GrantsService to our Community

RACC supports artists, arts organizations and arts businesses, through a variety of grant programs made possible through public investments including the City of Portland (\$1,485,585) and Arts Education & Access Fund (\$2,252,915).

Beyond our RACC programming, Grants and Finance teams supported **CARES Funding** for the City of Portland and the Oregon Arts Commission, the **Community Healing Initiative**, and individual donations to support artists including **Emergency Funding** and **Innovation Prize**.

An investment in Community

Portland's 2% for Art objective was created to prioritize placing art within underserved neighborhoods.

Met the goal of 75% of the projects in and with underserved neighborhoods and communities with the planning phase for **Errol Heights** (SE 45th and Harold) and **Mill Park** (SE 117 & Mill Court), several **Black Portland Matters Art & Placemaking Initiative** projects (SE 134, SE 78th, SE 122nd, and on NE Martin Luther King, Jr. Blvd.), and **Vanport Portable Works purchased** in the central city.

Humaira Abid, *The World is Beautiful and Dangerous Too*, purchased in 2020 for the Public Art Portable Works Collection with funding from the Vanport Building, Southwest Fifth Ave., Portland, OR.





CHANGE THE CONVERSATION After more than a one-year postponement, the Arts & Economic Prosperity 6 (AEP6) is underway nationally as of May. This is the sixth national economic impact study of America's nonprofit arts and cultural industry. It documents the economic contributions of the arts across diverse communities and regions throughout the country.



Previous Study AEP5

Locally, our arts industry generated \$687 million of economic activity—\$364 million in spending by arts and cultural organizations and an additional \$323 million in event-related expenditures by their audiences. This activity supported 22,299 full time equivalent jobs and generated \$53 million in revenue to local and state governments. Our local nonprofit arts and culture organizations have been and will continue to be critical to our economic recovery.



Partners

Previous partners have included local arts agencies, community foundations, economic development agencies, chambers of commerce, performing arts centers, and more.
