Recognizing that time and monetary restrictions will limit the number of Oregonians participating directly in the capital march, PTC planned the Portland candlelight march in support of the national efforts. If you can't be in D.C., be here!

The idea of the national march found one of its strongest advocates in San Francisco County Supervisor Harvey Milk. After Milk's assassination last November, the national committee was formed to implement the idea. Initially a grassroots effort, the march has gathered support from hundreds of lesbian/gay organizations, including PTC, National Gay Task Force, Metropolitan Community Church, and Gay Rights



National Lobby. Planning for the national march has ensured that leadership positions reflect parity between women and men. Twenty percent of the positions are held by Third World people - Native-, Latin-, Asian-, and Afro-Americans.

Assembly for the local march on October 13 at the South Park Blocks, across from the Portland Art Museum, at 9:00 p.m. The parade route will pass by Portland's Federal Building and City Hall, and will end with a rally at O'Bryant Square. Bring your friends, your lovers, your family and neighbors. Express your support for lesbian/gay liberation. Have candles with you and let it be known that we won't let bigots snuff out our light.

### D. C. March to Have Oregon Delegation

Oregonians who will be in Washington for the national march for lesbian/gay rights are encouraged to band together to establish an Oregon delegation. A number of events are scheduled in Washington that weekend. Strong Oregon visibility during the march on Sunday, October 14, will help demonstrate the nationwide unity that we are developing.

A meeting in Portland for those Oregonians traveling to D.C. has been arranged for Mon., Oct. 8 at 7:00 p.m. at the PTC office. Here we can meet each other and make appointments to join forces back East.

Portland attorney Katharine English and outgoing PTC Executive Director Carl Goodman are planning a day of lobbying with Oregon's congressional delegation in Washington on Mon., Oct. 15. During the entire day, Oregonians will be able to meet with their federal senators and representatives to state their case for lesbian/gay freedom. English and Goodman are setting up open appointment times with the congresspeople. Oregonians can fill the scheduled appointments once in Washington.

Radical Women, a Portland feminist group, is planning to send members to the capital to attend the first National Third World Lesbian/ Gay Conference. To be held Oct. 12-15, the conference will establish a national network for racial-minority lesbians and gay men. Radical Women's office address is 506 N.E. Alberta, Portland 97211. In Washington, the Oregon contact person is Ken Bertsch, at whose home Goodman will be staying. The address and telephone are: 2716 Ontario Rd. N.W., Washington, D.C., (202) 387-7052. Call Bertsch or Goodman to find out where and when the Oregon delegation will meet to assemble for the Sunday march. Requests to lobby Oregon congresspeople can also be directed through that number.

### Landmark Victory

The Oregon Court of Appeals handed gay people a victory Sept. 4 even as it upheld a lower court ruling removing Karin Jean Ashling's children from her custody. (see August Newsletter)

Although the Court of Appeals agreed that the custody change was valid for reasons other than Ashling's homosexuality, it struck down a lower court ruling allowing Ashling only limited visitation privileges.

"The case is immensely helpful to gay parents," ACLU cooperating attorney Dominick Vetri told the *Gay Rights Report*. "The case establishes that the courts may not restrict visitation merely because a parent is gay or because gay friends may be present."

The higher court noted that, "The mother has had sexual relations in the privacy of her bedroom when the children were in her home, but not in their presence." Its opinion continued: "So long as the mother's sexual practices remain discreet — a requirement whatever the sexual preferences of the parties might be . . .



- and the presence of lesbians in the home from time to time does not of itself create difficulties for the children . . . the (visitation) restriction (ordered by Circuit Judge James Hargreaves of Lane County) is inappropriate."

The fact that the court equated the sexual practices of gay and straight people is very important, said Vetri.

Initial wire-service reports in Oregon newspapers concluded erroneously that the court's opinion was unfavorable to gay parents.

### Scores of Canadian Lesbians Refused Entry into U.S.

Harassment of homosexual aliens – and those suspected of being homosexual – by U.S. immigration officials is continuing, despite the recent refusal of the Public Health Service to participate in an exclusionary policy and the consequent "temporary directive" from the Immigration and Naturalization Service that gay aliens are not to be refused entry. (see also Sept. *Gay Rights Report*)

Hundreds of Canadian women suffered invasions of privacy and outrageous and abusive treatment by the INS at Port Huron, Mich. the weekend of August 23-25. The women sought entry to the U.S. to attend the fourth annual Michigan Women's Music Festival at Hesperia.

A sampling of the questions asked by officials, as reported to NGTF Co-Executive Director Lucia Valeska, at the Music Festival follows:

"When was the last time you slept with a woman?"

"When was the last time you slept with a man?"

"Which do you enjoy more, sleeping with a man or a woman?"

"What do you do in bed?"

Border Official: "Are you going to the Mich. Music Festival?"

Applicant: "No. I'm just going camping." Border Official: "Well, you go gack to Canada and get cured, and then you can come to A Half Century of Helping Oregonians.

#### the U.S. for a holiday."

"Do you have negative feelings about homosexuality? Why not? How can you tell me you are not homosexual?"

"You may not enter the U.S. We are not convinced that you are not lesbians."

The women, only **suspected** of being homosexual, were **illegally** sent back to their country of origin by border officials without being informed of their right to a hearing, and without referral to PHS medical examiners — the procedure that INS itself claims is the **only** way in which gay aliens may be formally excluded.

INS officials at Port Huron have been reprimanded for their actions, and INS Commissioner Leonel Castillo has ordered a formal investigation. However, the allegedly "temporary" policy by which gay aliens are now "paroled" into the country is not sufficient. Equality demands that abuse and harassment of people based on sexual orientation end, permanently.

National Gay Task Force and National Organization for Women have signed a joint letter asking U.S. Attorney General Benjamin Civiletti to order the INS to cease its anti-gay actions. Additionally, 10 U.S. Congresspersons, including Oregon Rep. James Weaver, sent a letter to Castillo requesting the INS to change its gayexclusionary policies.

### PTC Donates to Boise Fight

The PTC Board of Directors voted at its Sept. 17 meeting to contribute \$100 to the Boise Women's Defense und. The fund has been established to help defray the legal costs of six women fired from the Boise police department for being lesbian.

The women, who include three dispatchers, the dog warden, and two police officers, were fired in March, 1977. The police have leveled various charges against the women, including "crimes against nature." All six women are fighting their dismissals in a suit against the police department. They have raised four separate issues.

The first, involving due process, has been settled with the complainants having been awarded \$103,000. The other three issues, involving more fundamental rights, are still in litigation. They are: illegal wiretapping, sex discrimination, and cause. The women's due process award is being applied to help pay their ongoing legal fees.

Boise has an infamous history of oppressing gay women and men. In the 1950s, a massive homosexual witch-hunt was conducted in the city. Disruptions in the lives of hundreds of gay Boiseans occurred, either through imprisonment, state intimidation, or community hatred.

Nevertheless, Idaho was one of the first states in the Union to have decriminalized homosexual conduct. It did so unwittingly in the early 1970s during a general law-code revision. However, once Idaho lawmakers dis-

### WHY WE ARE MARCHING

People throughout the nation are joining together to make the March on Washington for Lesbian and Gay Rights an inspiring and successful event, an event so important that it will propel lesbian and gay liberation forward in a way that hasn't been done since the Stonewall Riot. The March on Washington will mark an important point in the evolution of lesbian and gay strength: the coming together of people and organizations from all over the country to work for the first national action planned by the lesbian and gay community.

1979 is the tenth anniversary of the Stonewall Riots, the historic rebellion that helped to launch the current wave of lesbian and gay liberation. What better way for us to commemorate this anniversary than by mobilizing our sisters and brothers, as well as all our supporters, in the first national march for lesbian and gay rights. The march will be a celebration of our community solidarity and a sign of our political strength.

The success of local marches of hundreds of thousands of lesbians

and gay males indicates that we can organize a huge national march on Washington, D.C. The progress we have made in ten years is staggering. Lesbian and gay organizations now flourish throughout the country, in isolated communities, large urban centers and college campuses. Our issue has become the focus of international attention, and is discussed and debated widely. However, our power will not be fully realized until we unite our energies and resources. After ten years of growth and regional activity, joining forces is necessary for the growth of our movement. A massive mobilization in which all of our diverse forces participate is the essential first step to move us in that direction.

It is apparent that the March on Washington is stimulating more interest and excitement than anything we have ever organized. We have the energy, expertise, experience and the resources to bring about an extraordinary event. We also have a valuable network of hundreds of lesbian and gay organizations across the nation. It is crucial for local groups to plug into the march network, and this is happening throughout the nation.

It is important to remember that the organizing work, in many ways, is as important as the event itself. This is because: -A network of organizations and organizers will be established. Presently there is great isolation between groups and especially between different regions of the country. The march can capture the imagination of those who have not participated in local events.

-Local groups will be strengthened by reaching out to their communities and involving new people and tapping new resources.

-Trust and cooperation will be developed between people and groups working in coalition for the march so that we may work together on future projects.

The march will mobilize lesbians and gay males on a grass roots level. We will invite the participation of our supporters among women, Third World people, the labor movement, and other progressive groups in our society. Moreover, this march will be built by all segments of our community- young and old, Third World and white, poor and affluent, political and non-political, the disabled, workers and the unemployed, and transpeople. We will be in Washington, building a broad, mass movement to fight for our freedom. Our demonstration will insist on freedom for all gay people, and must reflect the anger and pride of our community in the face of government callousness, double-talk, and inaction. We should march on Washington, not to plead with the government for token concessions, but to demand and struggle for liberation and an end to persecution.

We must recognize that our strength lies in our diversity. It lies in our ability to organize a genuine national movement for lesbian and gay rights. Let the March on Washington on October 14, 1979 lay the foundation for such a movement.

The march will have other positive effects. It will heighten national awareness of our issues in a way that a small, local campaign cannot. It will serve as an important educational tool for both our community and the non-gay community. A demonstration will support lobbying efforts by showing beyond any doubt that a strong gay constituency exists in this nation, a constituency that is politically active and ready to mobilize. Congress must be pressured by a major escalation of our visibility and power which a massive convergence on the nation's capital can provide. Most of all, the march will be exhilarating for all of us and give us the boost we need to carry on our work. We will be 'coming out' nationally and greeting our sisters and brothers in a unified demonstration of our pride, our spirit, and our determination to have our rights.

## Police chief invites homosexual job applicar

Portland Police Chief Bruce Baker invited members of the city's gay community to become police officers Wednesday in a speech to the Portland Town Council in the Cosmopolitan Hotel.

Almost 100 persons crowded the banquet room to hear Baker's explanation of how the bureau hires and trains

#### its officers.

The bureau first mailed recruitment materials to the council in April, said Carl Goodman, executive director of the organization. He he did not know if any members of the council had applied to the bureau.

"We seek potential officers everywhere we think we can find them," said Baker. He reminded his audience that there was a city ordinance prohibiting job discrimination based on sexual orientation. The ordinance was passed in 1974.

Baker said did not know why the council wasn't included on the minority-recruitment mailing list in previous years. He explained that the bureau only recruits once every two years because there are far more applicants than job openings. This year, he said, the bureau received 1,000 applications for 40 positions.

Police departments across the country generally avoid hiring homosexuals, but this has changed in recent years in some departments, notably in San Francisco.

Besides describing the hiring processes of the bureau, Baker fielded questions from the audience. One questioner suggested briefing officers during their training to the realities of "the 10 percent of the population who are gay."

"We touch on it (homosexuality) in our advanced police academy ... in a course entitled 'Human Relations.' Probably it is not what you would call adequate," Baker said.

Goodman asked Baker why the police had not used the town council speakers bureau to provide information to officers in training.

"We have a problem of time with that training. We rely on the fact that we hire people who are well-educated. Personally, I don't think the problems will be overcome by your coming to talk to us about homosexuality," he said.

Many of those in the audience related examples of alleged mistreatment of gay persons by Portland police officers. The examples ranged from poor patrolling of a gay bar to harassment of individuals.

Baker recommended more dialogue between the gay community and precinct sergeants and said the best way to educate police officers was by sitting down and talking to them about problems.

# Former police sergeant named council coordinator

Mary Forst, once the youngest sergeant on the Detroit, Mich., police force, has been appointed coordinator of Portland Town Council, a gay civil rights organization.

"It's amazing how few people realize that gay people have no legal rights if we're fired or evicted for no reason," said Ms. Forst, adding that she intends to "make a personal commitment to changing laws and attitudes so that lesbians and gay men will have some legal remedy when they're discriminated against."

She said her goal is passage during

the 1981 Oregon legislative session of a comprehensive statute forbidding discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation. in the s

Ms. Forst, 38, was born in Detroit, joined the police force in 1964 and became a sergeant in 1969. She left the force in 1972 after obtaining a law degree from Detroit College of Law.

In 1973, Ms. Forst moved to Oregon and became a law clerk to Herbert M. Schwab, chief justice of the Oregon Court of Appeals. Since 1976 she has worked for Community Law Project, a feminist legal collective.

• The Community Law Project (CLP), an allwomen, public-interest legal collective, is under attack by Oregon Bar Association members who want to change the definition of "public interest."

The changes would forbid the CLP from defining work on behalf of "unpopular or oppressed" clients as public-interest work. Lesbians and gay men are included in this category.

As a result of the proposed changes, the CLP could lose its nonprofit status, and gay people would lose an important ally.
