NOTICE OF ADOPTION: River Plan / South Reach

This is to notify you that the Portland City Council recently adopted the River Plan / South Reach, which includes an updated vision for the area, comprehensive plan policy and map amendments, zoning code and map amendments, an action plan and natural and scenic resources protection plans. The Willamette Greenway Inventory was updated with the River Plan/South Reach. The adopting ordinance was passed by the City Council on December 16, 2020 and becomes effective on March 1, 2021.

Pursuant to ORS 197.615, the Notice of Adoption of a Post Acknowledgement Plan Amendment for the project was filed with the Oregon Department of Land Conservation and Development on January 4, 2021.

The City Council's decision is the final review process available through the City. You may appeal this decision to the Oregon Land Use Board of Appeals (LUBA) by filing a Notice of Intent to Appeal with LUBA within 21 days of the date this decision and adoption notice is mailed or otherwise submitted to parties entitled to notice under ORS 197.615, as specified in the Oregon Revised Statute (ORS) 197.830(9). Among other things, ORS 197.830 requires that a petitioner at LUBA must have appeared orally or in writing during the City's proceedings on this land review. You may call LUBA at 1-503-373-1265 or visit LUBA's website (www.oregon.gov/LUBA) for further information on filing an appeal.

Per ORS 197.830(9), copies of the notice of intent to appeal shall be served upon the City. The notice shall be served and filed in the form and manner prescribed by rule of the board and shall be accompanied by a filing fee of \$200 and a deposit for costs to be established by the board.

River Plan/South Reach updates the City's compliance with Goals 5 and 15 in the South Reach and Central City areas. This 20-year plan includes revised natural and scenic resources protection plans; a few changes to Comprehensive Plan policies and Comprehensive Plan Map and Zoning Map base zone changes to five sites to reflect current use and future goals. A key update is to replace the existing Greenway overlay zones in the South Reach with River overlay zones on the Zoning Map. The River Overlay Zones chapter of the Zoning Code includes

regulations and standards for the River General (g*), River Recreational (r*) and River Environmental (e) overlay zones. These regulations include an increased river setback, landscaping requirements, a residential dock standard, a limited retail allowance to serve recreation uses at three park sites, archaeological resources protections, increased tree replacement ratios, the establishment of a new riparian buffer area and updated standards for temporary structures in the river. All development activities that are not able to meet standards, or for which there are no standards, must be approved through River Review.

Revisions to the Scenic overlays in the Central City are also proposed as a part of the River Plan/South Reach. The Scenic overlay (s) zone is being added to some Central City properties and will include new requirements for viewpoint amenities, such as a bench or lighting, on certain zoning code mapped properties. Updates to the River Overlay Zones chapter that affect Central City properties include increased tree replacement ratios, updated floodplain requirements, and revised standards for landscaping and the placement of temporary structures in the river.

An update to the Willamette River Greenway Inventory is also included in the adopting ordinance. The Willamette River Greenway Inventory is a background existing conditions inventory that is periodically updated to continue compliance with Statewide Planning Goal 15. Updates included the addition of new zones from Bureau of Planning and Sustainability projects since the last update in 2014 and minor updates to codes used to identify historic resources. Updates that were a part of the River Plan / South Reach have also been incorporated.

NOTICE OF ADOPTED CHANGE – SUBMITTAL INSTRUCTIONS

1. A Notice of Adopted Change must be received by DLCD no later than 20 days after the ordinance(s) implementing the change has been signed by the public official designated by the jurisdiction to sign the approved ordinance(s) as provided in <u>ORS 197.615</u> and <u>OAR 660-018-0040</u>.

2. A Notice of Adopted Change must be submitted by a local government (city, county, or metropolitan service district). DLCD will not accept a Notice of Adopted Change submitted by an individual or private firm or organization.

3. **Hard-copy submittal:** When submitting a Notice of Adopted Change on paper, via the US Postal Service or hand-delivery, print a completed copy of this Form 2 on light green paper if available. Submit **one copy** of the proposed change, including this form and other required materials to:
