
Dear Sir:-

Replying to your communication of the 7th inst., relative to the complaint of Andrew Kan against the action of one of the officers in arresting one Dr. One You Sun beg to state that I have thoroughly investigated this matter and am attaching hereto a report of officer William Stein who made the arrest and also a report of Sergeant John A. Goltz, who was in charge of the station at the time.

Officer Stein is not a regular in the department but is serving as a special officer during the present strike troubles and on account of his inexperience may not have used the best of judgement. He admits taking the Doctor by the arm in bringing him to the station because he tried to get away from him when he placed him under arrest and states that he did not understand him in regard to his wanting to get his hat and coat. The officer was in plain clothes so consequently they would not be noticed by pedestrians on their way to the station. It is customary to seat prisoners behind the desk in the Captains office while waiting for their bail money.

The officer was evidently justified in arresting the Doctor as he was found guilty of violating the Ordinance as well as numerous others who were arrested on the same charge.

TO THE HONORABLE MEMBERS OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD,  
CITY OF PORTLAND.

GENTLEMEN:-

I beg to advise you that on February 3rd, 1910 the Committee on Police after hearing charges against the following Officers, made the following decisions:

Patrolman R.T.Stewart. Charges of neglect of duty and failure to properly patrol his beat sustained. Punishment a fine of \$100.00 to be deducted from pay for February and March 1910 and forfeited to the Police and Fire Relief Fund. The Chief of Police was instructed to severely reprimand Officer Stewart and to notify him that a repetition of his act or the infraction by him of the rules of the department in any other particular, will be punished by his dismissal from the service. The habit of loitering around Livery stables or other places cannot be too severely condemned.

Patrolman G.B.Spivey. Found guilty as charged in not properly patrolling his beat and leaving same without permission from his superior Officers. Punishment a fine of \$50.00 to be deducted from pay of February and March 1910, and forfeited to the Police and Fire Relief Fund. Patrolmen should be admonished that although they are peace officers at all times they must act strictly under orders during their hours of patrol duty and during said time must not assume to go off on their own responsibility without consultation with their superior officer and must give a full report of their actions afterwards. The Chief of Police is instructed to call officers attention to Section 36 of rule 6 of the Police Manual

and to see that they comply with the provisions set forth therein.

Patrolman Geo.L.Richards. Found guilty as charged in drinking intoxicating liquors while on duty and disobeying the orders of a superior officer. Punishment a fine of \$50.00 to be deducted from pay of February and March 1910, and forfeited to the Police and Fire Relief Fund. The Chief of Police is directed to caution this officer not to repeat the offense. It is necessary for patrolmen to understand that although the rules require them to maintain a certain inspection of places where liquor is sold this does not mean that they are to spend several minutes in saloons nor to go there more frequently than occasions warrant and must refrain at all times from drinking intoxicating liquors during their hours of duty.
