OBJECTIVES— what objectives does this package category meet or help to meet?

- 1. Provide a city-wide neighborhood-based crime prevention program.
- 2. Provide assistance for block organizing using neighborhood watch.
- 3. Provide training for volunteers for lock installation in non-HCD neighborhoods.
- 4. Provide special programs relating to personal safety such as self-defense classes for seniors, women, and children, victims assistance, and whistle alert.
- Facilitate and coordinate neighborhood and agency responses to special and crisis crime problems.
- 6. Facilitate police/community relations by informing citizens about police services and by working with Police Bureau personnel relating to citizen needs and projects.

PERFORMANCE INDICATORS—to be used in the Quarterly Allotments. 1. The establishment and full operation of the neighborhood crime prevention program by January 1, 1982. 2. The rest of the performance indicators will be developed for fiscal year 82-83 based on the programs and statistics gathered during the first year of operation of the program.

PACKAGE DESCRIPTION AND JUSTIFICATION (attach additional sheets as needed):

Describe the service(s) included in this package and justify it (them) in terms of objectives to be met, public need, legal requirements, revenue production, or other relevant factors. If other methods of delivering this service(s) were considered, please explain why this method was chosen.

This package provides for a city-wide neighborhood based crime prevention program. The expenditures for staffing and programming will be determined by a city-wide advisory task force appointed by Commissioner Charles Jordan. The composition of the task force will be based on the existing city-wide NAC Board to draw on the 3 years of accumulated knowledge and experience. Additional members will be appointed to achieve geographic representation. The mission of this task force will be two-fold:

- 1. To recommend to Commissioner Jordan the best possible use of the program dollars to achieve equity of outcome for neighborhood based crime prevention throughout the city;
- 2. To recommend to Commissioner Jordan the feasibility and structure for a city-wide neighborhood based crime prevention board to be continued for the duration of the program.

The 1980 neighborhood information profiles show that crime prevention is the single most important issue that neighborhoods should be involved in and that more people are more concerned about crime than they have been in the past.

PACKAGE DESCRIPTION AND JUSTIFICATION (continued)

Although this will be a new program for the City of Portland, Neighborhoods Against Crime has operated since 1978 as an independent program funded by L.E.A.A. and fiscally managed by the Center for Urban Education.

During this period of time, projects and programs have been developed which have proven to be highly successful in the community. Data collected during this period of time show the following:

- 1. There are currently 35 neighborhoods with existing crime prevention plans, with 8,448 people attending 768 meetings.
- 2. A city-wide public information plan has generated 27 television appearances, 36 radio appearances, and 111 newspaper articles.
- City-wide self-defense education has resulted in 1,320 people attending self-defense classes.
- 4. The neighborhood watch program is operating in 15 neighborhoods with 353 block volunteers and 3,177 participants.
- 5. To increase interaction between police and citizens, the crime prevention specialists have provided the following information to police about citizens:
 - 201 personal contacts, 441 phone calls, 162 letters, and have attended 123 meetings with the police, and 561 meetings with citizens,
 - and the following information to citizens about police:
 - 87 personal contacts, 189 phone calls and 17,163 letters.

The past three years of operation have given the neighborhood crime prevention program and the Police Bureau the opportunity to work together and to identify crime prevention programs and services most appropriately delivered by the Police Bureau as well as those projects which need to be neighborhood based.

Citizen assessment of their own crime problems and their own methods for solution is the single most factor which makes the program unique and different from the Crime Prevention Division of the Police Bureau. The Police Bureau provides general public education about crime prevention which is technical in nature and not necessarily related to the concerns of the neighborhood. See Attachment A.

BUREAU

Neighborhoods Against Crime is community based anti-crime programming which works in cooperation with the Crime Prevention Division's public education and technical assistance crime prevention programs. Listed below are examples of how this joint effort works:

NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH PROGRAM

POLICE/COMMUNITY RELATIONS

Neighborhoods Against Crime

Responds to citizen concerns, makes citizens aware about available police services, as well as police planning and methods in neighborhoods. Assists citizens in planning ways to effectively utilize police services in neighborhood. Provides information to the Police Bureau about citizen concerns. Facilitates meetings and discussions between police and community when necessary.

Crime Prevention Division

Provides NAC with information on police methods and planning in neighborhoods. Meets with community when necessary. Assists NAC in determining effective ways to utilize police services in neighborhoods.

NEIGHBORHOOD NETWORKING

Meighborhoods Against Crime

Provides workshops, information, materials, support and assistance to bring together unorganized groups in neighborhoods in order to work on crime prevention projects. Provides information to citizens on how to utilize other related services, i.e., ONA, Youth Service Centers, local community groups, etc.

Crime Prevention Division

Provides crime stats and public crime prevention awareness programs

PERSONAL SAFETY

Neighborhoods Against Crime

Informs community about personal safety resources, presents assistance in planning community safety programs, coordinates self-defense classes for children, elderly, gay people and women.

ORDINANCE NO. 151993

An Ordinance transferring appropriations from the General Fund and creating a limited term position for the purpose of establishing a Neighborhoods Against Crime unit in the Office of Neighborhood Associations and declaring an emergency.

The City of Portland ordains:

Section 1. The Council finds:

- 1. The Neighborhoods Against Crime project has been operating under an LEAA federal grant and administered by the Center for Urban Education since 1978.
- 2. The Neighborhoods Against Crime project lost its federal funding on June 30, 1981.
- 3. The project has been successful in organizing neighborhoods to prevent crime, and there is a need to continue these crime prevention activities.
- 4. In order to continue these activities, the responsibility for the Neighborhoods Against Crime project should be placed in the Office of Neighborhood Associations and contracted to the neighborhood associations' boards.
- 5. Additional appropriation authority of \$105,000 is required in the FY 81-82 Budget for the Office of Neighborhood Associations.
- 6. One limited term position of Community Specialist II is required to effectively assist in the management of the Neighborhoods Against Crime project.
- 7. The Bureau of Personnel Services has reviewed and concurs with this action.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Council directs:

- a. The establishment of a Neighborhoods Against Crime project in the Office of Neighborhood Associations effective July 1, 1981, to perform the activities detailed in Exhibit A.
- b. The FY 81-82 Budget of the City of Portland is hereby amended by transferring appropriations as follows, with line item detail as per Exhibit A.

- d. The hourly rate for this position shall be as specified in the Compensation Plan of the City of Portland.
- Section 2. The Council declares that an emergency exists because the actions described in Section 1 are necessary to ensure continuity of crime prevention activities to citizens; therefore, this Ordinance shall be in force and effect after its passage by the Council.
