for big game-day meals to eat heartily and avoid wasting food. Timber Joey collects food scraps to create nutrient-rich fertilizer that will benefit victory gardens across Portland and keep methane (a potent greenhouse gas) out of the landfill. Everyone living in a single-family home or smallplex (2-4 units) in Portland can add food scraps and yard debris to the green *Portland Composts!* roll cart for curbside collection.

HOW TO MAKE A GOAL FOR THE PLANET

- 1. **Set up the play!** Find any kitchen container and line it with newspaper, paper bags or approved compostable bags. These optional liners help keep it clean.
 - Sprinkle baking soda in it or rub vinegar on the inside of the lid to avoid odors and fruit flies.
- 2. **Trap your scraps!** Collect food scraps while preparing meals, scraping plates and cleaning out the refrigerator.
- **3. Goalll!** Empty your kitchen container, including the liner, into your green *Portland Composts!* roll cart as frequently as you like.
- **4. Red card!** Besides the five approved brands of compostable liners, leave out plastic products, even if they say "compostable." These belong in the garbage container.

When you need to replace materials, consider reclaimed or salvaged. They provide unique character, and often are stronger, more durable and higher quality — and may be less expensive than new materials.

DO YOU RENT A HOUSE OR SMALLPLEX?

Garbage, recycling and composting are part of your service.

The landlord is required to provide and pay for curbside collection service if you live in a rental house or smallplex of two to four units. Bills must be in the property owner's name and sent directly to them, not to the rental property address.

Garbage is collected every-other-week and the landlord must provide at least a 20-gallon garbage container per unit. Service includes weekly recycling and composting.

TEST FOR ASBESTOS

Metro transfer stations require documentation for all loads of construction, remodeling and demolition debris that might contain asbestos.

Asbestos has been used in a variety of building materials — like siding, ceiling and floor tiles, pipe insulation and plaster — for its strength and durability. When material containing asbestos is disturbed during remodeling or demolition, it is extremely hazardous. Small fibers are released into the air, and breathing them in increases the risks of lung disease and cancer. Direct contact with any amount should be avoided throughout your home remodel project, including in the disposal of any garbage or recycling.

To help you stay safe and avoid getting a load rejected at a Metro transfer station:

- 1. Use an accredited inspector to survey your project for materials that might contain asbestos.
- 2. Have any suspect materials tested by a laboratory.
- 3. Bring survey or test results with your load to a Metro transfer station. If you don't have the proper paperwork, your load will be turned away.

Metro's hazardous waste facilities accept — with proper documentation — a maximum of two 25-pound bags of asbestoscontaining material per day from residential customers. Material must be sealed in double, 6-millimeter plastic bags. All other garbage containing asbestos should be taken to the Hillsboro landfill.



*HOLIDAY SCHEDULE DETAILS NO COLLECTION DECEMBER 25 AND JANUARY 1. YOUR CURBSIDE COLLECTION WILL HAPPEN ONE DAY LATER THE WEEKS OF CHRISTMAS AND NEW YEAR'S DAY. FRIDAY COLLECTIONS WILL HAPPEN ON SATURDAY. ALL OTHER HOLIDAYS ARE REGULAR PICK-UP DAYS.

Reminder: Customers must contact their garbage and recycling company within two days of a missed collection. Additional charges will apply if materials are not curbside by 6 a.m. or if a return pick-up is needed due to improper preparation.

WORKING TOGETHER FOR A SMOOTH COLLECTION DAY!

Garbage, recycling and composting drivers work hard every day to collect materials from all over Portland. When setting out your roll carts, be mindful of their placement and location.



If space allows, this is the best way to place your roll carts:

- 1 Place carts away from obstacles like trees, cars, mailboxes, poles and basketball hoops.
- (2) Face the cart handle toward your home.
- (3) Place carts within 3 feet of the curb (required).
- 4 Leave up to 3 feet between carts to allow the truck's mechanical arm to operate more freely.

Don't forget to put away your roll carts after collection. We understand that space is limited for some customers. Your efforts to place carts using these guidelines whenever possible are appreciated!

GARBAGE BILLS ARE CHANGING

16 17 18 19 20 21 22 30 31 26 27 28 29 Every year the City of Portland sets residential recycling, composting and garbage collection rates based on a thorough evaluation of what it costs to provide these services to residents. Beginning this July, rates will increase slightly for Portland customers due to increased operating costs, including fuel.

Most customers will see an increase of 10 cents on their monthly bill or less than 1 percent for the 35-gallon garbage roll cart collected every other week. This is the first recycling, composting and garbage rate increase in five years, and rates are still lower than they were in 2012.
