Testimony to **Portland City Council** on the **Shelter to Housing Continuum Project**, **Recommended Draft**

We clearly need to do something to address the homeless problem in Portland. Our city is at a crisis point and has been for some time. Such a change will contribute to an additional sharp decline in Portland's livability. Parks are an important part of urban life. Some (not all) of the adhoc campsites that have sprung up all over our city are filled with trash and harbor drug use. We shouldn't turn our parks over to this too. They should be places where our kids can play safely. Our parks should be sanctuaries where friends and families can come together to enjoy a clean, safe environment. This zoning proposal is a well-intentioned but bad idea and should be removed from any legislation. Portland parks are a significant part of what makes Portland great.
