Portland City Council:

I am writing in support of the resolution on Citywide Disability Equity Goals. As the Age-Friendly City program manager in the Bureau of Planning and Sustainability, it is important to advance disability equity if we are to make Portland more age friendly. By furthering disability equity, we

can create a more just and equitable city for those of all ages, abilities, and for those from specific racial backgrounds.




Figure 1: ACS 2018 (5-Year data, disability by race: B18101)

Non-White Portlanders aged 16-64 experience a higher proportion of disabilities when compared with their White non-Hispanic peers (9.8% to 9.2%) and the discrepancy grows when considering the population aged 65 and older (36.2% to 29.3%; see Figure 1).

Since joining the City in December 2019, it has become clear that disability equity is integral to creating an age- and ability-friendly

Portland. Collaborative efforts to advance quality of life and well-being, as well as delivering essentials information and services for people of all abilities, are being carried out across City bureaus. Dear Portland City Councilors,
