Director's Update	Shannon Callahan gave updates on the following housing-related items: Council Items Six new IH projects Kymberly Horner appointment to PHAC State LIFT awards come out at the beginning of this week, Las Adelitas and Stark Street projects were awarded funds. PHB has been proceeding with predevelopment loans for many of the bureau's projects in the pipeline, with just a few experiencing some unusual issues related to financing. Would like the commission to serve in a capacity to advise and guide PHB through the next phase of the Inclusionary Housing analysis. Council is considering the CARES Act funding packages which is expected to go to Council next Wednesday. conversation around furloughs, staff's workload and ways to support staff during these times. 	 Shannon shared PHB's intent and approach for using HOME funds to support tenants. Answering Chair McCoy's question about Housing Bond dollars, Director Callahan shared that there are approximately \$34 million of Portland Housing Bond funds left, which are being held in reserves to make sure that projects are completed. For the Metro Housing Bond; PHB is in the process of finalizing the intergovernmental agreement with Metro (Local Implementation Strategy). Director Callahan invited Commissioners to participate in the recruitment process once the hiring freeze is lifted. Commissioner Weit asked for an update on the rent assistance vs hotel purchasing discussion. Director Callahan is sure that City Council will not be setting aside money for motel purchases, but that the bureau is looking at ways they can coordinate with the Joint office and/or other funding partners. Conversation around Home TBRA Funds. Discussion around acquisition of existing buildings to convert into affordable housing. 	
Staff Anouncements	 Commissioner Dike Dame has resigned effective immediately. Dory Van Bockel announced their presence at Council for some additional code by the Better Housing by Design implementation. Process for replacing Commissioner Dame not yet know. 	00:28:36 – 00:33:06
Open Discussion	 Commissioner Herrington announced he will not seek another term on PHAC once his current term comes to an end – another seat to fill for PHAC. Commissioner Linn would like PHAC to explore the idea of Inclusionary Housing for home ownership. Commissioner Weit proposed conducting exit interviews on those leaving PHAC. 	 Chair McCoy asked what "workforce" was being described as. Jill Chen will look at the raw data to see the breakdown by position. Commissioner Ledesma asked for data on building types, and whether there's any commonalities between building type and utilization rates. Jill Chen explained that it's a combination of timing, availability, and building type. Jill Chen gave the example of River Place Parcel 3 Project; they did a lot of outreach but they came in after all the certified firms had already been taken and the project was a highrise steel project, so a number of certified firms may not have been used to working on that type of project. Answering Commissioner Weit's question about pushing for new contractors to come in, Jill Chen shared that general contractors and developers suggest doing small and big packages in order to help support the DMWESB targets. Chair McCoy would like to work with Jill Chen on taking a closer look at the data, and the format in which to display the data to PHAC. 	
Portland Clean Energy Fund	 Sam Baraso gave PHAC a presentation on the Portland Clean Energy Fund, slides can be found here. Conversation around PCEF's Work Force and Equity Agreement, and contractor and workforce training. Commissioner Tripp asked about PCEF's application criteria and scoring, she pushed for application rebuilding to allow groups that have not been able to access these funds, to access them.
