

Dear Mr. Suderburg:

The supply of water from Willalatin Tank is still in the preliminary stages, as the Springville Pump Station and the pumps to supply the water to Willalatin Tank have not been completed.

At present the Water Engineers are drawing up comprehensive plans for distribution lines from the tank in order to provide estimated costs of this work.

As soon as the plans are completed and the costs determined, it is our intention to notify all the city residents in the area to be supplied, advising them of their share of the distribution main costs, less revenue allowance based on the size of service they will purchase.

The city area to be supplied is rather sparsely settled at this time, and future development will be restricted by the boundaries of Forest Park.

The addresses of the houses on Skyline Boulevard are not presently shown on our maps, so we are unable at this time to determine whether Mrs. Nelson is within the city limits.

As you are aware, we may not supply outside city areas at this time.

In discussion with Mr. Norseth, we find that he did not advise Mrs. Nelson that the Mayor's office could help with this financing, but did agree with her statement that such financing would be helpful.





Grayson DRAINAGE PROBLEM IN THE AREA NORTHERLY OF KELLY BUTTE RESERVOIR SITE Dear Buck: In accordance with your instruction of December 20, 1968, representatives of the Bureau of Water Works met with Multnomah County Road Department representatives, Burt Ryan and Ned Cioeta, at S.E. 98th Avenue and Taggart Street to view the source of complaints regarding high water received from residents on Taggart Street bordering Bureau of Water Works' property. Water at the present time was overflowing the yard at 9914 S.E. Taggart Street; however the other residences appeared to be in no immediate danger of flooding. Messrs. Ryan and Cioeta stated that this particular lower area had been a source of drainage problems for many years and that similar occurrences had been experienced earlier creating even worse conditions than that which presently exist. They stated that the situation was compounded by the placing of fill on private property in part of the drainage area westerly of 98th Avenue. The County stated they had not previously dug sumps to drain this area as had been reported and felt the County had no obligation to correct the situation. Mr. Ditsch, 9855 S.E. Taggart Street, constructed the original residence at 9914 S.E. Taggart Street which is at the lowest elevation of the residences adjoining the drainage area and has the severest water problem. Mr. Ditsch stated the house was constructed in 1948 and for a time drainage was satisfactory through some old sumps constructed easterly of said residence. He stated that the sumps had not been maintained and had deteriorated from vandalism and lack of repair. Mr. and Mrs. Brooks, 9914 S.E. Taggart Street, an elderly couple who have resided at this residence for the last three years were contacted. They explained that the property is owned by their son who resides at 1277 S.E. 48th Avenue.

It was Mr. Brooks' opinion that the condition was in part created by the Bureau of Water Works' construction work on Kelly Butte Reservoir which contributed to the silting of the bottom of the natural drainage area. Mr. Brooks was informed that the Bureau of Water Works would investigate the matter further.

SINGSTON . . . CONTROLS

The southerly portion of the drainage area was studied to determine if suitable sites for excavation of a sump were available and usable at this season of the year. It was determined that a suitable location was available near the old Civil Defense Center site which could be used as a set-up for a clam shell operation if the City elected to attempt to correct the problem by this method.

The Multnomah County representatives stated that a drainage sump would have to be at least 30 feet in depth to reach gravels which would satisfactorily provide drainage based on their experience in the area.

The drainage in this particular location has been a source of trouble for many years. When the Bureau of Water Works purchased the site approximately 15 years ago, the original owner reserved the right to remove the timber from the property and in an ensuing "wet" winter, the water rose considerably. A lawsuit was instigated against the Bureau of Water Works, however it was later dropped.

There are no storm drainage facilities in the immediate area and the Bureau of Water Works intends to install a sump in the near future in order to handle the overflow and heavily chlorinated water in the Kelly Butte Reservoir.

Sir: For your information, Sam Gillette, Dale Reed, and I met yesterday with Pement and Grant Miller. It is the same old problem: The Water Bureau does not want to pay their cost of the share of City overhead expenses (they think \$100,000 is enough). They only want to pay their cost accounted share of the few items that are charged back directly, such as this insurance. In most areas this insurance coverage has been vastly improved and they agree. The problem is water tanks which by themselves have a low premium rate (and would be lower than the City's group rate). Thus, they could buy separate coverage cheaper than our group rate, but we defeat the whole purpose of this improved insurance coverage if they go buy separate coverage, and it would be practically impossible to charge the various departments at separate rates. I think they have agreed to keep tanks in the consolidated policy at least until the anniversary date next July. Jack is going to let me know if they

are considering getting out (which will raise our overall city rate) and either getting separate coverage or no coverage.

Dale and I wouldn't voluntarily disagree if they didn't get any coverage -it is a calculated risk as to riots, wind, damage, etc. -- but again, their getting separate coverage would be the beginning of the end of our group policy.

Dear Commissioner Grayson:

For your information attached is a departmental bill from the Bureau of Property Control for blanket fire and extended coverage insurance on city property.

The amount is \$3,483.00 for the Water Bureau's share for one year. As this is far in excess of previous fire insurance costs (averaging \$650.65 for the last six years), I believe it should be called to your attention before approval.

This is a city wide insurance policy with \$10,000 deductible, and does not protect against earthquake, flood, landslides, smoke damage, civil insurrection, war, or nuclear radiation.

It does protect <u>above</u> ground installations against fire, rain, sleet, snow, wind and riot.

In arriving at the proportionate amount to be paid by the Bureau, it is my understanding that all above ground installations are included. This would include our tanks, standpipes and steel reservoirs and pump stations as well as Interstate headquarters, Division Street warehouse and other houses.

As noted above any losses due to fire, etc., that we sustain less than \$10,000 will be borne by the Bureau.

The fire insurance the Bureau carried on its properties, at amortized cost of \$238 on June 30, 1968 was cancelled by the Bureau of Property Control in August. The Water Bureau received \$115 for unused premiums, making a net loss of \$123.

Commissioner Grayson's questions regarding Fire Insurance Costs to the Water Bureau.

Sir:

For your information, Sam Gillette, Dale Reed, and I met yesterday with Pement and Grant Miller.

It is the same old problem: The Water Bureau does not want to pay their cost of the share of City overhead expenses (they think \$100,000 is enough). They only want to pay their cost accounted share of the few items that are charged back directly, such as this insurance.

In most areas this insurance coverage has been vastly improved and they agree. The problem is water tanks which by themselves have a low premium rate (and would be lower than the City's group rate). Thus, they could buy separate coverage cheaper than our group rate, but we defeat the whole purpose of this improved insurance coverage if they go buy separate coverage, and it would be practically impossible to charge the various departments at separate rates.

I think they have agreed to keep tanks in the consolidated policy at least until the anniversary date next July. Jack is going to let me know if they are considering getting out (which will raise our overall city rate) and either getting separate coverage or no coverage.

Dale and I wouldn't voluntarily disagree if they didn't get any coverage-it is a calculated risk as to riots, wind, damage, etc. --but again, their
getting separate coverage would be the beginning of the end of our group
policy.

Dear Dale:

According to the recent conversations that we have had, I have now completed my analysis of the city's Blanket Fire insurance contract as to the effect that the Water Bureau property has to the overall rate as well as what the cost of the Water Bureau properties would be on a separate schedule of insurance. My report is broken into four sections which are as follows:

I -- Deletion of all Water Bureau properties from the Blanket contract.

At the present time, Dale, the city's Blanket Fire rate is .038 and the Extended Coverage is .021 for a total of .059 per One Hundred Dollars of insurance per year. The new rates, with the deletion of the properties indicated above, would be .039 on the Fire and .020 on the Extended Coverage, or a total of .059. In other words, by making the adjustments indicated in this paragraph, there would be no affect on the cost of the city's insurance.

II -- Deletion of tanks only.

If this particular schedule were deleted from the contract, the Fire insurance rate would increase from .038 to .042 but the Extended Coverage rate would actually decrease from .021 to .020. The net rate that the city would pay would be increased to .062 from its present level of .059.

III -- If the Water Department were to purchase their separate Multiple Location Fire insurance contract, they could do so on the same basis that the city is purchasing their's for a Blanket Fire rate of .027 and a Blanket Extended Coverage rate of .021, or a total of .048. This would be their cost predicated on the \$5,528,131 of values which we have initially established.

IV -- If the Water Department were to purchase a separate Blanket contract excluding the water tanks, they would have total values of \$1,551,319 and their Blanket Fire rate would be .108 and the Extended Coverage rate of .031, or a total of .139 per One Hundred Dollars of insurance purchased per year.

There are a number of computations, Dale, which can be made concerning the rates times the various amounts of insurance in question. However, I have not gone into those but felt that I could give you the information and you could make whatever computations you felt would be pertinent. I might mention that earlier when we had the meeting with the Water Department, I did mention that it would appear that the cost of the tanks was approximately $2\frac{1}{2}$ ¢ per One Hundred Dollars of insurance it was unfortunate that I made the remark in a conversational way, because the way this figure was arrived at was a method other than actually re-computing the entire schedule minus the specific values, rates, and premiums for each individual location. In the figures that I have indicated in this letter, we have actually done that, and, as you know, the computation is a rather lengthy one involving a series of credits and adjustments.

I, of course, would be very glad to meet with you or any other group and bring my working papers along so that we could sit down and go into the background and analysis of the figures which I have presented herein. Call me, Dale, if you have any questions. Cordially.

It would appear that in order to include waterBureau assets in the existing program, it will be necessary to also include the tanks in question in order to protect the existing rate.

By excluding <u>all</u> Water Bureau assets from the program, the ræte remains at the present level of .059 per hundred dollars of asset value. By excluding only the tanks from the Water Bureau assets and including the balance of them, our rate increases to approximately .062. (an increase of .003 per \$100 of asset valuation.) Therefore, in order to retain our current rate and continue to insure the Water Bureau, the tanks <u>must</u> be included.

Theoretically at least, we should be able to save approximately for per year by having a separate policy on the Water Bureau. However, the potential cost of administering a second insurance program would probably exceed the savings. It is possible in this case, also, that the insured objects would have to be scheduled (listed) in order to qualify for a blanket rate and this might also require an actual physical appraisal. This figure of course eliminates the questioned assets and gives a blanket rate on the xixxxx Water Bureau structures of .139 per hundred dollars of valuation.

The rates quoted above, except for the current rate, are estimates since any blanket rate px must be verified and checked by the Insurance Rating Bureau before becoming effective. The .025 rate in question in the Water Bureau's letters was a xxxxxxxxxx not a quoted rate but represents the share of the Tanks in the .059 rate.

Dear Commissioner Grayson:

In discussing the cost of the fire and extended coverage insurance on the new city plan, it was disclosed that the rate on the reservoirs above ground was .025 per 100.

On the amount of \$3,976,812 value at the above rate the cost for including the reservoirs is \$994.20.

The rate to the city with reservoirs included is .065 (\$22,755).(2. Without the reservoirs the rate is .070 (\$22,400). On this basis the additional cost of including the reservoirs is \$355. #985.

In addition, certain locations were not included in the billing to the Bureau. This amount is \$270.37.

The Water Bureau is willing to pay its fair share on the insurance, but, as the greatest valuation is at the least cost, and as this valuation (reservoirs) will increase far out of proportion to other Water Bureau properties, it is recommended that the reservoirs be charged at the rate of .025 per \$100 and that the Bureau pay the items not billed in addition.



The Naval Facilities Engineering Command, in connection with the Water Pollution Abatement Program, is reviewing its criteria for cross-connection control to prevent backflow from contaminated sources into potable water systems. We would appreciate it if you would provide us with the benefit of Portland's experience with respect to this important problem. We would be interested in answers to the following questions.

What is Portland's policy with regard to reduced pressure principle backflow preventers vs. double check valve assemblies for cross-connection control in locations where a health hazard exists?

If reduced pressure principle backflow preventers are used, is certification of these devices required, such as that conducted by the Foundation for Cross-Connection Control Research, University of Southern Galifornia, under its three-year testing program? If another form of certification or pre-acceptance testing is required, please give details.

From which manufacturer(s) do you procure the reduced pressure principle backflow preventers? From which manufacturer(s) do you procure double check valve assemblies? Has there been any history of malfunction with either of these devices? If so, give details.

How are backflow prevention devices in service monitored? (Include such items as frequency of inspection.)

Has any problem been encountered with freezing of water in these devices? If so, what measures are taken to alleviate the problem?



MAYOR'S OFFICE

For some time, this office has recommended that the Bureau of Water assign an understudy to Grant Miller, the Assistant Water Superintendent. Mr. Miller, who will reach earliest retirement age in 15 months, has unique knowledge of the accounting system and procedures of the Water Bureau. If his services were suddenly lost, it would be several years before order was restored.

Since Mr. Miller is anticipating early retirement, it has been urged that an experienced accountant be hired to provide assistance and understudy him. This position would be in lieu of one position of General Accountant. A new title of Utilities Accountant is suggested, and a salary scale of Range 36, which will give a starting rate of \$633 and a maximum of \$757 per month. This rate would be six ranges above the usual entry Accountant position.

This matter has been discussed with Commissioner Grayson, who suggests that the action be accomplished as soon as possible. I have also spoken to the Civil Service Director, George McDonald. He feels that with the suggested salary range, an experienced college-trained accountant can be obtained, who will be of value to the Water Bureau in a minimum period of time.

It is recommended that the suggested position be created as soon as possible by the Council.

Commissioner Mark (Buck) Grayson has personally seen to it that copies of the Bureau of Water Works Annual Report were available for each of you.

In transmitting them to you, let me draw your attention to some aspects which were of particular interest to me:

- 1. Exhibit VIII, page 18-19. This exhibit, which has been used for several years, is an excellent example of gross functional or program reporting. Though the format does not provide prior year figures, a look at last year's report discloses the interesting fact that the charges for auto maintenance (over which any unit should be able to exersize some control) decreased this past year ('67) by 4.5% over the previous year. "Misc. Direct Charges" (over which there is probably less control) about a 1% decrease and "Material From Stock" (much control) 20% decrease in costs. "Payroll", affected in large measure by total city pay scales and raises, increased about 4.3%. I'd have to say that's a healthy picture.
- 2. Excibit XXIX, page 41. Here we do find a comparison with the previous year. I was particularly interested in the reduction of days lost from sick and injury leave. Ted Suderberg informs me that this reduction can be directly attributed to careful records kept and analyzed by their payroll department. Just a superficial look at these figures indicates that, by a reduction of over 1500 man days, a minimum savings of over \$30,000 has been affected.

Finally, you would also be interested in knowing that the independent audit for fiscal '66-'67 contains no negative comments or suggestions for improvement. Previous audits have and we are assured by the Bureau management that they are very proud that their efforts to make suggested improvements have apparently met with their auditor's approval. May I suggest a personal word from you to Buck at some convenient time. We want to encourage this evidence of good management whenever and wherever it is manifested.
