Plan Background

- State TGM Grant Sandy Blvd a state highway
- Context of residential displacement and lack of economic opportunity for BIPOC residents
- Community interest in going beyond transportation to address a range of community issues
- Use community-led approaches that center communities of color



Purpose of the Plan

- Community led-effort to address Parkrose issues:
 - Housing affordability and displacement
 - Access to jobs
 - Small business opportunities
 - Transportation safety
 - Community spaces and access to nature
 - Emergency preparedness
- Make clear to City what actions the community would like to see happen
- Resource for community advocacy, action, and partnership building

Zoning & Land Uses

- Half of area has employment/industrial zoning (8,500 jobs)
- Parkrose Neighborhood Center focused on Sandy Boulevard (broad area of commercial and multidwelling zoning).
- Rossi Farms large future development site (30 acres) to east of Parkrose Middle School.

Community Engagement

Led by Historic Parkrose



- Youth Workshops and houseless youth film screening
- Adult Workshops
- Community Working Groups separate groups for each plan topic
- Public Open Houses
- Community Decision Teams

Affordable Housing and Displacement



Issues

- Housing costs in Parkrose rising faster than Portland as a whole (up by 68 percent over the past 10 years)
- Renters having a hard time affording family-sized housing, creating family instability
- Parkrose losing many of its people of color (dropped from 43 to 35% over past 10 years)
- Nearly 9% of Parkrose High School students were houseless during the 2021-22 school year

Affordable Housing and Displacement



- Create more affordable housing options that meet people's needs, including family housing.
- All Parkrose residents should be able to choose to remain in their neighborhood in healthy housing they can afford.

Affordable Housing and Displacement



Plan Actions

- Work with affordable housing providers to build new affordable housing, including ownership housing
- Advocate for building affordable housing on vacant lots and near the Parkrose Transit Center
- Work with partners to **keep existing apartment** buildings affordable
- Include affordable family housing in new **development**, such as the Rossi Farms redevelopment
- Advocate for **regulations protecting renters**, especially renters of color
- Provide safe shelters for houseless people





Access to Jobs

Issues

- Median income in Parkrose is \$15,000 less than Portland as a whole, and median income for Black and Hispanic households are more than \$30,000 less
- Parkrose youth often don't know how to get started on pathways to jobs and careers
- There are many middle-wage jobs in the nearby Columbia Corridor employment district, but few Parkrose residents have jobs in this area







Access to Jobs

- Connect youth to training, jobs and careers that serve as pathways to prosperity.
- Connect Parkrose residents to nearby job opportunities in the Columbia Corridor and to pathways to middlewage employment.







Access to Jobs

Plan Actions

- Create a workforce development center, providing training and connections to jobs
- Work with community partners on connecting youth to job opportunities, such as through:
 - Internships, mentorship, career counseling, and job connections
 - Programs for youth interested in manufacturing, trades, and climate related jobs
- Connect adult residents to training and living wage employment opportunities, through partnerships with schools, colleges, and area businesses





Home-Based and Small Businesses

ssues

- Access to economic opportunity in Parkrose lags Portland as a whole, especially for people of color.
- Assistance often needed in starting and growing home-based businesses and other small businesses.
- Parkrose residents want the Historic Parkrose Main Street to be a thriving place with a diversity of local businesses.





Home-Based and Small Businesses

- Support Parkrose residents in starting and growing home-based businesses.
- Support a thriving Historic Parkrose **business district** that serves the area's diverse communities and provides opportunities for local businesses to grow.





Home-Based and Small Businesses

Plan Actions

- Provide services and resources for informal and formal home-based business owners in a diversity of languages
- Create **shared**, **affordable rental spaces** for multiple small business owners
- Support farmers markets, pop up marketplaces, a shared commercial kitchen for food entrepreneurs – minority-owned businesses should be a key part of these initiatives
- Support Historic Parkrose Main Street businesses through networking, promotion, and a small business resources hub

Sandy Boulevard Safety



Issues

- Sandy Boulevard has many businesses and other destinations, but has high amounts of traffic and few safe pedestrian crossings, discouraging people from walking
- Sandy is one of Portland's "High Crash Corridors", with more than 300 crashes reported over a recent five-year period. Many of the serious injuries involved people walking.

Sandy Boulevard Safety



- Make Sandy Boulevard a safe place to travel for all modes of transportation, with safe and convenient pedestrian crossings, improved intersections, better lighting, and other safety improvements.
- Help Sandy Boulevard evolve into a Civic **Corridor** by improving infrastructure to support businesses and other adjacent land uses and enhancing transit frequency, bus stop locations and amenities.

Sandy Boulevard Safety Plan Actions



- Add more signalized pedestrian crossings to make it easier to cross the street, such as near NE 106th (at Parkrose Hardware) and at NE 115th
- Improve dangerous intersections
- **Upgrade street lighting**
- Make it easier to get around by bus by improving transit service, bus stop locations and amenities



Neighborhood Transportation Needs

Issues

- Parkrose lacks sidewalks on most streets, has several high-traffic streets (such as 102nd, Prescott, and Fremont) and few bike facilities. This limits people's ability to feel safe walking or bicycling to local destinations.
- There are few trees along streets providing shade on hot summer days

Neighborhood Transportation Needs



- Make it safer and easier for people to walk or bicycle to community destinations
- Add trees and other green elements to streets to help reduce urban heat effects and improve the pedestrian environment



Neighborhood Transportation Needs Plan Actions

- Construct sidewalks and pedestrian crossings and improve lighting on busier streets, especially connections to schools, such as NE Shaver
- Add or improve bicycle routes on low-traffic streets to make it easier and safer to access places
- Include street trees and other green **features** as part of sidewalk improvements
- Improve transit, bicycle, and pedestrian connections to nearby employment areas north of Sandy Boulevard





Community Spaces and Access to Nature

Issues

- Half of Parkrose residents live more than a half mile from a public park
- The closest natural area is the Columbia **Slough**, but there are no public access points in the neighborhood
- Youth would like to have a community center or other safe community space where they can go after school, do homework, participate in activities, and get connected to job opportunities





Community Spaces and Access to Nature

- Create community places where people can recreate and gather close to where they live.
- Foster connections to nature through more trees and green elements and improving the Columbia Slough as a natural area that is accessible to the community.





Community Spaces and Access to Nature

Plan Actions

- Advocate for the creation of a new park and a community center for the Parkrose community
- Improve the Columbia Slough so that people can get to and use it and to improve habitat
- Create community gathering spaces in the Sandy Boulevard business district and as part of the Rossi Farms development
- Plant more trees and green elements along streets, and organize community cleanups in public spaces



Emergency Preparedness Issues

- The Parkrose neighborhood is bounded on three sides by freeways and the Columbia River with few connections through these barriers, potentially limiting access in a major disaster
- Many community members don't know what local emergency resources are available or how to access them
- Parkrose community members want to be ready for whatever emergency events may come, whether extreme heat or cold events, power outages, or a major earthquake



Emergency Preparedness

- Foster Parkrose as a resilient community that is prepared for extreme weather, earthquakes and other emergencies.
- Connect Parkrose community members to emergency information and resources, in ways that are accessible to people in a diversity of languages.



Emergency Preparedness Plan Actions

- Improve infrastructure for emergencies, including urgent care centers, fire station improvements, emergency information signs, cooling/warming shelters, and public power sources
- Develop emergency communication resources, such as an emergency preparedness plan, and support existing emergency services, such as the Argay-Parkrose NET team
- Plant trees and other urban greenery to reduce urban heat impacts
- Create a network that provides ongoing emotional support services for neighbors who have experienced trauma
