*Whereas*, Nearly two and a half million people worldwide and over 500,000 in the United

States have lost their lives due to COVID-19, and, in Multnomah County alone, more than 500 lives have been lost to this deadly virus; and

*Whereas*, Each life lost to COVID-19 has meaning and leaves a hole in the hearts of loved ones, family members, and surrounding community; and



Now, therefore, The City of Portland, in remembrance of those who have lost their lives and in

honor of those who are forever marked by COVID and continue to suffer from the impact of this virus, supports the designation of the first Monday in March as

COVID-19 Memorial Day
