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

What is the Consolidated Plan?

- Through the Consolidated Plan (often called the "Con Plan") agencies receiving funds from the federal Dept. of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) assess community needs and make strategic investment decisions
- ➤ The Plan period can be 3 to 5 years; The Con Plan 2021-25 is the Consortium's sixth five-year plan
- > The Plan "consolidates" four formula block grant programs
- > HUD provides specific guidance on contents for the plan through sections and questions.

ESG: Emergency Solutions Grants Program



Selected Findings from Needs & Market Analysis

Percentage of Extremely Low-Income Households in Multnomah County with Any of 4 Severe Housing Problems



- > There is not currently sufficient housing for all income levels
- ➤ Based on analysis using the 2013-2017 CHAS data, there is currently a housing shortage of affordable units in Multnomah County,
- > Extremely low-income renter households are particularly costburdened and in need of assisted housing

Action Plan "AP" FY 2021-22

Action Plan ("AP") is a yearly document that needs to be submitted to HUD. Since the Con Plan cover a 5-year period, there will be 5 associated APs. It details:

- How the allocated resources will be spent on various projects. Each of the projects are associated with one of the three Con Plan Goals
- Projects comprise of various "Activities"
- HUD upon of review and approval of the AP release the grant agreement
