Proposal to Equity Foundation

Portland has been identified as highest in the nation for anti-gay bias incidents as reported by the victim assistance program. The Measure 9 fight has left lasting divisions among groups that should be supportive of each other in fighting oppression (see attached articles). The number of recent articles supporting true diversity is an indication of the need to revitalize the commonality of the struggle for freedom from oppression.

The Metropolitan Human Rights Commission (MHRC) is applying to Equity Foundation to fund a Harvey Milk poster, one of a series of posters honoring Human Rights Activists. This series, which will include Martin Luther King, Jr., Mohandras Ghandi, Abigail Scott Duniway, Harvey Milk and other human rights activists from the Hispanic, disabled and other populations, will be a visible demonstration of their common fight for Human Freedom.

MHRC intends to seek funding for the other posters from organizations and corporations, and hopes to be able to use the Equity Foundation example of funding as a marketing tool.

The Harvey Milk poster project will acheive the following objectives:

- 1) Provide a vehicle for MHRC to reach out and show respect, in a tangible way, to the gay community.
- 2) Provide a means of keeping the MHRC phone number and address before the metropolitan community.
- 3) Provide a means of recruiting volunteers to work on MHRC projects. As people call or come in to acquire the poster, they will be added to our mailing list, and will be sent information on MHRC mission and projects.
- 4) Provide the metropolitan community with a public servant role model from the gay community.
- 5) Raise some funds to expand the MHRC's ability to carry out its mission.
- By highlighting the fact that this is a series on Human Rights advocates, who shared their commitment to this cause, the divisions between the various minority communities will be lessened.

The \$1,200 request includes all costs of producing the art, typesetting and printing of the poster. The Harvey Milk Poster (2,000 copies) will be produced in time for Gay Pride Day, June 19, and will be an additional point of publicity for that event. The funds from Equity Foundation will be needed within 30 days of the poster printing. Acknowledgement of the Equity Foundation grant will be printed on the poster.

The posters will not only highlight Harvey Milk's commitment to human rights, but will also serve to publicize the mission and phone number of MHRC (which will increase volunteer recruitment) and will clearly demonstrate that the official City and County policy is to support human rights and diversity.

Target date for poster production is May 24, to allow time for distribution by June 19, Portland's Gay Pride Day, so that publicity will be generated for gay rights, MHRC, and Harvey Milk as a public servant role model.

The Harvey Milk poster will be distributed to City/County agencies to be posted on bulletin boards in June, and it will be available at a nominal cost (approx. \$5) from MHRC, which wil be used to carry out the MHRC mission. Equity Foundation will be credited on the poster, which will enhance the Foundation's visibility in the community.

The success of the poster will be evaluated through sales of the poster and by tracking inquiries to MHRC for a 3 month period following poster distribution. Where appropriate, callers will be asked how they heard of MHRC (some of the calls curently received at MHRC are from people in extreme emotional distress, and such questions may be inappropriate).

Oregon Civil Rights Laws - Where to Complain

The Bureau of Labor and Industries is the state agency responsible for enforcing the Civil Rights laws. Any person claiming to be harmed by an unlawful practice of discrimination in employment, housing, and public accommodations may file a complaint with the Civil Rights Division of the Oregon Bureau of Labor and Industries. The number in Portland is 731-4075.

The Bureau of Labor and Industries, commonly called BOLI, also contracts with the Federal government to handle certain complaints and is responsible for enforcement of the City's Civil Rights ordinance.

It is against the law to discriminate against someone because of membership in a protected class, however, the protected classes are not the same in the four categories of employment, housing, public accommodation and professional or trade schools.

The classes protected in all four categories are: race, color, national origin, religion, sex, martial status and physical or mental disability. In the City of Portland, discrimination because of sexual orientation and source of income are also illegal.

There is a time limitation on filing and settling of complaints making it imperative that complaints be brought to BOLI immediately. Details on the Civil Rights laws can be found in the booklet "Oregon Civil Rights Laws," available from BOLI for

a small charge. To make the law work, citizens have the responsibility of filing the complaints.

A Chance to Serve

The Metropolitan Human Rights Commission provides a volunteer opportunity to deal with the most important issues of the day -- protecting human rights, eliminating bigotry and enhancing a sense of community.

The fifteen Commissioners, appointed by the Mayor and the County Chair serve three year terms. The Commission's function is to maintain dialogue with a broad range of community and cultural groups and to develop and implement policy based on that dialogue.

The present Commission is in its first year and has an exciting future planned.

Commission terms begin in September. Applications for appointments are available at the MHRC office. Helen Cheek, Executive Director, welcomes the opportunity to discuss the Commission with interested persons.

Dear Thomas,

Thank you for taking the time to discuss the Human Rights Advocates Poster series with me. We are gratified that Equity Foundation has agreed to provide a grant to produce the Harvey Milk poster.

One of the purposes of producing the posters as a series is to demonstrate the moral universality of the commitment to Human Rights.

There is, however, a difficulty with the condition regarding the size and placement of the Equity Foundation acknowledgement on an equal size/line with the logo of the Metropolitan Human Rights Commission.

The design of the main part of the poster series will, of necessity, vary, depending on the picture of the specific Human Rights Advocate, any symbols (such as the pink triangle Harvey's picture is in), and the amount and nature of the quotes that are used.

The unifying features of the artwork were intended to be the headline of the name of the Advocate, a central quote, and the Metropolitan Human Rights Commission logo at the bottom.

Including the Equity Foundation logo on an equal size basis would remove the artistic integrity of the design, and would set a precedent for having to include other logos (such as the League of Women's Voters for the Abigail Scott Duniway poster we intend to produce). Other contributors, like the Estate of Harvey Milk, and Rink Photo could also ask for "equal billing" and this would require re-opening negotiations with them. This could delay or prevent production of the poster in time for Gay Pride Day. It would detract from the visual message of Harvey's quotes and the other purpose, which is to spread the word about MHRC's role in our area.

Most of the posters I have seen that are sponsored by other groups include a sponsor line similar to the ones we have proposed.

It would be greatly appreciated if Equity Foundation would permit us to accept the grant using

approximately the attached layout and acknowledgement. The estate has also asked us to include an additional line protecting their copyright. It should be remembered that the actual size of the Equity Foundation logo will be larger on the poster, which is 18" x 24", and would be clearly visible.

Also, the condition allowing Equity Foundation to reproduce the poster in its publications is acceptable, as long as the entire poster including the MHRC logo is reproduced.

The positive reaction we have received from people who have seen the mockup of the poster indicates that it will have strong acceptance and distribution throughout our community.

Thank you for taking my call last week. As we discussed, the Metropolitan Human Rights Commission is a City of Portland and Multnomah County (Oregon) agency charged with fostering tolerance, diversity and the recognition of basic human rights.

We are interested in doing a poster to honor Harvey Milk as a human rights advocate, and would like to get permission to use his likeness and quotes on the poster. I have enclosed a copy of the Martin Luther King, Jr. poster we produced. We also intend to do additional posters honoring Mahatma Ghandi and a diverse group of other human rights advocates.

We intend to distribute some of the posters free of charge, although it is possible that we may want to recover the costs of production. Any funds raised above that would be used to further the cause of human rights. If we commission an artist to do a rendering of a photo, (which may be a copyrighted photo), are we obligated to pay any royalties/fees for the use of the drawing?

May we use excerpts from published speeches without infringing copyright laws, if we quote them from a book or from newspaper articles? Do we have to list the source?

If we use quotes from a book, do we have to pay royalties if we list the source?

If we were to use a copyright photo, and sold the posters to recover costs, what mechanism should we use to pay for the use of the photo?

Does the estate have the right to expect to be paid royalties (e.g. Elvis) for this poster? Can they prevent us from publishing/selling the poster?
