Director's Report

Independent Police Review (IPR) Work Plan / Accomplishments

IPR Operations During COVID

Due to the ongoing public health crisis, all IPR staff are working remotely. Although the IPR office is closed to in-person visits, investigators are available to accept complaints online, by phone or by mail.

Community Outreach

IPR Senior Outreach Coordinator Irene Konev attended the South East Public Safety Committee Meeting, Slavic Advisory Council meeting, the Inter-Faith Peace and Action Collaborative meeting and the Philippine American Chamber of Commerce of Oregon meeting. She made a presentation to Portland City Council in support of the Language Pay Differential Policy. Konev also coordinated the fourth annual Slavic Eastern European Celebration Week Proclamation.

CRC Recruitment Update

The CRC selection committee interviewed 15 applicants. Interview results are being tallied. Finalists will be going through training and background checks before being appointed to the CRC.

Police Review Board

IPR continues to work with PPB on a long-term solution for this. IPR and PPB recently met with the Bureau of Technology Services to address some of their concerns and hope volunteers will be able to review files remotely for all upcoming PRBs.

DOJ Settlement Agreement

The next hearing on the Settlement Agreement is scheduled for February 25th but may be postponed. The Draft COCL Q4 Report has come out and a report from DOJ is expected soon.



IPR Budget Documents for FY 2022

The Auditor's Office has made a program offer, in the FY 2022 budget request, to establish the Evaluation and Investigative Services Division. This division is intended to replace IPR, which will cease operations by June 30, 2022, when it completes the transfer of its police accountability responsibilities to a voter-approved community oversight board or a designated interim agency. This division will conduct independent program and policy evaluations and administrative investigations. The division will promote evidence-driven policy decision-making, results-based program adjustments, and sound complaint investigations. The reason for this change is to fill an existing need in the City of Portland for relevant, independent analyses of policy outcomes and program design and to retain IPR employees while the new police accountability body is being created and incentivize those employees to continue their work for the City during that time.
