



Dear Sir:-

Referring to the matter of Mrs. Summerville, the wife of a soldier, and Mrs. Babb, a waitress who has been rooming with her, will say that Mr. Lansing accompanied me in the auto, taking the two women back to their quarters at 16th & Yamhill. Mr. Lansing and myself interviewed the landlady, and we found it most difficult to impress either Mrs. Summerville or the landlady that they should not quarrel.

It was arranged that the women were to be allowed to stay there until the next day. Meantime we placed the attached ad in the Oregonian. We received several answers. and selected one that we thought was especially appropriate, notified Mrs. Summerville and asked her to go to see it. but she did not pay any attention to our request. We telephoned several times and I visited Mrs. Babb at her work at the Royal Bakery. Mrs. Babb meanwhile had separated herself from Mrs. Summerville, because Mrs. Summerville insisted upon having a more expensive apartment, while the other girl thought they should have a furnished housekeeping room.

We endeavored in every possible way to be of assistance to these young women. I then conferred with Mr. Lansing, and we both feel that everything has been done that it was possible to do to help them. Should they come back to the department again we will be glad to take the matter up and assist them in any way possible.


Your wire received, stating that the citizens of Portland were alarmed about the moral conditions in Charlotte and I can assure you that no greater surprise has come to me than the information that the moral conditions of Charlotte were anywhere reputed to be bad. When I called your telegram to the attention of Dr. Minor, Federal Health Officer, stationed here with the special duty of investigating and handling the moral conditions as they may effect the health of the soldiers, he promptly requested the privilege of answering your telegram and stated that Charlotte was the cleanest city morally that he knew of anywhere in the country.

How such a grossly erroneous impression should have gained currency in Portland, I am at a complete loss to understand, as our administration in cooperation with the Federal authorities has been constantly alert for the detection and suppression of laddness and immorality and it is the general comment throughout this entire section that Charlotte is handling the moral problems in the best and most efficient manner of any City its size and particularly of any camp City.

If upon receipt of Dr. Minor's message you or any of your citizens may still entertain any doubt as to the mor al conditions here, I urge that you wire General Jervey, Commanding Officer at Camp Greene, or Mr. Wheatley, Secretary of the Fosdick Commission or any Federal Officer at Camp Greene, who may be known to you of any of your citizens personally or by reputation.

In this connection, I want to take occasion to say to the people of Portland through you, that I have personally met many of the Portland boys and have had the privilege of entertaining several of them in my home and that they have made an exceptionally fine impression upon me and bur people generally. Their parents and kindred at home may be
