

## REPORT OF 1939 PORTLAND FIRE DEPARTMENT MILK FUND DRIVE.

A meeting of the General Milk Fund committee was held at 12:00 need in the Portland Chamber of Commerce dining room November 1939 to launch the 1939 benefit football game and drive for the Fund. Mr. N. A. Boody, general chairman, presided. A full representation of committee members and of others interested in the success of the drive, was present. Mr. J. H. Luihn, chairman of the 1938 game was elected chairman of the 1938 game, after which chairmen of various sub-committees were selected to co-operate with him. The able manner in which Chairman Luihn and his co-chairmen, with their committee members, discharged their duties was highly responsible for the drive's success.

It was decided that the year's game should be, as heretofore, between the Inter-scholastic Champions and a team of All-Stars from the remaining high schools chosen by the sports writers of the two daily papers and the coaches of the various high schools; and that the game should be played friday, December and and be called at 100 P. M. to afford the many friends of the Milk Fund employed in the daytime an opportunity to attend.

As in previous years ticket sellers detailed for this service from the Portland Fire Department accounted for the major sale of tickets and it is pleasing to report that they were welcomed by every business concern upon which they called, and not one complaint of misrepresentation or high-pressure methods on their part was reported to this office by any person or concern solicited by them. Members of the Department so detailed were:

Captains Harry Amacher, Frank L. Nitsch, O. F. Thompson and Hosemen Ernest R. Bills, John S. Mattes, Henry Reed, S. P. Stevens.

As heretofore, the drive had the active support and co-operation of the school authorities and principals headed by Superintendent of Schools Ralph Dugdale, of the churches, of the Parent-Teacher Association and of the School Nurse Division of the Health Bureau of the city of Portland.

Mrs. Sylvia Riggs, president of the Rotana Club, acting as chairman of the activity, presented the message of the Fund with the help of twenty young boys and girls from the Progressive Oregonians to over thirty-five civic clubs with most gratifying results and response.

Nine high school and two grade school assemblies were attended by the General Secretary accompanied by Mr. Victor Brown in charge of entertainment, where messages were delivered and entertaining programs were presented assisted by the Royal Hawaiian orchestra supplied by the Norks Progress Administration.

The big milk bottle was erected on the Old Post Office lawn at Fifth and Morrison streets and six noon ballyhoos were held in front of same with various speakers heard over the public address system furnished by the Associated Oil Company, together with music by the Works Progress Administration band and Royal Hawaiian orchestra.

All radio stations generously contributed time on the air resulting in thirteen special radio programs of music and speaking being given, together with twenty-seven "spot" announcements.

The three daily papers and some twenty community papers of the city gave liberally of space both in news and sport columns and in the case of the Sunday papers, in their magazine sections. The sports writers of the city and their editors gave full support to the game and drive.

This year the Fund had the honor and aid of obtaining the official endorsement of the national commander of the American Legion, Hon. Stephen F. Chadwick, who, over his signature, heartily endorsed our program and work, urging local legion posts to do all possible in furthering our objectives.

As a notable contribution to their team work and victory, Mr. Henry Thiele gave three dinners in his diring room to the members of the All-Stars and their coaches prior to the game for round table discussion and "pep" talks.

A further appreciated contribution was that of 1000 student tickets given collectively by business concerns of the city to the Perent-Teacher Association for distribution among under-privileged children that they might attend the game, and 1000 street car tickets furnished by Mr. Franklin T. Griffith, president of the Portland Traction Company to take children having no other transportation to and from the game.

Ticket sellers and workers from this office were materially aided in the work of the drive by contributions of 450 gellons of gasoline by the Standard Oil Company and the Signal Oil Company.

Mr. Morris Rogoway, jeweler, donated a trophy to be awarded to the high school selling the greatest number of tickets, the winner not having been decided at this date; and finally, merchants of the city contributed food, etc. for a fine banquet to members of the two football teams and of the committee at the Masonic Temple where each player was presented with a miniature gold football as a memento and token of appreciation by the Fund committee, the presentation being made by Mayor Joseph K. Carson Jr., assisted by Commissioner R. E. Riley.

The Milk Fund and its activities is administered from the Milk Fund office, 910 Public Service Building. The rent for same is donated by the Pacific Power & Light Company, owner of the building. Office help, comprising a stenographer and a typist, is supplied by the Works Progress Administration.

The Portland Fire Department Milk Fund is now in its seventh year and has distributed over one million bottles of Grade "A" milk among the under-privileged school children of the city during its existence. As a result of the 1933 drive it now has sufficient funds available to assure the continuance of its program in the 134 public and parochial schools of the city up to 60,000 bottles of milk monthly with a reserve of over \$4,000 in a separate savings account set aside for any emergency affecting its program that might arise. As a result of the work of the Fund and publicity given thereto in our press and over the radio and by members of our committee, many other cities throughout the country have adopted or contemplate adopting like programs.

As general secretary of the Fund I welcome this opportunity to thank city and county officials officials and members of my department, the School Nurse Division of the Public Health Bureau, the Parent-Teachers Association, the public and parchial school officials and teachers, the press and radio stations, the churches, contesting players, and the people and football fans of the city for their co-operation with this office and for their confidence and support given me in the administration of the Fund and its activities. At the request of your Committee, we have audited the records of the Portland Milk Fund from date of our previous audit, January 10 1938, to and including the 10th. of January 1939, and now submit for your attention, report covering Receipts and Disbursements for that period.

The Financial condition of the fund, as disclosed by attached report, has been materially bettered, although a great decrease in receipts from boxing shows is indicated. Football receipts were materially greater and account for the larger part of receipts.

During the period under review a total of \$6,068.18 was expended for milk for direct distribution through the schools and other agencies.

The overhead expenses of operating this Fund have been kept to a minimum; office rent and clerical help are donated through the Pacific Power & Light and P. W. A. and the greater amount of office expense covers postage and stationery supplies.

Your attention is called to the small amount of interest earned on Savings Account of \$4,000.00. It is our opinion that this amount could be invested to greater advantage at the same time preserving its liquid status with safety. This matter should be given your careful consideration.

The matter of handling all bank records, cash and deposits through the main office has been brought to the attention of your staff and will be carried out in future. We have made proper adjustments of distribution of receipts and expenditures to bring them in line and bank balances have been verified.

With the large amount of detail incident to the handling of football games, we find that the records are exceptionally well kept and those in charge are giving their best efforts in carrying out this meritorious work and are to be commended therefor.

The item of \$125.00 set up as an expenditure for advance payment on automobile is in fact a loan from the fund to be repaid under guarantee of the Executive Committee and this amount will be restored to the assets of the Fund.
