747	Zach L	Oppose	I would implore the council to stop spending money propping up our insolvent fossil fuel infrastructure and instead follow the Pricing and Equitable Mobility (POEM) task force's recommendations and reinvest parking revenue in what the final report terms "complimentary equitable mobility strategies" rather than doubling down on auto infrastructure. Alternative uses for these funds include safe routes to schools, our various "in motion" plans such as Central City in Motion, the rose lane project, and expanding the Biketown system by way of new stations and more bicycles. This contract for \$2m/year would be 15% of the entire parking garage revenue (about \$14m/year, according to PBOT documents). For this to pay off for PBOT, this would need to increase driving and parking in downtown garages by perhaps 30% per year. This is not only unrealistic, but works directly against our city's goals in reducing carbon emissions and improving land use/housing and traffic safety. Instead, PBOT should pursue this as a pilot- beef up security in one or both working garages for 6 to 12 months, define what the success criteria is, and see if it works. Paying a non-local private security firm \$6 for three years of an untested idea, when PBOT is so strapped for funds, and in debt due to structural problems caused by cars, seems practically corrupt.		09/05/23 8:59 PM
