PHB Budget Advisory Committee

Overview

The PHB budget advisory committees (BAC) is a convening of community partners and staff who review the financial inputs that will compose our upcoming fiscal year budget and advise us on discretionary decisions.

Goals

- To increase community involvement in the management of City resources;
- To gain understanding of PHB and the relationship between the bureau and the needs of the individuals who access its services
- To provide recommendations to PHB regarding goals, priorities, policies and budgets.

PHB Budget Advisory Committee

Meeting One (January 11, 3:00-5:00)

Provide an overview of the fiscal conditions that will impact our budget priorities, including our budget guidance from the City of Portland; we'll answer your questions; and describe areas where we have discretion in our finances that you can help to shape.

Meeting Two (January 25, 3:00-5:00)

Review how your input was integrated in our decision-making, present new information on returning resources, ask for your recommendations for spending priorities.

Budget Advisory Committee Recommendations

BAC Meeting One Discussion Questions

- 1) The 5% budget constraint equates to 1% of the Bureau's budget and approximately \$212K; we intend to reduce administrative costs that can be absorbed without impacting services to the community or reducing our workforce. Do you agree with this approach?
- 2) What opportunities do you see for the bureau as we move to a new form of government? What excites you? What concerns you?
- 3) Regardless of budget, where would you most like to see PHB focus in the year ahead?

BAC Meeting One Recommendations


- Support for the proposed bureau approach of meeting the 5% budget constraint (approximately \$212K) by reducing administrative costs that can be absorbed without impacting services to the community or reducing our workforce.
- Operational support for buildings with PSH security
- Services support for PSH advocacy to increase funding levels
- Affordable Housing Preservation



Returning Resource Recommendations

Returning Resource


- The total amount of the returning TIF resources for FY24-25 is \$7.6 Million.
- Approximately \$2.3 Million in returning TIF is allocated to PHB programs and services
- The remaining balance supports PHB operation: staff retention and internal services.

Additional funding for affordable housing projects with preservation needs - \$1 Million




Master Plan for Ellington Redevelopment

Use returning resources to hire a master planner for Ellington redevelopment - \$400,000



Additional Grants to PSH Providers

Additional grants to PSH providers for one-time security costs and/or repairs - \$500,000




Prepare Mt. Tabor Annex Property for Development

Demolition and Community Outreach Mt. Tabor - \$500,000



Eviction Legal Defense

Additional funding to prevent the eviction of vulnerable renter households - \$300,000



Down Payment Assistance Loans

Provide first time homebuyers with down payment assistance loans up to \$80K each – \$500,000



Home Repair Grants

Assist additional households with home repair grants (up to \$15 K) citywide - \$200,000
