What have we accomplished as a committee?

- Setting new standards and expectations for planning teams when it comes to engagement. This shows up as projects trying different methods of reaching community without direction from the Committee.
- Diverse representation.

What have been your contributions?

- Contributing different points of view and lived experiences.
- Communicate community needs and expectations.

Part 2 – Community-facing Privacy Policy Development and Surveillance Policy: Hector Dominguez

Data Privacy and Smart Cities

We are inviting people to help us create policy. Utilizing the IAP2 Spectrum of engagement we are trying to push towards empowering people in giving voice to what goes through and what doesn't.

Challenges: Lack of incentives to participate, recurring members with low diversity, lack of government support, locations are not accessible to communities (downtown events), lack of accessibility, reduced staff capacity. Highly political and emotional content. Multicultural literacy.

Main advisors are internal (OEHR). Multiple workgroups to inform the work.

Respondents by income to outreach: 62% reported making \$75,000 or more a year, mostly white, mostly women,

Empowerment needs and resources – fundraising \$200k for Portland People’s Council on AI and surveillance

Missing Groups – Mistrust, lack of connections / capacity, issues are complex and people don’t know enough

Big differences in power dynamics

Building community and authority within City government

Building networks of champions
