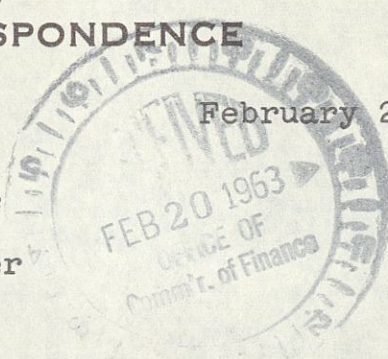

Subject Salary, A. L. Frost, Metropolitan Youth Commission Director.



Reference is made to the attached copy of a letter from L. W. Aylsworth, Chairman of the Board of the County Commissioners, dated December 26, 1962. Commissioner Aylsworth's letter to the Mayor is somewhat misleading in that there is an error relating to the current salary of Mr. Frost and the salary which was apparently agreed upon for the 1962-63 period.

Mr. Frost is currently receiving \$758 per month, which is \$75.00 more per month than indicated by Commissioner Aylsworth. His annual salary at present is approximately \$9100. The 1962-63 preliminary budget for the Metropolitan Youth Commission was apparently approved by the City's sub-budget committee (Bean, Setterberg, and Slayton) for \$833 per month for Mr. Frost (\$9996 per year). Apparently, the County initially concurred in paying this amount to Mr. Frost, but one of the County Commissioners modified it in August, 1962. Mr. Frost was not aware that his salary had been changed over the approved budget until the first of August when he received his July pay. In any event, it is apparent at this point that the salary rate of approximately \$10,000 per year has already met the approval of the Budget Review committees. It is suggested that you discuss this point further with Mr. Setterberg.

I spoke with Mrs. Curry in the Mayor's Office at some length relating to the above matter. I also mentioned to her that it is typical of most commission members to feel that the services of their director or executive secretary are most valuable and should receive adequate compensation. Unfortunately, these same directors are not aware of the general salary levels of other commission or bureau heads and the problem that both the City and County Commissioners have in maintaining peace in the family.

The \$10,000 annual salary would put the Youth Commission Director on a par with the Civil Service Director, the Assistant Planning Director and the Park Maintenance Director. That rate would be \$600 more than the Purchasing Agent receives, and \$900 more than the City Treasurer, Recreation Director, or Medical Director of Public Health Nursing; \$1100 more than the head of the Women's Protective Division and the Zoo

Dear Mr. McCall:

As one of the appointing officials on the Metropolitan Youth Commission and as Mayor of the City of Portland, I have been asked to give support to the recently enacted Senate Bill 2036 and the pending House of Representatives' Bill 7536.

It is my understanding that these bills stress on-the-job training and useful work experiences solely for youth and subsidized by the government. While it is my opinion that young people must be trained adequately for their future financial responsibilities as well as for the full utilization of their potentialities, I also feel that by doing so, they must not be allowed to become unfairly competitive to adults now looking for employment. We must recognize that automation and over-production have left an army of unemployed adults. We must also realize that if we continue to dump inexperienced and untrained people into the labor market, that our problems will multiply with each new year and at a high rate.

It is, therefore, more plausible to me that any legislation enacted at this time should allow for proportionate numbers of youth and adults to be trained and/or retrained in new fields in order to restore the balance of work and employment needs.


More and more the pendulum is swinging from the older out-moded methods to new automated production which leaves us with a work force unable to find employment who must be retrained to develop new skills to meet our demanding needs in a changing and competitive society. The young people must also be trained to meet today's challenges. It is, therefore, my suggestion that the legislation be changed to develop on-the-job and scholastic training to embrace all ages of the employable.

While I realize that this man's educational background and experience are unique and that he has personal qualifications most suitable for his position, there are perhaps other factors to consider. One of these is that he has no staff except for a secretary. One position which I feel is similar to this, insofar as educational levels and experience requirements, is that of Probation and Parole Director. The latter has two professional parole officers working for him in addition to clerical assistance. The wage level of this class, however, is substantially lower than the current rate or the projected rate for Mr. Frost.

My dear Mayor Schruck:

Mr. Dick Fagan, Chairman of the Budget Committee of the Metropolitan Youth Commission, met with the Board of County Commissioners about an increase in salary for the Director, A. L. (Jack) Frost. The request was for an increase of \$150.00 a month, setting the salary at \$833.00, which was the original budget request of the Commission. The adjustment was requested as of January 1, 1963.

The Board of County Commissioners considers this to be a reasonable request, and agrees in principle with the Youth Commission request. However, as one-half of this increase would be paid by the City, we felt it advisable to contact you for an official expression from the City Council. If the Council concurs with the request, please forward the Resolution expressing this concurrence and we will see that the change is made.



Regarding the third phase of the Bill, I urge creation of a Youth Conservation Corps on an even more broadened basis than the minimal pilot program now proposed. The need for a pilot program to prove the worth of a Youth Conservation Corps would be unnecessary. While it is not the main value or purpose, I did find that during World War II, when I was a Navy Officer, I had former CCC boys whose training had made them more adjusted and mature than many of the youngsters without it. I would also like to see the Corps develop training programs that would encourage young men to learn crafts and sciences which would materially benefit the conservation programs in the years to come. The stabilization of our economy and security could be greatly strengthened through the training these young men would receive in the conservation of soil, water and forest resources.

PRESS RELEASE

An 11-member Metropolitan Youth Commission will be set up jointly by the City and the County in the interest of youth guidance and to help prevent and control juvenile delinquency.

Mayor Terry D. Schrunk and Chairman M. James Gleason, of the Multnomah County Board of Commissioners released details on the proposed new citizens youth organization at a press conference Friday.

Establishment of such a Metropolitan Youth Commission was a major recommendation two years ago of a 35-member "Citizens Committee on Juvenile Delinquency" appointed jointly by the City and the County. Under the joint venture, a full-time Youth Commission director will be named to coordinate and program youth activities on a metropolitan basis. Offices will be in the Multnomah County Court House.

The new Youth Commission will be given the help of two subordinate advisory units - one a 20-member citizen's board; the other, a "junior" board of teenage representatives from each of the area's high schools.

The City of Portland and Multnomah County will share expenses of the Commission equally. County government will administer the youth agency's budget; the City will reimburse it for half of the expenses semi-annually.

The agreement for establishment of a Metropolitan Youth Commission, to be signed by Mayor Schrunk for the City, and all three Multnomah County Commissioners, gives these specific reasons for its inception:

1. Because of the present-day mobility of youth and the expected increase in youth population, the practical approach to juvenile problems is necessarily metropolitan in scope.
2. There is need to increase cooperation among governmental and established voluntary agencies responsible for child guidance and the prevention and control of delinquency.

3. A Commission is necessary to act as liaison agency between the general public, the existing youth agencies and youth itself, within City and County jurisdiction.
4. A specific provision in the make-up of the new body prohibits any City or County officers or employees from being appointed to the Commission. For all practical purposes, the Commission will be made up of interested citizens at large.

Commission members will be appointed by the Mayor and Chairman of the Board of County Commissioners for one-year terms at the outset. Thereafter, appointments will be for 2-year terms, half by the Mayor and half by the County Chairman, on an alternating basis.

Under terms of the joint agreement, the Commission must be activated within three months after the initial appointment of members. They will serve at the pleasure of appointing authorities but may be terminated by resignation.

This qualification is also written into the organizational make-up: any member who files for election to a public office, or goes on the City or County payroll, must relinquish his place on the Commission. Vacancies will be re-filled by the appointing member - either the Mayor or the Chairman of the County Commissioners.

Requirements for appointment to the 20-member subordinate Youth Advisory Board, are less restrictive. They shall be persons active in the fields of education, health, child guidance, recreation, or juvenile correction.

The Junior Advisory Board will include one student representative from each secondary school within the City and County - public, private and parochial. They, as the senior board will serve one-year terms.

Appointment of a full-time staff director will be made by the Commission itself, subject to approval by the Mayor and the County Commissioners. The Director will employ his own Secretary. Their salaries will be fixed by the City and County.

The Commission will have these specific responsibilities:

1. To provide information on the nature and causes of juvenile delinquency and the extent and effectiveness of existing youth services and facilities.
2. Determine the needs and shortcomings of youth guidance practices and the present methods for combating juvenile delinquency.

3. Conduct programs and coordinate activities for the prevention, reduction and control of juvenile delinquency.
4. Provide the leadership needed to direct the activities of existing agencies having responsibility for child guidance and delinquency prevention - removing unnecessary duplications.
5. Recommend new techniques for prevention and reduction of delinquency within the framework of existing budgetary restrictions and available facilities.
6. Recommend needed changes in existing laws, statutes and ordinances - that is, suggest new legislation if such is deemed desirable.
7. Prepare an annual report for the City and County, evaluating the Commission's work, its reports, findings and recommendations.

The legal machinery for creation of the joint City-County youth agency has been in preparation for three months.

Mayor Schrunk will bring the agreement and an enabling ordinance before the City Council next week for full approval. The Board of County Commissioners will act on its own to ratify the action.

ORDINANCE NO.

An Ordinance authorizing the Mayor and Auditor to enter into an agreement with the Board of County Commissioners of Multnomah County for the establishment of a metropolitan youth commission, authorizing the drawing and delivery of warrants, and declaring an emergency.

The City of Portland does ordain as follows:

Section 1. The Council finds that there is need for a commission to act as liaison between the general public, our metropolitan youth, and those governmental and voluntary agencies and organizations in this area having an established responsibility for child guidance and the prevention and control of delinquency, to make studies, determine needs and shortcomings, recommend new techniques and practices and needed changes in existing laws, to provide needed leadership, and to conduct programs and carry on and coordinate activities for the prevention, reduction and control of juvenile delinquency; that the problem of juvenile delinquency is metropolitan in scope; that the Portland-Multnomah Citizens Committee on juvenile delinquency, in its report dated March, 1958, recommended that a Metropolitan Youth Commission be established by the City and the County of Multnomah to accomplish the aforesaid ends; and that it is in the best interests of the public health, safety and morals of the City of Portland that an agreement be entered into with the County of Multnomah for the establishment of such a commission; now, therefore, the Mayor and Auditor hereby are authorized to execute, in quadruplicate, an agreement for establishment of a Metropolitan Youth Commission, said agreement being substantially in accordance with the form of agreement attached hereto, marked Exhibit "A" and hereby made a part of this ordinance.

Section 2. The Mayor and Auditor hereby are authorized to draw and deliver warrants to the County of Multnomah to reimburse one-half of the expenditures of the Metropolitan Youth Commission, pursuant to the aforesaid agreement, said warrants to be charged to the General Fund appropriation Bureau of Health, Metropolitan Youth Commission (952).

Section 3. Inasmuch as this ordinance is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public health, peace and safety of the City of Portland in this: In that there is an urgent and immediate need for the establishment of a metropolitan youth commission; there-

fore an emergency hereby is declared to **exist** and this ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its passage by the Council.

AGREEMENT FOR ESTABLISHMENT OF A
METROPOLITAN YOUTH COMMISSION

WHEREAS, the City of Portland, a municipal corporation of the State of Oregon (hereinafter called "City") and the County of Multnomah, a political subdivision of the State of Oregon, (hereinafter called "County") have determined, by and through their City Council and Board of County Commissioners, respectively, that a special program should be inaugurated in the interest of youth guidance and the prevention and control of delinquency; and

WHEREAS, because of the present day mobility of youth and the expected increase in our youth population, the problem of juvenile delinquency is necessarily metropolitan in scope; and

WHEREAS, the relative past success in dealing with delinquency may be attributed to work of those governmental and voluntary agencies and organizations in this area having an established responsibility for child guidance and the prevention and control of delinquency, yet there is need to increase cooperation among these agencies and organizations, and evidence of a willingness on their part to do so; and

WHEREAS, to bring the program into being, a commission is necessary to act as liaison between the general public, our metropolitan youth, and the aforesaid governmental and voluntary agencies and organizations, in order that the purposes hereinbelow set forth may be accomplished; and

WHEREAS, it was the recommendation of the Portland, Multnomah Citizens Committee on Juvenile Delinquency, in its report dated March, 1958, that a Metropolitan Youth Commission be established by the City and County; and

WHEREAS, the Metropolitan Youth Commission should not have officers or employes of the City or the County included in its membership, but should be composed of residents from within the City or the County at large who have heretofore demonstrated an interest in young people, who are respected in the community, and who desire to serve in the promotion of youth welfare, to accomplish through investigation, research, hearings and other methods, the following purposes:

- (a) To provide information on the nature of delinquency in this metropolitan area, the causes of such delinquency, and the extent and current effectiveness of existing public and private services and facilities dealing with the prevention of delinquency or treatment of the delinquent child;

- (b) To determine the needs and shortcomings in youth guidance practices and in present methods of combating delinquency among our metropolitan youth;
- (c) To conduct programs and carry on and coordinate activities for the prevention, reduction and control of juvenile delinquency;
- (d) To provide the leadership needed to direct the activities of existing governmental and private agencies and organizations having an established responsibility for child guidance and delinquency prevention and control along lines that will provide maximum services and remove unnecessary duplication;
- (e) To recommend new techniques and practices to prevent and reduce delinquency, including recommendation of the ways and means by which such techniques and services may be carried out within the framework of existing budget restrictions and available facilities;
- (f) To recommend needed changes in existing laws, statutes and ordinances pertaining to juvenile delinquency and control, and to recommend such new legislation as is deemed desirable;
- (g) To prepare and submit to the City and the County only, all reports, findings, recommendations minutes of meetings, proposed budgets, and an annual report containing an accounting of its expenditures, a description of its activities, an evaluation of its work, and recommendations regarding the subjects of its concern including a recommendation as to the desirability of continued Commission operation; and

WHEREAS, the Metropolitan Youth Commission may be aided by a Youth Advisory Board, composed of persons whose professions are in the field of, or related to, education, health, child guidance, recreation, juvenile correction, and the like, for the purpose of affording the Metropolitan Youth Commission a source of technical assistance and advice; and

WHEREAS, the Metropolitan Youth Commission also may be aided by a Junior Advisory Council, composed of one student representative from each secondary school in the City and the County, to represent the teen-agers in our public parochial and private schools, to express their views, problems and needs to the Metropolitan Youth Commission, and to encourage, among their student bodies, co-operation and interest in programs initiated by recommendation of the Metropolitan Youth Authority;

NOW, THEREFORE, it hereby is agreed between the City and County as follows:

1. City and County agree to create and maintain a commission to act within the geographical jurisdiction of the City and County solely for the purposes set forth hereinabove. Said commission shall be designated the Metropolitan Youth Commission and shall consist of eleven members to be appointed by the Mayor of the City (hereinafter called "Mayor") and the Chairman of the Board of County Commissioners, (hereinafter called "Chairman of the Board") as follows:

1960: The Mayor shall appoint five members and the Chairman of the Board shall appoint six members, all members to serve until June 30, 1961.

Effective July 1, 1961:

The Mayor shall appoint three members to serve for two years and three members to serve for one year. The Chairman of the Board shall appoint three members to serve for two years and two members to serve for one year.

Effective July 1, 1962:

The Mayor shall appoint two members to serve for two years. The Chairman of the Board shall appoint three members to serve for two years.

In each odd-numbered year after 1962, the Mayor and the Chairman of the Board shall each appoint three members to serve for two years. In each even-numbered year after 1962, the Mayor and the Chairman of the Board shall each appoint two members to serve for two years, and shall alternate between themselves in the appointment of one additional member to serve for two years. Members of the Metropolitan Youth Commission shall serve at the pleasure of the appointing authority, but may discontinue their services by resignation. Filing as a candidate for any public office, or accepting a compensated employment or office with the City or County, shall be deemed a resignation. If any member resigns or is removed, the authority who appointed him shall appoint another to serve the balance of his unexpired term.

2. Within three months following the initial appointment of eleven members to the Metropolitan Youth Commission, as provided in paragraph 1 of this agreement, the Mayor and the Chairman of the Board shall jointly appoint a temporary chairman of the Metropolitan Youth Commission and set a date, time and place for its first meeting. At the first meeting, the Metropolitan Youth Commission shall elect a chairman, vice-chairman, and such other officers as it deems needful, to serve through the fiscal year ending June 30, 1961. Thereafter election of such officers shall

be held annually, to serve for the fiscal year of the Metropolitan Youth Commission, which will be from July 1 to June 30. One member of the Metropolitan Youth Commission shall be designated to keep minutes of the first meeting, and of subsequent meetings, until a permanent secretary is employed as hereinafter provided. Within eight weeks following its first meeting, the Metropolitan Youth Commission shall:

- a. Adopt by-laws, including designation of a date, time and place for annual meetings;
- b. Nominate a person to serve in the office of Director, as hereinafter provided.

A majority of eight votes of the membership shall be necessary to adopt or amend by-laws and to nominate or recommend removal of the Director.

3. Permanent staff of the Metropolitan Youth Commission shall consist of a Director and a Secretary. The Director shall be nominated by, and his removal may be recommended by, the Metropolitan Youth Commission. His appointment or removal shall be effective only upon approval of said nomination or recommendation by the Mayor and the Chairman of the Board. The Secretary shall be employed, and may be discharged, by the Director, subject to approval of the Metropolitan Youth Commission. Salaries of the Director and the Secretary shall be fixed by the Mayor and the Chairman of the Board.

4. The County agrees to furnish office space for the Metropolitan Youth Commission. City and County agree to each pay one-half of expenditures of the Metropolitan Youth Commission as hereinafter provided. All such expenditures shall be within budgeted appropriations, except as hereinafter provided, and shall be subject to state law.

5. On or before March 1 annually, the Metropolitan Youth Commission shall submit to the City and the County a tentative budget for the ensuing fiscal year. City and County agree, upon approval of the budget, to each appropriate funds equal to one-half the amount budgeted. All payments shall be disbursed by the County. One-half of the amount budgeted will be reimbursed to the County by the City, semi-annually, in July and January of each fiscal year. If, in any fiscal year, either less or more than the budgeted amount is spent, the City will proportionately either reduce or increase its reimbursement to the County in the ensuing year, in order that actual disbursements be equally shared by City and County.

6. Upon the recommendation of the Metropolitan Youth Commission, a Youth Advisory Board may be created for the purposes hereinabove set forth. Said Board shall consist of twenty members, one-half thereof to be appointed, respectively, by the Mayor and by the Chairman of the Board. The Metropolitan Youth Commission may suggest names of persons to serve on the Youth Advisory Board, and the total number of persons serving on said Board may be modified by mutual agreement between the Mayor and the Chairman of the Board. Persons appointed to the Youth Advisory Board shall serve during the current fiscal year, and, if a member thereof resigns, the authority who appointed him may appoint another person to fill the vacancy thereby created. Members of the Youth Advisory Board shall serve on committees, perform studies, investigations and other duties as are assigned by the Chairman of the Metropolitan Youth Commission.

7. Upon the recommendation of the Metropolitan Youth Commission, a Junior Advisory Council may be created for the purposes hereinabove set forth. Said Council shall consist of one representative voluntarily elected or selected for a one-year term, beginning July 1st, from each public, parochial and private secondary school in the City and the County. Invitation to designate a member shall be by joint request of the Mayor and Chairman of the Board addressed to the official in charge of each of said schools. Representatives on the Junior Advisory Council shall serve on committees, perform studies, investigations and other duties as are assigned by the Chairman of the Metropolitan Youth Commission.

8. Members of the Metropolitan Youth Commission, the Youth Advisory Board, and the Junior Advisory Council shall serve without compensation.

9. This Agreement may be terminated 30 days following passage of an ordinance by the City, or adoption of a resolution by the County, authorizing the same.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the City, pursuant to Section 2-102 of the Charter of the City of Portland, Oregon, and Ordinance No. _____ passed by the Council _____, by and through its Mayor and Auditor, and the County, pursuant to Section 419.010, Oregon Revised Statutes, and Resolution No. _____, adopted _____ by and through its Board of County Commissioners, have caused

4. Volunteer recreation leader at Cambridge Community Center and Manhattanville Settlement House (while going to college and law school), and Pal Boys Club.
5. Chairman of the Speakers' Bureau of United Fund of Multnomah, Clackamas and Washington counties in 1958.

Whether or not you wish me to undertake the chairmanship, I do hope that the Youth Commission will be created forthwith. A good Metropolitan Youth Commission can help make this a better city and county in which to live.

Gentlemen:

I respectfully suggest that a Metropolitan Youth Commission be established jointly by Multnomah County and the City of Portland. You will recall that at the last year's budget sessions we attempted to accomplish this objective that had been jointly recommended to us by our joint Juvenile Study Committee. However, some legal difficulties did ensue relative to the expenditure by Multnomah County of funds for this purpose. Since that time, enabling legislation has been enacted by the Oregon Legislature giving the County authority to so expend funds. I respectfully suggest that we utilize the budget prepared last year and divide the cost equally between the City and the County.

In our former tentative budget, we provided for a Youth Service Representative at a salary of \$6,011.20, and a Stenographer Clerk at a salary of \$3,130.40, a total for personnel service of \$9,141.60. Additional costs for office supplies, mileage of private auto and other charges amounted to \$2110.40, or a total budget of \$11,252. The County's share would be \$5,626.

I feel the existence of such a Youth Commission could be of material assistance in coordinating the youth activities of both the official agencies and those sponsored by private funds. It is further my suggestion that if you find it possible to include this item in your 1959-60 budget, that we meet and discuss the means of constituting such a joint Commission in order to insure that we obtain public spirited private citizens who will approach this problem in a thoroughly objective manner.

Thank you for your attention to this matter.




Dear Commissioner Bean:

Dear Commissioner Bain:

This will acknowledge receipt of your letter dated May 26, 1958, received in this office May 28, 1958, relative to a recent District Attorney's opinion which apparently makes it impossible for Multnomah County to cooperate with the City in the establishment of a joint Metropolitan Youth Commission. I trust that eventually you will find means whereby such a joint operation can be carried on, as I feel it is vitally important to the entire metropolitan area.

In the meantime, we have already budgeted our agreed 50 per cent of the total cost, and should you find it impossible to join us in this effort, I shall recommend to the City Council that we proceed on a limited curtailed basis with a City Youth Authority or Commission.

Certainly this opinion from the District Attorney points up more than ever the necessity of passing the constitutional amendment that will appear on the fall ballot to provide for home rule provisions for county governments here in the State of Oregon.

Gentlemen:

The final report of the Portland-Multnomah Citizens Committee on Juvenile Delinquency has been completed and is now being duplicated. You will recall that I had requested the city or the county on behalf of the committee to handle the duplication. The county and city each volunteered to run the copies, but neither offered to do the job of making the master copy from which the run can be made, with the result that I am calling upon my staff again to do the job which it has had to carry on most of the time since this committee was formed - namely, to do the clerical work, carry on notification of committee meetings, etc.

The resolution which brought about the appointment of this committee contemplated another general meeting of interested people in the community after the report of the committee has been prepared. However, it is the committee's opinion that inasmuch as its appointment stems from the city and the county, our report should be presented to the City Council and the County Commission at a joint meeting. The duplication of the report will take about two weeks. I am suggesting that the City and County Commissions meet in a joint session with the committee, in either the City Hall or the Court House, for a presentation


