POLICE DEPARTMENT.

This department at this time consists of one chief, three captains, six detectives, three sergeants, one stenographic clerk, one lineman, two jailers, one matron, three patrol drivers, and sixty-three patrolmen.

Salaries: Chief, \$200 per month; captains, \$90 per month; detectives, \$90 per month; sergeants, stenographic clerk, jailers, patrol

drivers, and patrolmen, \$75 per month; lineman, \$80 per month; and matron, \$50 per month.

One detective is detailed for the Boys' and Girls' Aid Society and one patrolman for the Humane Society. Eight of the patrolmen are mounted.

The total expenses of the department for 1904 were \$92,664.69.

The total receipts, through the municipal court, were \$42,630.55.

The tax levy for the department for 1905 is \$88,200, which is insufficient to pay its expenses as now organized, and the deficiency, whatever it may be, must be made up out of the general fund. It would be just to increase the pay of the police if there were funds for that purpose.

The business of the department last year was large, as compared with preceding years:

The chief of the department recommends that ten patrolmen be added at once to the present force, and fifty more during the 1905 Fair. The police force is wholly inadequate to meet the wants of our city, with a territory of forty square miles and 150,000 of population. I recommend that the police force be increased as rapidly as the finances of the city will permit.

The jail has been renovated and changed from a dingy, filthy and unsanitary to a wholesome, well-ventilated and well-lighted condition. Most of this has been done by prisoners under the supervision of the chief, as architect and superintendent of the work. Some additional improvements are being made in the matron's department, which will cost about \$3000.00. These improvements enlarge the capacity of the jail considerably, and make it sufficient, it is thought, for some time to come.

The chief has adopted the policy of sending hobos and vagrants who are picked up on our streets and are not charged with any specific crime, out of the city, a policy which I approve, not only because in that way we get rid of an undesirable class of persons, but save a large expense to the city in providing for them as prisoners.

I have lived in this city more than forty years, and have been an interested observer of what was going on during that time, and I do

not hesitate to say that Portland at this time has the best organized, best disciplined and most efficient police force that it has ever had. There is now no grafting in the police department.

FIRE DEPARTMENT.

There are now in this department eight engine companies, four truck companies, four hose companies, four chemical engine companies, with sixty-nine horses and one fire boat.

The personnel of the department is as follows: One chief engineer, one assistant chief engineer, two battalion chiefs, one superintendent of the fire alarm telegraph, one relief engineer, one hydrantman, one supply driver, one switchboard operator, twenty-one captains, seventeen lieutenants, ten engineers, twenty-eight drivers, forty-four hosemen, twenty-two laddermen, one master on fire boat, one pilot on fire boat, two pipemen, and two stokers—158 in all.

Salaries: Chief, \$166.16; assistant and battalion chiefs, \$110 per month; engineers, \$100 per month; captains, \$70 per month; others, \$65 per month. The monthly payroll amounts to \$11,071.66.

The total expenses of the department for 1904 were \$170,541.57.

The running expenses will necessarily be larger in 1905 on account of a change in the department and the use of a fire boat. The tax levy for this department for 1905 amounts to \$110,250. It will take at least \$50,000 more to defray its expenses for 1905, which must be made up out of the general fund.

Within the last year this department has been changed from a call to a full paid department. Within the same time the fire boat has been constructed and put in commission, which is a good success and a great protection to property along the river front.

There is great need of an engine company in North Portland, in South Portland and in the Brooklyn district.

There have been added to the service in this department within the last year, besides the change to a full paid department, 1 fire boat, 8,000 feet of hose, 1 extra-size metropolitan fire engine, 1 fourth-class Amoskeag engine, 1 combination hose and chemical wagon, 150 new hydrants, 10 new alarm boxes, 25 keyless doors for fire alarm boxes, 10 horses, house and dock for fire boat and erew costing \$10,000, house and lot for Engine Company No. 9 costing \$3,000, repairs to houses of department costing \$6,000, and 3 new hose wagons.

There were 430 fire alarms in 1903, and the losses were \$912,753.73.

There were 511 fire alarms in 1904, and the losses were about \$260,000.

I cannot speak too highly of the efficiency of the officers and men of the fire department.

The records of the board which has charge of the operation, maintenance and extension of the water works of the city show as follows:

This balance will be available for paying for pipes for extending mains, already contracted for and partly delivered, and for other construction purposes.

The apportionment of the above \$449,648.70, received for water sold during the year 1904, is as follows: 12 per cent. for operation and repairs, 31-3 per cent. for meters, 581-3 per cent. for extending mains and reservoirs, and 261-3 per cent. on account of interest on the water honds.

There is no tax on property for water purposes. All cost operating, maintaining and extending the water works, and the interest on the water bonds is paid from the receipts for water sold.

The charter provides that annually, on and after January 1, 1905, sums not to exceed 2 per cent. of the par value of the water bonds shall be set aside from the receipts to constitute a sinking fund for redeeming these bonds.

The receipts for water sold during 1904 were 141-3 per cent. more than during 1903. As the water rates were the same, the increase must have been caused by an increase in the number of water consumers, and it is an indication of the growth of the city.

At the heginning of 1904 there were 168 miles of distributing mains of pipe ranging from 4 to 24 inches in diameter. During the year 18 miles of mains, 4 to 16 inches in diameter, were laid, making a total length of mains of 186 miles.

PARK BOARD.

Fourteen persons are employed in the care of the parks, all of whom are paid \$2 per day, excepting the superintendent, whose salary is \$100 per month.

The expenses for the parks for 1904 were \$29,272.89.

The tax levy for 1905 amounts to \$24,500, which will be sufficient for the present year.


All of the parks, Terwilliger park, Hawthorne park, Macleay park, Holladay park, Columbia park, City park, Albina park, and the park blocks have to some extent been improved during the past year.

Near the Washington street entrance to the City park, and adding much to its appearance, a stone wall has been erected, with an attractive waterfall, and at the eastern entrance, in place of the old wooden steps, handsome steps of cement and brick have been constructed. A group of splendid statuary has been set up in this park by the heirs of the late D. P. Thompson.

One buffalo, three kangaroos, two storks, two white turkeys, six monkeys and six young hears have been added to the zoological department of this park.

Musical concerts were given every Sunday afternoon in this park during the summer, which were enjoyed by from 2,000 to 5,000 people each Sunday, for which the park board subscribed \$1,000. I hope these concerts will be continued.

Considerable work has been done to improve and beautify the other parks. Four hundred elm trees have been planted in the park blocks in place of old trees are not beautify the



The cornerstone for the Lewis and Clark monument was laid in the City park May 21, 1903, and some large blocks of granite left near the east entrance to the park, but nothing more has been done. The monument should be erected or these blocks removed before the opening of the Lewis and Clark Fair.

It would be a great thing for Portland and for the state if the Lewis and Clark fair grounds could be secured for a permanent park

HEALTH BOARD.

The following are employes in the city under charge of this board with their pay per month: City physician, \$150; health officer, \$90; deputy, \$75; matron at pesthouse, \$40. The pay of the matron may be increased according to the number of patients. Five persons are usually employed at the crematory, all at \$60 per month with the exception of the manager, whose salary is \$75 per month.

The total expenses of this department for the year 1904 were \$15,442.67.

The following is a statement of what has been done at the crematory during the last year:

The capacity of the crematory, especially during the fruit season of last summer, was overtaxed. There are two furnaces, both of which are in bad condition and need frequent repairs.

There seems to be an absolute necessity for a new furnace and a thorough renovation of the old ones preparatory to the 1905 Fair.

I have asked an expert for an estimate of the cost of a new furnace and a practical renewal of the present furnaces. He is of the opinion that if a new furnace is made and the furnaces now used are put in proper condition, sufficient provision will be made for next summer. The present system of managing the garbage of the city is unsatisfactory. It is difficult to say how it can be improved, but I am inclined to the opinion that it would be better for the city to take charge of the collection, as well as the consumption, of the garbage. There ought to be a crematory on the east side of the river.

One considerable item of expense to the city are the charges of the hospitals. Any person found by the city authorities suffering from a contagious disease, or needing immediate relief, is kept at the hospitals until discharged or removed to the county hospital, for which the city pays the hospitals one dollar per day for each patient.

General good health has prevailed in Portland during the last year. There have been no epidemics. The death rate in this city, in proportion to the population, has been less than in any city of the United States, with possibly one exception.

The appropriation for this department for the year 1905 is \$24,500.00, which must be paid out of the general fund.

STREET CLEANING AND SPRINKLING DEPARTMENT.

The employes in this department, with their pay per month, are as follows: Superintendent, \$125 per month; foreman \$80 per month; three day and night barnmen, \$70 per month each; two repair men, \$75 and \$70 per month each; night cart and broom-drivers, \$2.25 per day; others, \$2 per day.

The average number of men employed each day is 48. There are day and night shifts. The city owns 27 sprinklers, five of which are worthless and not used. During the sprinkling season 11 of these sprinklers are operated by private persons and 11 by the city, all under the supervision of the superintendent. The cost to the city of those operated by private persons is \$4.50 per day. Two electric car sprinklers are employed, one at \$150 per month and the other at 75 cents per hour. Belonging to this department are 25 dump-carts and 35 horses.

The total expenses of this department for 1904 were \$64,896.15, paid out of the general fund.

The appropriation for 1905 is \$70,000, to be paid in the same way.

Owing to the rapid growth of our city, and the increase in the number of streets, it has been impossible for this department to meet all the requirements made upon it, but its operation during the last summer was quite satisfactory, as it did all it could do under the circumstances. I regret that the appropriation for 1905 for this department could not have been larger, as it is desirable that our streets should be in the best possible condition during the Lewis and Clark fair.

FREE PUBLIC LIBRARY.

Ordinance 1%,302 provides for a contract with the Library Association then existing for the free use of its library by the people of this city. The charter provides for a tax levy of 1-5 of a mill for the support of this library.

The receipts from taxes for 1904 were \$9,926.24 from the county, and \$8,976.30 from the city; total, \$18,902.54.

The disbursements payable out of this fund were \$18,846.07.

There is also a book fund, the receipts of which in 1904 amounted to \$6,359.01, and the expenditures from which amount to \$4,903.90, leaving a balance of \$1,455.11 of this fund on hand.

Two hundred and forty-two thousand seven hundred and ninety persons have made use of books in the library during the past year.

This free library is of great benefit to the people of this city, and according to the information I have is well and wisely managed and is rapidly growing in public estimation.

CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

The civil service commission have devoted much time and labor to their duties during the last year. Nine hundred and ninety-three persons applied for examinations; 640 were examined, 507 passed, and 133 failed. The examinations were conducted and markings made without any reference to personal or party considerations.

I am of the opinion that the civil service provisions of the charter ought to be amended so as to allow the employment of common laborers as the exigencies of the city may require, and according to the judgment of those by whom such persons are employed.

The expenses of this department during the year 1904 have been \$1,337.23.

The appropriation for the year 1905 was \$1,600.

CITY ATTORNEY'S OFFICE.

There are fourteen live cases pending against the city, of which one is an appeal to the Supreme Court of the United States, the city heing respondent; four on appeal to the Supreme Court of the State of Oregon, in all of which the city is respondent. Nine others are pending in the Circuit Court of Multnomah county. Eight of these cases involve injunctions to prevent the city from collecting for street improvements; one is an action for damages claimed to be due the

employes of the city; one to collect money claimed to be due upon contracts for work for the city, and two are to restrain the city from enforcing certain ordinances. There have been disposed of or abandoned during the past year seven cases in which the city was a party. No cases have been decided against the city. Four proceedings have been started to reassess property for benefits for street improvments under section 400 of the charter. During the year about 4,000 cases have been tried in the municipal court.

LIGHTING DEPARTMENT.

Our city is lighted by 1,030 arc lights, the expenses of which are \$5,713.56 per month.

There is a very clamorous demand and a great necessity for more of these lights.

ENGINEER'S DEPARTMENT.

This department during the last year has been overwhelmed with work. It has been impossible, with the means and force at its command, to meet all the demands made upon it for street, bridge, sewer, sidewalk and other improvements.

The number of persons employed in this department average about 85 each day.

The salary of the chief engineer is \$200 per month, and of his chief assistant \$145 per month. The other salaries for deputies, draughtsmen, inspectors, surveyors and chainmen range from \$115 to \$65 per month.

The total expenses of the department for 1904, including road roller and street repairs were \$122,614.05.

PORTLAND, OREGON

The appropriation for 1905 is \$104,630.

Eighteen persons, including surveyors, instrumentmen, inspectors and chainmen, have been dropped from the payroll on account of the smallness of the appropriation. It is difficult to see how this department can meet the growing demands upon it for 1905 with this limited appropriation and consequent reduction of force.

The steel bridge across Marquam gulch is completed and the Morrison street bridge and the steel bridge across the Willamette Heights gulch are nearly completed. The steel bridge across Marquam gulch on First street is in progress.

A great hue and cry have been made about the Tanner creek sewer, as though this was the first time in the history of Portland that a contractor with the city had failed fully to perform his contract.

I am satisfied that there are defects in this sewer, and I am further satisfied that they have been greatly exaggerated.

According to the judgment of several engineers who have examined the sewer, it can be made perfect without the expenditure of a dollar beyond the amount the contractor was to receive under his contract for its construction.

I once more appeal to the people of Portland to exert themselves individually to put our city in a clean and orderly condition preparatory to the Lewis and Clark fair, and not depend upon the city government to do everything.

I will say in conclusion, giving due credit to the council and all departments of the city government, that in proportion to the means at their command, more has been accomplished for the improvement of the city of Portland within the last two years than in any other city in the country. I have taken some pains to inform myself upon the subject, and I will further say that I have personal knowledge of the government of the city for more than forty years, and during that time Portland has not been as free from municipal corruption as it has been during the present administration.

Portland, Oregon, Dec. 31, 1904.

To the Honorable, the Mayor and the Health Board of the City of Portland.

Gentlemen:—It is with pleasure that I submit to you my third annual report as your Health Officer, giving table of vital statistics and all other proceedings connected with the Health Department which have been undertaken for the general benefit of the city during the year, together with some recommendations for your careful consideration.

I am glad to say that the health of the city has been good, and there has been less disease of a contagious nature than last year, with a corresponding decrease in the mortality of these diseases.

CARE OF CONTAGIOUS DISEASES.

One of the most important works of this Department is the control and prevention of all contagious diseases. Physicians can assist greatly in the proper isolation of these cases if they use their influence with the family in carrying out the health rules and regulations and promptly reporting the cases. This office is often receiving no small amount of censure when in reality it is the fault of the atending physician who failed to report the case. There will always be some trouble until we are provided with a "Hospital for Contagious Diseases." During the year 1904 there were but 942 cases of all forms of contagion reported, as against 1265 for the year 1903, a decrease of 323, which is remarkable, as well as a gratifying record. Sixty of these resulted fatally, a decrease of eight from the year 1903.

SMALLPOX.

We can consider ourselves fortunate in having had but 42 cases of smallpox at the City Pest House during 1904, with only one death (as there were twice as many in 1903); there has been but one case reported in the last seven months. This is certainly a fine showing, as smallpox exists today in nearly all large cities of the Pacific Northwest. The disease has prevailed in a mild form; in many cases it never went beyond the vesicular stage, yet we have no assurance that this type will continue and that it will not assume a virulent form. Therefore I believe that compulsory vaccination in our schools should be rigidly enforced, as about thirty per cent of the children of the city are unvaccinated.

TYPHOID FEVER.

There were only 77 cases and 27 deaths reported, a decrease of 21 from the preceding year, and many of the cases originated outside of the city and were brought here for treatment. As the disease is either contracted by nursing it or bad sanitary conditions in the shape of a cesspool or foul privy vault, this fact ought to be sufficient to induce householders whose premises are in a bad sanitary condition to correct the evil.

DIPHTHERIA.

During the year there have been 170 cases of diphtheria, with 23 deaths. There has been a marked decrease in the number of cases over the two previous years; there were 224 cases in 1903. A rigid quarantine has been maintained in all cases, and the Department has furnished antitoxine for indigent cases.

SCARLET FEVER AND MEASLES.

It also gives me pleasure to report that these two diseases have been less prevalent this year than last, only six terminated fatally out of 368 cases, the disease being very mild. All houses that were infected by contagious diseases were thoroughly fumigated by Mr. W. J. Beutelspacher, the honest and efficient deputy. There is no part of the improvements in the Health Department of the city more satisfactory in its far-reaching benefits than fumigating infected houses. We are supplied with the most modern and best formaldehyde fumigating machines and always have on hand a supply of formaldehyde.

A summary of recommendations which should receive earnest consideration.

The city needs a bacterological laboratory where chemical analysis and microscopical examinations can be made. The construction of an abattoir where all slaughtering of animals intended for human food could be done, and a meat inspector. The establishing of public urinals. The placing of receptacles along our business streets into which all waste material could be deposited. The construction of drinking fountains for pedestrians, these and other minor reforms and regulations should be adopted.

Municipal sanitation is one of the most important, if not the most important question of this age. Sanitary education should be required everywhere, in the public schools, in the high schools, colleges and universities so that enlightenment will reach the people generally, and thus we will all come to realize that the human family can be made healthier and happier and death made more remote.

OF THE

Plumbing Inspector

To the Honorable Mayor, the Board of Health and the Council of the City of Portland.

Gentlemen: I herewith respectfully submit the annual report of the Plumbing Inspector's Department for the year ending December 31, 1904.

The importance of a thorough system of sewers in this city is manifest to every citizen who recognize the benefits to be derived in the way of health and life arising from perfect drainage. Few cities in this country are so favorably situated for a perfect system of drainage as is Portland. The Willamette River at this point is a rapid stream during most of the year, and refuse material emptied into its waters are driven rapidly from the city front, and its material advantage should be fully utilized until such times when the United States Government will prohibit the pollution of streams by filth coming from large cities.

Our city now has 133 miles of sewers which, in proportion with the mileage of our streets, is very small. Thirteen miles of this system of sewerage was constructed in the past year. There is still a district known as Brooklyn which is very much in need of a sewerage system. The district covers an area of 1800 acres of land and the disposal of excreta in this district is by a method of cesspools which is very unsatisfactory from a sanitary standpoint for in the winter months these cesspools fill to the surface with seepage water, as this is mostly low ground, and during the heavy rains in winter overflow. I have been called to various parts of this district repeatedly to investigate cellars on account of foul odors arising from seepage water which finds its way into the basements of buildings. Some parties have gone to a great expense to remedy this, but it has proven to be a fruitless experiment. There is also a district known as North Irvington, which is very thickly settled and is in need of a sewerage system. I hope your honorable

body will duly consider the importance of this much needed improvement in the near future, at least. During the summer cesspools and privy vaults cannot be condemned too strongly; they are the most prolific cause of disease, and should be dispensed with at the earliest possible date. Where filth accumulates, disease breeds as it is proven by the fact that the large majority of contagious and infectious diseases are reported from the districts where sewerage is yet unprovided. This is a matter to which little attention is given.

People contemplating building should be sure the plans of the drainage and ventilation is stamped and approved at this office before starting to build, as it insures first class work and a protection to the owner and occupants of the buildings in general.

In the past year there has been a great increase of buildings in our city. The work has been principally residence buildings. There has also been a number of business blocks erected and several old business blocks remodeled, as you will see the increased amount done by this office over past years by the following tabulated report of the work done:

Library Association

To the Honorable Mayor and Council of the City of Portland.

Gentlemen: I have the honor of submitting herewith the second annual report of the Library Association of Portland, agreeable to the provisions of Ordinance No. 12302 entitled, "An Ordinance authorizing a contract with the Library Association of Portland, for the purpose of providing the inhabitants of the city with the free use of the library of the association"; approved July 18, 1901.

Under the provisions of the ordinance before referred to, and the existing contract between the association and Multnomah County, the library tax receipts from both the city and county are applicable only to the maintenance and operation of the library, to which all moneys received from tax collections have been applied. Happily the income of the association from these sources has covered operating expenses, and the association has thus been enabled to apply its income otherwise derived to the purchase of new books. The income of the association, and the several sources from which the items of such income are derived, together with the disbursements of the association for the year 1904, the several items of expenditure for maintenance and operation of the library, and the purposes for which such expenditures were made, will fully appear, reference being had to the following statement of

Annual Report

OF THE

Civil Service Commission

City Hall, December 17, 1904.

To the Honorable Mayor of the City of Portland:

Pursuant to the provisions of section 317 of the charter, the Civil Service Commission herewith submits their second annual report:

ELIGIBLES WITHDRAWN FROM CERTIFICATION.

On July 12, 1904, the names of Geo. S. H. Jackson and John K. Burke, who had passed the civil service examination and were on the eligible list for appointment to the position of inspector in the engineer's department, were withdrawn from certification on account of written objections being filed against their appointment by the city engineer.

On October 11, 1904, the name of E. J. Farrell, who had passed the civil service examination and was on the eligible list for appointment to the position of fireman in the fire department, was withdrawn from the certification on account of written objections being filed against bis appointment by the chief of the fire department.

On September 14, 1904, the name of W. N. Carter, who had passed the civil service examination and was on the eligible list for appointment to the position of clerk in the city treasurer's office, was withdrawn from certification on account of written objections being filed against his appointment by the city treasurer.

The charter does not give the commission the power to withhold from certification the name of any person who has passed the civil service examination unless there is some evidence to show that he is unfit for the public service, nor does the charter give the commission the power to withdraw from certification the name of any person who has been certified for appointment, unless the appointing authority files with the commission written objections showing that the person certified is unfit for the public service or that he has refused to accept the position for which he was certified.

The commission realizes that there are qualifications that a person in the public service should possess which an examination will fail to disclose, hence they have established a probationary period of six months, during which time the appointing authority may discharge a person who has been certified for service.

Your attention has been called to the above facts to show that this commission have not insisted upon the appointment of any person against whom written objections have been filed by the appointing authority, as provided by section 313 of the charter, which written objections showed that the person certified was morally, mentally or in any way unfit for the public service.

Violation of the Civil Service Provisions of the Charter-

On November 7, 1904, the City Treasurer notified this commission that he had appointed Mr. J. S. P. Copland to the position of clerk in the City Treasurer's office.

Section 314 of the charter gives the City Treasurer the power to make a temporary appointment pending the preparation of an eligible list, by this commission, from which an appointment can be made.

On November 28, 1904, in accordance with the provisions of section 313 of the charter, this commission certified the name of Edwin W. Jones as eligible for appointment to fill the vacancy temporarily filled by J. S. P. Copland.

On December 1, 1904, the commission, not having received a notice of the appointment of the eligible certified, sent the following letter of inquiry to the City Treasurer:

"Portland, Or., Dec. 1, 1904.

Mr. J. E. Werlein, City Treasurer, City.

Dear Sir: Will you kindly inform this commission when the appointment will he made from the eligible list certified to you under date of November 28, 1904.

On December 2, 1904, the following reply was received:

"Portland, Or., Dec. 2, 1904.

Honorable Civil Service Commission,

O. L. McPherson, Secretary, City.

Gentlemen: Replying to yours of yesterday I heg leave to in-

form you that there is no vacancy in the City Treasury Department. Mr. J. S. P. Copland, now performing the duties of clerk is in every way satisfactory to me and well qualified to discharge the duties of this office.

Should a vacancy occur in the Treasury Department I would be pleased to consider recommendations from your honorable body.

On December 8, 1904, the commission notified the City Treasurer as follows:

"Portland, Or., Dec. 8, 1904.

Mr. J. E. Werlein, City Treasurer, City.

Dear Sir: In reply to your letter under date of the 2d inst., I am instructed by the Civil Service Commission to inform you that Mr. J. S. P. Copland is not eligible for employment as clerk in the City Treasurer's office.

On the same day the commission, in compliance with the provisions of section 319 of the charter, notified the City Auditor as follows:

"Portland, Or., Dec. 8, 1904.

Mr. Thos. C. Devlin, City Auditor, City.

Dear Sir: I am instructed by the Civil Service Commission to inform you that Mr. J. S. P. Copland is employed in the City Treas-rer's office in violation of the provisions of the city charter and the rules of this commission; that he is not entitled to pay after the 30th day of November, 1904.

Yours truly,

The commission have as yet taken no further action in this matter. They are pleased to state that this is the only open violation of the civil service provisions of the city charter since the appointment of the commission. We have, with this one exception, had the hearty co-operation of the officials of the city government in our endeavor to establish the civil service system in the City of Portland.

Reinstatement-

On October 29, 1904, C. E. Foster, who was discharged from the position of patrolman in the Police Department, filed a demand for an investigation of the charges filed against him by the Chief of Police. The commission, after thoroughly investigating the matter found: "That Officer C. E. Foster failed to report every hour during the night of September 28, 1904, as required by the rules of the Police Department, but that dismissal from the service was too severe punishment, this being his first offense. And further, that it is a sufficient punishment for the violation of the rules of the department, as aforesaid, that Officer C. E. Foster be suspended for forty-five days from the morning of the 29th day of September, 1904, without pay, and that at the expiration of that time that he be restored to duty."

The findings of the commission, as above set forth, were certified to the Chief of Police, as required by section 317 of the charter, and were enforced by the chief.

Method of Rating-

The following method is observed in rating examination papers by the commission:

Each subject is given on a separate sheet. After an examination is held the papers are arranged by sheets or subjects and rated. After the papers are rated those of each competitor are then for the first time assembled or brought together, his average percentage ascertained, thereafter his identification envelope is opened, and the identification sheet to which he has signed his name is attached to his examination papers. The identity of the competitor, therefor, is not disclosed until his papers have been rated and his average percentage determined.

The papers of all the competitors in an examination are rated at the same time, and no competitor's papers are made special or rated in advance of others.

All papers relative to any examination which has been held, are open to the inspection of any citizen.

Descriptions of Examinations-

The following will indicate the general character of the examinations which have been given:

Deputy Auditors and Clerks-

1. Spelling.—Twenty words of more than average difficulty. 2. Arithmetic—Fundamental rules, fractions, percentage, interest, discount, analysis, and statement of simple accounts. 3. Letter Writing—Test in the use of the English language for business correspondence. 4. Penmanship—Marked on legibility, rapidity, neatness, and general appearance. 5. Copying from Rough Draft—Test in copying from draft or manuscript, with interlineations, erasures, misspelled words, errors in syntax, etc., of which a smooth copy is to he made. 6. Rapid Copying—Test of penmanship in both speed and accuracy. 7. Rapid Computation—Involving addition, subtraction, multiplication, division, decimals, and simple percentage.

Relative weights of subject on a scale of 100; spelling, 10; arithmetic, 15; letter writing, 25; penmanship, 15; copying from rough draft, 15; rapid copying, 10; rapid computation, 10.

Hosemen and Laddermen in Fire Department-

The competitor is first required to undergo a medical examination, then an athletic test and a written examination.

Athletic Test-

Climbing aerial ladder seventy feet.

Climbing inclined ladder, 5 rungs, hand over hand.

Carrying dummy weighing 125 pounds up and down an inclined ladder.

Jumping into net from second story.

Running eighty yards. (The competitor to receive full credit on this test must run this distance in not less than 13 seconds.)

Written Examination-

1. Arithmetic—Simple problems in addition, multiplication, division and subtraction. 2. Penmanship—Marked on legibility, rapidity, neatness, and general appearance. 3. Copying from Plain Copy—The competitor is given about 100 words from which he makes an exact written copy. 4. General Knowledge—Competitor is required to give the names and locations of prominent buildings in the City of Portland; he is required to name about 30 of the principal streets, running east and west on the west side of the Willamette River, in the City of Portland, and also to answer questions taken from the rules of

the Civil Service Commission and Fire Department. Copies of these rules are furnished competitors at the rooms of the commission.

Relative weights of subjects on a scale of 100: Arithmetic, 10; Penmanship, 5; copying from plain copy, 5; general knowledge, 30; athletic test, 50.

Stokers on Fire Boat.

The competitors are required to first undergo a medical examination and then a written examination.

Written Examination-

1. Arithmetic—Simple problems in addition, multiplication, division, and subtraction. 2. Penmanship—Marked on legibility, rapidity, neatness, and general appearance. 3. Copying from Plain Copy—The competitor is given about 100 printed words from which he makes an exact written copy. 4. General Knowledge of Duties—Questions are given relative to the duties of a stoker. 5. Experience—Competitor must have had at least six months' experience in firing coal.

Relative weights of subjects on a scale of 100: Arithmetic, 10; penmanship, 10; copying from plain copy, 10; general knowledge of duties, 20; experience, 50.

Examination for Promotion to Captain and Lieutenant in the Fire Department:

1. Spelling—Twenty words in ordinary use. 2. Arithmetic—Simple problems in addition, multiplication, division, and subtraction.
3. Penmanshp—Marked on legibility, rapidity, neatness and general appearance. 4. Copying from Plain Copy—The competitor is given about 100 printed words of which he makes an exact written copy.
5. General Knowledge of Duties—The competitor is required to give the locations of at least 40 fire hydrants in use in the City of Portland; 25 fire alarm boxes are given which competitor is required to locate, and questions are given from the assignment book and the book of rules of the Fire Department.

Relative weights of subjects on a scale of 100: Spelling, 20; arithmetic, 20; penmanship, 15; copying from plain copy, 15; general knowledge of duties, 30.

Method of Filing-

The commission have established a method of filing whereby all papers relating to any person in the city service may be found at

a moment's notice. Each application is numbered and indexed and all papers pertaining to an applicant are filed with his application.

Roster-

The card system is used in keeping the roster of persons in the classified service of the city. This roster is complete and shows that there are 488 persons serving under civil service at the present date. The following shows the number employed in each service:

Rules in Force-

Appended to this report is a copy of the rules adopted by this commission and in force at the present date.

Suggestions for Improvement in the System-

The Civil Service Commission would recommend that the charter he amended so that laborers will be exempt from the civil service. Their reasons for recommending this are as follows:

First. That the enforcement of the civil service provisions of the charter in this branch of the service has tended to retard work and disorganize the departments. Second. It has been found impracticable to prepare an examination for this branch of the service as required by section 311 of the charter which requires: "That examinations shall be practical in their character and shall relate only to those matters which may fairly test the relative fitness of the persons examined to discharge the duties of the positions for which they are applicants."

Third. That employment in the labor service, as a rule, is of a temporary nature.

Fourth. That many persons, who are well qualified for this branch of the service, are deterred from taking the examinations, and many who do take them are excluded on account of the educational requirements of the charter.

Estimate of Probable Expenses-

The commission estimate that they will need an appropriation of sixteen hundred dollars (\$1600) to cover the expenses for the year 1905.

Annual Report

OF THE

Chief of Police

Hon. George H. Williams, Mayor City of Portland, City Hall, City.

Dear Sir: In compliance with your request, I submit the following report in relation to the work performed by the Police Department during the year 1904.

The force is composed of 84 officers, including the chief of police; three captains of police, six detectives, including Detective H. H. Hawley, who is detailed especially for duty for the Boys' & Girls' Aid Society; one stenographer, one matron, one electrician and seventy-one patrolmen.

From this number of patrolmen are detailed three acting sergeants of police; three patrol drivers, doing eight hours' duty; one officer, acting as jailor; three officers acting as telephone operators, performing eight hours' service each; one patrolman detailed as court officer, who attends the court during sesion, has charge of the prisoners before the court and the committal of the same after sentence; one officer performing duty for the Oregon Humane Society, which occupies his whole time.

This leaves fifty-nine officers for patrol duty, being divided into three reliefs, each relief performing eight hours' service out of the 24.

Seven vacancies have occurred in the past year, which have not been filled on account of the desire of the committee on police to keep within the police appropriation. This has been done, but could not have been done if the vacancies had been filled.

The work of this department has increased greatly in the past three years, more especially in the years of 1903 and 1904. The business that comes from different parts of the state, as well as other states to this department entails upon this department a great amount of labor. Portland being the largest city in the state and also the terminus of railroads and water rontes is convenient for criminals fleeing from justice to reach this city in hopes of finding a better place for hiding and eluding officers who may he in pursuit of them.

The police records show a large number of arrests of criminals arrested by the officers of this department for crimes committed outside of the city. This will continue to grow upon us and increase the work of this department, and will be realized more in the year 1905 than ever before. The detail work of police matters will tax the police department as never before in the history of the City of Portland. Preparations must be made soon to meet these conditions. The additional work entailed upon this department will call for an increase in the strength of the force in numbers.

I will repeat what I have stated in former reports. That increase in the number of appointments is important, but much more so is the material selected for policemen.

CITY JAIL.

In my last annual report I called the attention of the Mayor and the council to the city jail and asked for means to reconstruct the same. Money was appropriated for this purpose and the jail has been remodeled. The entire inside of the four walls were torn out and removed, covering all the ground on the first floor. A new cement floor was laid, a perfect system of sewerage put in, twelve steel cages provided, each one with a toilet and stationary wash basin furnishing water at all times when needed by the prisoners. A bath room was built on to the building proper, with bathing accommodations and set tubs which provides means for the prisoners keeping their bodies and clothing clean, which they are forced to do. The office of the police headquarters has been furnished with the necessary convenience to properly care for police work. Out of the regular appropriation for the police expenses for the year of 1904 the sum of \$700 was appropriated to provide the women's department of the city jail with better accommodations. This work is nearly completed. The women's wing of the jail consists of five steel cages, which will accommodate three women in each cell, and provides four rooms which can be used for lodgers, persons held as witnesses or prisoners that should be kept apart from other persons confined there. A bath room is provided with all that is necessary for the conveniences in privacy which no woman should be deprived of no matter how low she may have fallen. Set tubs are also provided for washing purposes. The four rooms mentioned in connection with the women's part of the jail can be closed off separate from the main room. These quarters are well lighted, well ventilated and in every way will meet the requirements for a long time to come as a

women's prison. The system of plumbing throughout the building is very complete. I will state that all the work done in connection with the building of the jail except the larger part of the steel work, the cement floor and the plumbing work was done by inmates of the city jail who were sentenced there for minor offences. This was a saving of several thousand dollars in the construction of the jail. When the women's wing of the city jail is completed and occupied, work will begin upon the portion of the building now occupied by the women. The plan is to huild seven additional cells, built with special care as to strength and safety which will be needed during the coming year for the confinement of criminals charged with serious offences. When this is completed we shall be provided with a jail that will answer the purpose during the year 1905, providing the proper discretion is used in disposing of persons taken in charge by the police.

ROCK-PILE.

So much has been said in some of the local papers about the rock-pile that I consider it well to say a word or two in connection with it. It does not come within the province of the chief of police to establish a rock-pile. It is a matter wholly within the jurisdiction of the city engineer, and the only thing required of the chief of police in connection with the rock-pile is to furnish prisoners to perform such labor as may be directed by the city engineer whenever he is called upon to do so. On the first day of November, 1904, the city engineer established a rock-pile in this city. The greater part of the time since then two prisoners part of the time, three prisoners part of the time, and a few days only four men have been employed upon the rock-pile. The reason why the number was so small is because there was not prisoners enough confined in the city jail to furnish more. These prisoners go from the city jail at eight o'clock in the morning and return at three o'clock in the afternoon, and are in charge of two men as guards. That there are so few men in the city jail can be accounted for from the fact that those that might he subjects for the rock-pile are not allowed to stay in the city but are required to move on. The chief of police inaugurated and adopted a system for the disposal of the army of men that have been arrested by the police on the charge of vagrancy and drunkenness. This method has been designated by the funny man of one of the local papers as "Chief Hunt's Kangaroo Court." It is the custom of the chief of police to arrive at police headquarters every morning between the hours of seven and eight o'clock. The case of every person arrested in the preceeding 24 hours is investigated personally by him.

Those that are charged with vagrancy, tresspass, out after hours, or riding the break-beams into this city are brought before the police force while in line at roll call; each prisoner is questioned in the presence of the police as to where he is from, where he is going, and to account for himself in a general way. Seventy-five per cent of this class state that they are going away to some other city, and with that understanding they are allowed to leave the city and are escorted by police officers to the railroad and are allowed to proceed on their way, going north or south as they desire. If they do not leave the city, and are again arrested by the police, they are taken before the court and a charge of vagrancy filed against them. Twentyfive per cent of this class tell a story worthy of investigation. If they are found to be truthful in their statements the officers who are sent with them report that their statements are correct, and they are allowed to go free, and if they are not correct they are returned to the police station and given an opportunity to leave the city. A very few, comparatively, are arrested the second time. Those employed on the rock-pile at present are of this class. The fact that the city is kept so clear from the vagrant class and so few are engaged upon the rock-pile is the best evidence of the good effect of the methods now employed in disposing of the idle class. Another class are those arrested for simple drunkenness. For the first offence they are not taken before the court, but when by repeated offences they become amenable they are taken before the court and charges filed against them, and are disposed of as the court sees fit. In these two classes only does the chief of police assume any authority and are the only ones that he discharges from custody. If the chief of police should prosecute indiscriminately all persons placed under arrest for these offences, and long sentences were imposed upon them, the city jail, were it four times as large as it is, would not afford standing room for them in 30 days. I will state that when an additional charge of disorderly conduct is made in connection with the charge of drunkenness the man is not discharged but is taken before the court. When I state as a fact that in the months of November and December of the year of 1904 that there were 1170 persons arrested for the offenes mentioned it can be readily understood to be true. Overcrowded prisoners' docks in the police court with unfortunate offenders is no criterion upon which to base the efficiency of the police force. Neither does an overflowing jail filled with the same class of offenders give the best evidence of the wisest dispensation of justice. Persons arrested for minor offences should not be classed as criminals. Persons arrested for the first offence of drunkenness should not be humiliated by being paraded before a

crowd of idle spectators but should be treated with proper consideration and should be dealt with in accordance with humane instincts and a proper degree of sympathy. There need be no show of sentimentality but the wisest discrimination should be exercised. It is upon these grounds and the benefit that accrues to the interests of the community that the chief of police has adopted the method mentioned and which he will continue to exercise until those in authority that have the right to dictate as to his course show disapproval. It is the absence of crimes and criminals in any city that shows the true efficiency of the force. It is better to prevent crime by removing from our midst a class that are known to be vicious than to allow them to settle in our community. There never has been a time in the history of Portland, considering the increased population and its rapid growth, when so few serious crimes were committed, or when the police force has apprehended those that have committed crimes, or when there were so few prisoners in the city jail or when the city was in such orderly condition as at the present time. This speaks well for the activity of the police.

' I desire to call your attention to the subject of the establishment of a house of correction. While it does not come directly within the jurisdiction of the police, yet it is a matter that interests this department and would aid the police in ridding the community of the idle and dissolute class that fills the city jail. The police station will not afford facilities for the care of this class much longer, judging from the large number of arrests in the past few years. I have, hy request, met with persons interested in the establishment of such an institution. While they realize the need of it, they see no way by which funds can be obtained to carry out their wishes. This is not a matter of so much consequence just now as it is to enact a law as a house of correction act in which should be embodied such crimes and offences that would come within the provisions of such a law and penalties attached. Many complaints are made to this office about men who neglect to provide for their families. There is no law that provides punishment for this class of persons. There should be one, and it should come within the provisions of the house of corrections act. Men should be obliged to support their wives and children. There are many other offences for which penalties are provided for by ordinances which should come within the provisions of the house of corrections act. It is not necessary at present to spend a large amount of money in the establishment of a house of correction. The house of correction could be made a part of the county jail. This being done it would relieve the city jail of a

large majority of prisoners confined there under sentence, especially the vagrant class; they could be put to work under the control of the county authorities, where they can be made to perform labor as now done on the county roads and accomplish something of value as a result. This would do away with the city rock-pile, which is of no henefit at present. If this plan were carried out it would do more in six months' time to rid this city of the lawless class than can be accomplished in years under present laws.

I respectfully call your attention to the following tabular report showing the work done by the police department and also showing that this department has been diligent in looking after minors who require police supervision. All minors of tender years, subject to the jurisdiction of the Boys' and Girls' Aid Society, are placed in the care of the superintendent of this society. (See tabular report on following page.)

By petition the police have asked for an increase in pay. I am sure the mayor and council would be pleased to grant this petition if the finances of the city would warrant it. I am informed that this cannot be done at present, but I do earnestly request that the pay of the captains and sergeants be increased, the captains to \$100 and the sergeants to \$90 per month. This would not amount to a sum sufficient to cripple the department in regard to its appropriation. There should be a distinction made in the salaries of the ranking officers. I also suggest that the rank of sergeant be made permanent. This would have to be done by an amendment to the city charter. While no provision is made for this grade of officer, no ranking officer is more necessary or more serviceable than that of sergeant. The police force has not reached perfection; this is impossible and need not be looked for. It has not attained the highest standard of efficiency; it never can as the force is now organized under existing conditions, yet the force will compare favorably with the departments of other large cities throughout the United States in point of appearance and conduct. The amount of work performed by our police force greatly exceeds that of other large cities where a much larger force is maintained. I am sure the people of this city have reason to be satisfied that this department is all that could reasonably be expected.

I take this occasion to thank His Honor, the Mayor, for the support he has given me, and his wise council from time to time. I also thank the committee of police of the executive board for the earnest interest displayed by them in the improvement of the department and

the valuable advice given, which has done much to lighten my labors and greatly enhance the efficiency of the department.

In the paid fire department we have 19,432 feet of 2½-inch cotton rubber lined, 8300 feet of 2¾, 2000 feet of 3½, 300 feet of 1½, and 1000 feet of chemical hose. In addition to this we have in the auxiliary fire companies, as above stated, a total of 2700 feet of rubber hose, making a grand total of 33,032 feet of hose in actual service.

The losses during the year have been \$414,899.89 or a little more than one-third of the amount of the previous year, and evidences the benefits of a full paid department, which has been in vogue but six months of the time.

Among the substantial improvements worthy of note during the time covered by this report, are the installation of the magnificent fire boat, the "Geo. H. Williams," the changing of Hose Co. No. 5 to Engine Co. No. 9, with a third-class Amoskeag engine and combination chemical engine and hose wagon, the addition of 8000 feet of first-class fire hose, one extra first-size Metropolitan fire engine, three new hose wagons and ten horses.

The building of the house and dock for the fire boat crew, and the purchase and remodeling of the property occupied by Engine Co. No. 9 has added two splendid homes for the men of the department.

About \$6000 has also been spent in repairs to houses, which puts the majority of the buildings in good condition.

There has also been added to the service one hundred and fifty new and up-to-date hydrants, which fill a long felt want, and to add to the benefits of the latter item, the purchase and placing of hydrants has been taken up by the water board, to which it properly helongs, thus relieving the department of a branch of duty wholly outside of its jurisdiction, generally speaking.

The installation of ten new fire alarm boxes and twenty-five keyless doors has added much to the efficiency of the service, and the machine shop in operation at headquarters, under the supervision of a master mechanic, has kept the expenses of repairs to apparatus and repairs to fire alarm telegraph system to a minimum figure, and insures satisfactory results.

Mr. David Campbell, Chief of the Fire Department, City-

Dear Sir: I have the honor of submitting for your consideration this annual report on the condition of the fire alarm system; also a brief statement of what has been done during the past year; and recommendations for the further improvement of the service.

The Fire Alarm System consists essentially of 133 fire alarm hoxes; 63½ miles of aerial lines; and the central office and engine house equipment.

Twenty of the boxes were built thirty years ago, and are unreliable in the highest degree, being of such a design that they cannot be remodeled.

Twenty-eight of the boxes are of a later design; while they are unreliable, they can be remodeled and made serviceable for years to come.

Practically all of the rest of the boxes need to be cleaned; many needing new character wheels and retiming.

Of the aerial lines, such a large portion has been rebuilt during the past two years that there remains only about four miles that could be rebuilt with any advantage.

The central office equipment is in good condition, being the best of its kind.

There are four engine houses that need to be rewired and supplied with new instrument boards; two engine house gongs need to be rebuilt; then all of the engine house equipment will be in as good condition as it is possible to make it.

During the past year—

- 10 new fire alarm stations have been installed.
- 5 old boxes have been replaced by new ones.
- 16 miles of aerial lines have been built, or rebuilt.
- 3 engine houses have been rewired.
- 7 new instrument boards have been installed.
- 35 automatic electric light switches were placed in service.
- 25 keyless doors were placed on boxes.

The fireboat house was completely equipped.

In the shop there has been built during the past year-

- 41 automatic electric light switches.
- 4 18-inch gongs.
- 3 15-inch gongs.
- 2 stall door trips.
- 1 index plate.
- 3 milling tools.
- 5 8-inch gongs have been partially built.

Alterations and repairs have been made on-

- 19 fire alarm boxes.
- 7 markers.
- 2 repeaters.
- 6 indicators.
- 3 gongs.
- 1 tape register.
- 6 unhitchers.
- 9 relays.
- 25 keyless doors have been fitted to boxes.

In addition to the work mentioned a large number of minor repairs have been made. You will notice that much has been done during the past year in extending the fire alarm service, and in bettering the equipment. More, in fact, than in the five preceding years; yet it is to be regretted that it has been impossible to change from the "automatic" to the "manual" method of operating. The benefits to be derived from such a change have been so frequently discussed in previous reports, and are so well known to you that they do not need reiteration. However, I would respectfully renew my recommendations in that regard. I would respectfully further recommend:

That all boxes that cannot be remodeled and made reliable be replaced by new hoxes.

That all other boxes that are unreliable be remodeled and made reliable. That the remainder of the boxes be cleaned and retimned, and that all boxes be arranged in such a manner that they can be converted into "fast time" boxes at a moments' notice.

That the fire alarm system be converted into a "fast time" system whether or not the "manual" method of operating is employed.

That such lines as need it, be reconstructed.
