

Last Thursday I came across the enclosed flier in the downtown area. As I meditated on it I felt moved to write you a letter. I cannot understand why, in a city as beautiful as Portland, our leadership continues to allow sex-oriented demonstrations to persist in our streets. I have been working with our judicial system for some time now in trying to bring moral reform to Portland. I have even taken a foster son who had spent 15 months in jail into my own home in this effort. I have invested much time in others at one of the local half-way homes (Youth Progress) in trying to help them find productive places in our community. One very recently by the name of Terry Jacobs was doing just fine until he was introduced to homosexuality by those from that community. This has destroyed his life! All progress he had made has been stopped, and now he has even contracted gonorrhoea in the anal area. This young man is only 19 years old! I have heard of many, many other cases that are very similar. I voted for you because I felt you represented strong leadership in cleaning up our city. You have shown yourself very capable in city management even before you were our mayor (e.g. your involvement in the 17th and Powell crossing), but our city needs more than geographical order (as I am sure you well know). This Gay Pride parade does not put our city in good light. It is embarrassing to citizens like myself who are trying to help you and many others in bringing peace to our neighborhoods. 
I appreciate receiving your views regarding my comments on the need for additional prison space.



Dear Sir:

For quite some time I've been wanting to write to the mayor concerning some things about Portland, and since I've finally sat down and did it, you are going to be the recipient.

1. Several years ago S. W. Broadway was turned into a one-way street, but its N.W. part remained a two-way one. Since the city has taken away Fifth and Sixth Aves. for malls and driving on them is prohibited, I would like to request that we have S.W. Broadway returned to us as a two-way street. We need it that way, as driving in downtown Portland gets more and more complicated. I don't drive downtown any more than I have to; but, when one sometimes has to go four to six blocks or more in order to turn one, then something has to change--especially since we're supposed to save gasoline, oil, and tires these days. So, here's hoping you can promote the change.

2. There are several places where left-turn street lights are badly needed--two of which are SE. 20th & Stark (four-way) and SE. Division & 82nd--for turning left--north--on 82nd. There are lights for the other direction, but unless some have been put up lately, such lights should be put there. Also 39th & Belmont for turning south.

3. There should be a stop signal or safety lane device at Belmont and 45th Ave. Traffic there can be hazardous to one's health, especially since there is no stop signal between 39th & 49th. Often that area can be a raceway.

4. I also would like to see the laws changed so that one can drive on well-lighted streets in early evenings or mornings with just the parking light on--especially in rainy weather. Full headlights can be blinding in rainy weather. Natural light is always better than artificial. Also, halogen lights should be banned everywhere---they're horrible!

4. I have lived in Portland all my life, and I do not like to see Portland growing into an overcrowded city with forty story buildings--who needs them? They shut off the views from east to west side and vice-versa. That 40-story bank bldg. shur cut off the view from Ione Plaza! I also do not like the idea of the new promoters of the business and hotel complex around Yamhill and Taylor Sts considering building another tall structure in their area---I'm glad the Canadian caper failed.

5. I will agree that we need a new department store-- such as the kind that the old Meier & Frank company was---that catered to all people, not just the youth---and one could get all kinds of merchandise therein that they cannot get there now under the May Co. setup. I wish the May Co. would stop using the Meier & Frank name, because it shur isn't M & F any more.

6. Voters recently approved the new performing arts center. The idea for it was fine, but where are people going to park around there on any given evening when you consider how tight the parking is from PSU, the Masonic Temple, any church meetings etc. ==all in that area? That is the reason I did not vote for that project.

I think sumbuddy shur goofed when they decided to remodel the Pioneer Square parking facility into a park. Why in heaven's name didn't the powers that be use their heads and put parking underneath the square such as the one in San Francisco--Union Square. Then a performing arts center a few blocks away would have made more sense. *(of course the first goof was when they tore down the Portland Hotel.)*

7. Around ten years ago parking places were taken away around the Park Ave. and Mill St. perimeter of PSU, the sidewalks widened etc., all because at that time somebody was sure Portland was to have mass transportation and fewer autos would be driven. As it has turned out, there are more cars around there now than before; it has been a horrible mess trying to find parking around there when one needed to go into the Ione Plaza to visit somebody either for a few minutes to a few hours--I'm glad I don't have to do it any more. In the intervening years there have been parking garages and outdoor parking areas built to accommodate the PSU student body and faculty, but not too many of them at night use them. Instead, they park on the streets, leaving little or no room for civilian parking. I sympathize with the students' having to pay for parking, but do they have to monopolize the whole area? Something should be done to restore those parking spots that were taken away by the university, or else let civilians use PSU parking areas.

The Ione accommodates only four cars at a time, and presumably for a ten-minute period. Ridiculous!

Something else that hasn't made sense to me is the present plan for the light rail system, because it seems to be going out of its way to get to town; however, since I don't know that much about it I shouldn't comment.

Thanks for letting me sound off, and hope some of these ideas will be put into effect.





Dear Mayor Ivancie,

As you know very well, crime is a complex phenomenon, difficult to understand or control. We know that the police, by themselves, cannot prevent crimes. We do know that the complexity of crime increases with the size of the community. The Neighborhoods Against Crime program has identified two factors in the control of crime that small communities have over large urban areas. These are neighbors being aware of each other and watching out for each other. This amounts to social control of the environment and safer neighborhoods.

The NAC Neighborhood Watch program is an economical, successful effort to develop a sense of shared responsibility to reduce crime. The program unites neighbors in a systematic approach, essentially making individuals aware of each other and the types of crime around them, then showing them ways to help each other stop criminal activity.

It would be a shame to lose a program that delivers so much for so little. Because I've witnessed the positive effect of NAC efforts in the southeast, I felt that I should write to you in support of the program. Neighborhoods Against Crime is an essential part of SE Portland's battle against crime; NAC enjoys the support of the police as well as the community and I urge you to support NAC thru city general funds.

Dear Mayor Ivancie,

It is my understanding that on June 24th the city council is to consider an ordinance to establish a new Crime Prevention Unit with coordinators in each neighborhood office through out the city. The job descriptions and budget amounts for this program sounds much like the ones developed for Neighborhoods Against Crime. This as I suspect you know, was a program funded by the Federal Government grant. In rereading the objectives and goals of this program, one thing stands out very clearly. The one main goal for this project was to establish, at the end of eighteen months (extended to two years) a self sustaining, all volunteer crime prevention program in every neighborhood. It would seem that this goal has not been achieved.

I hope you study this proposal with great care. The budget allows for an ample salary but I think provides VERY LIMITED monetary tools with which to develop and maintain any meaningful, successful Crime Prevention programs. In my view poor usage of our tax dollars.

We already have an excellent Crime Prevention Unit in our Portland Police Department with highly skilled, trained personnel. They provide the training, & education for neighborhood watch, rape prevention, lock installation and any of the programs the neighborhood coordinator would request (as they do now). I believe that giving these funds to an existing division that already has the experieees, knoweledge of each neighborhoods special needs, and the trained personnel would not only beamore prudent use of public funds but provide the citizens with a much higher level of crime prevention techniques.

# Gay activity forces state to close scenic rest stop

WEST LINN — The scenic Willamette Falls rest stop on the southbound side of I-205 will have to be closed because other means of cooling its popularity as a homosexual trysting place have failed, the state Highway Division said Wednesday.

Concrete barricades will be set up to blockade the area, which has restrooms, picnic tables and a

magnificent view of Oregon City and the Willamette River.

A simple viewpoint parking area on the other side of the freeway will stay open for the time being, state State Highway Engineer H. Scott Coulter said.

Almost 150 arrests have been made for various types of male homosexual activity, according to Ross Cravens, Clackamas County chief deputy district attorney.

The rest area averaged 350 vehicles a day during a week-long test traffic count recently, according to Mike Smith of the Milwaukie district highway office.

West Linn Police Chief Art Enderlin said his office threw in the towel and asked for the closure after it became obvious that numerous arrests had not slowed reduced the incidents.

Just the opposite, said Enderlin: Publicity appeared to act as advertising.

Numerous professional people were among the violators, he said. Some said they had driven up from Northern California to join the activities.

They have included ministers, a grade-school principal, a doctor, school teachers, an engineer and a biologist.

One recent Sunday afternoon, Craven said, a woman said she and her husband left the rest stop in outrage after seeing two men openly exchanging homosexual acts atop a picnic table.

More common, the attorney said, is dating in the restroom followed by consummation in a nearby brush patch.

Police Chief Enderlin said he has been told by Highway Division maintenance people that erasing or painting over telephone numbers and offers written on the wall has become an expensive proposition.

But the policing has been even more expensive. His force, which has 16 officers, has spent more than \$8,000 trying to control the nuisance.

SUBJ: Worbington v. City of Portland, et al

The above referenced District Court case is one of the six lawsuits presently filed stemming from the SID investigation. In fact, Robin Worbington was one of the three individuals arrested on the night of the Outsider's raid on December 12, 1979, and was ultimately convicted for possession of controlled substances.

We have now received a Request for Production of Documents, one item of which potentially impacts the Mayor's office. The following request, itemized as interrogatory no. 11 asks for

Any and all documents relating to or which could reasonably lead to the discovery of information relating to communications from, to, with, between or among Neil Goldschmidt, Frank Ivancie, Charles Jordan, Bruce Baker, Ron Still, James Brouillette, Melvin Hulett, Rob H. Aichele or anyone else on the Portland City Council or any member of the Portland Police Bureau regarding police misconduct.

For your information, we intend to object to the scope of this interrogatory on the grounds that it is overly broad and harassing. However, anticipating that Mayor Ivancie's intra-bureau correspondence pertaining to police misconduct may ultimately be discoverable, I would appreciate any assistance you might be able to give me in locating such correspondence. A response to these interrogatories is not due until October 26, 1981. Thanks for you help.



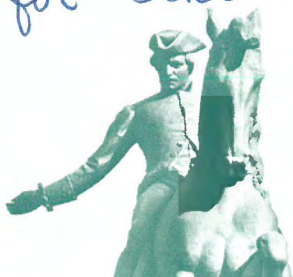

I am responding to your letter to Mayor Ivancie regarding Adult and Family Service assistance requirements. This program is administered by the State of Oregon so your concerns would best be addressed to the State Ombudsman at 229-5700. Criteria for public assistance is set at the State level so questions and options should be explored with State employees.

It is indeed a tough job market we are faced with here in Portland. I am enclosing yellow pages from a phone directory which may give you some ideas on places where your application for work could be submitted.

I also suggest the private employment agencies who do not charge a fee for day labor jobs. These temporary opportunities may give you some income until something more permanent comes along. Also check daily or weekly with the State Employment office nearest your residence.

The Tri-County Information and Referral Office (222-5555) may have additional ideas. Also you might call the Northwest Food Processors Association (226-2848) in the Cascade Plaza. The Oregon Hotel and Motel Association (255-5135) 12724 SE Stark may have some job leads. Contact Restaurants of Oregon Association (223-2243) Terminal Sales Building. Maybe if you write a certain number of letters a week, listing your qualifications, the effort may pay dividends. A professional, business-like approach, including the presentation of a resume, puts any applicant in a good position to be considered, where opportunities do exist. You write a good letter!

I hope I have been of some help to you. Good luck!

As a resident of Oregon, I will like to communicate to you my displeasure of the current Welfare System. Recently released from the Oregon State Penitentiary I found a job working at the Oregon Oyster Co. in downtown Portland. But for reasons of occasional illness I was terminated from the job (as a cook), after only 3 weeks of employment. Having a hard time trying to find a new job, I went to the welfare office for some monetary assistance, but was told that in order to qualify for assistance I would need a letter from a Dr. stating my inability to work for this month.

Well, my complaint is this, how can I obtain a letter from a Dr. when my illness is transient and not permanent? Right now I find myself quite fit for employment and do not wish indefinite assistance but only till such time when once again require employment. It isn't easy for an ex-offender to obtain employment and my bills are beginning to stack-up.

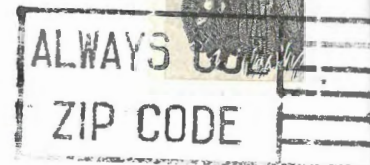

I like to work and the fact that I obtained an A-A degree from Chemeketa C. College while incarcerated easily speak of my ability as a productive human being.

Please understand that I'm neither begging or looking for a "free ride" but simply requesting your sympathy to this thoria because I do want to get back on my own two feet. Assistance for the next 2 months would be of tremendous value thus it would also allow me time to search for a fair job.

I will like to anticipate my gratitude for whatever help you can give me and at the same wish you good luck at re-elections.

An employment counselor for the State can check their computer, so you might want to look into it, if you haven't already.

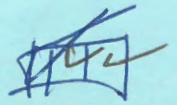
