

Amendments approved

Volume 1

- Add action for SW Corridor Equity Coalition annual reporting to City Council
- Zone map amendment for 9703 and 9713-15 SW Capitol Hwy
- Reinstate 11-20 year timeframe for Luradel I-5 Overpass transportation project
- Technical amendments including
 - refinements to the Urban Design Framework
 - Add conditional use approval criteria for commercial parking
 - Corrections to Transportation Projects land Street Classifications Changes lists

Volume 2

- Design Commission recommended WPTC Character Statement
- Remove exterior finish materials and higher window percentage and add reflective roofing requirement in RM1 and RM2 Design Standards
- Add solar panels and reflective roof surfaces as option in the Urban Green Features requirements for Subdistrict A and B
- Remove required improvements in Subdistrict C deeper rear setback areas

Requested PSC Action

Staff recommends that the PSC take the following actions:

- Recommend that the Portland City Council
 - Adopt the West Portland Town Center Plan as amended
 - Amend Title 33, Zoning Code as shown in the amended Proposed Draft
 - Amend the Zoning Map and Comprehensive Plan Map as shown in Section 8, Volume 2
 - Amend the Community Design Guidelines to add the Design Commission revised West Portland Town Center Character Statement and the "A Guide to The Document" section
 - Adopt the WPTC Plan Report as further findings and legislative intent
- Direct staff to revise the staff report and code commentary to clarify proposals and findings, as necessary

Transmittal Letter

Highlight/underscore:

- Community voice in plan development and outreach and ongoing role.
- Importance of health and racial equity and climate resilience as foundational considerations.
- Need for new anti-displacement tools; intent and elements of Subdistrict D provisions
- Importance of next steps on infrastructure planning and coordination including funding of new BPS infrastructure coordination staff
- Need to continue to implement and fund the SW Corridor Equitable Housing Strategy, particularly around the issue of preservation of existing low-cost apartments.
