I. The swimming pool will be supplied by the City of Portland (Parks Dept.) It will be operated by the Portland Park Bureau. It will be located at Woodlawn school, 7200 N. E. 11th St. It will open as soon as possible, probably within the next week. The pool will be opened eight hours a day, seven days a week through Labor Day. The size of the pool is 20 by 40 feet and 3 feet deep.

#### II. NEEDS TO BE MET

- 1. Three (3) lifeguards--full time.
- Toilet facilities (and possible showers).

#### III. COST

- 1. Three lifeguards at \$2.25 per hour for a total cost of \$268.50 per week. Total cost of \$1611 plus 10% for fringe benefits for a total cost for the lifeguards of \$1772.10.
- Toilet facilities will cost \$140.
- 3. Total cost (this is at present, showers and maintenance could raise the cost).

When I was elected to the Model Cities Citizens' Planning Board by people of the Eliot School District, I had high hopes that the Model Cities program would achieve its objective by providing the means for people to be decisively involved in the planning of solutions of the problems that affect them, having some control over what happens to them.

I have found, however, that the Citizens' Planning Board, far from serving in its intended capacity of representing the people that elected it has, on the contrary, acted in a variety of ways that have ranged from incompetence and indecisiveness, to open opposition to non-board-member area reclinents having any influence over Model Cities whatsoever. This could hardly be called representative of the people of the Model Cities neighborhood.

To say that the Board has failed to fulfill its obligation as an elected body, that of representing its constituency, would be an understatement and half truth since it has not only demurred in its responsibility, but, has on many occasions abrogated the will of the people. This has been particularly apparent in its attitude toward any proposals designed to create meaningful involvement of people who live in the Model Cities neighborhood.

Moreover, during its existence of over a year, the Board has followed a noute of steady decline, from a fumbling disorganized beginning to its present of opposing factions embroiled in playing a game of petty politics.

Unifortunately, while the Board is obviously derelect in its responsibility, it still masquerades as being representative of the people who are in turn left out in the cold; now even more than before.

As the Model Cities program moves into its "action year", it is nore than ever apparent that there is a dire need for a means by which the recipients of this program can be influential in "action year" plans that will undoubtedly affect their lives, and have some influence over what happens to them. It is this critical need that has caused me much concern, as to how the people that elected me to represent them could influence this program; it is obvious that they cannot through the Citizens! Planning Board.

With this thought in mind I have, after much soul searching, decided that since the best interest of the people in my area are not being served by the Citizens' Planning Board, I must withdraw from the Board and seek adequate means for people to be represented in the Model Cities program.

#### Voice and Choice Denied

What: Press Conference

Where: 202 N.E. Graham Street

When: June 12, 1969

My name is Rozelle Yee. I am one of the elected representatives on the Model Cities Citizens' Planning Board from the Eliot School District. I called this press conference today to give some of the facts regarding the circumstances which led me to threaten to resign.

The basic concept of the MCP is that recipient people must have significant influence in the planning process and in the carrying out of plans that affect them and not just be informed of plans already made and not just be administered to; but, to be Actively involved in the formulation of plans that affect their lives.

The Citizens' Planning Board has, in the past, and, is continuing to act contrary to the concept of the MCP: that of allowing people some control over what happens to them. During this past year, every proposal that would allow people to acquire some influence over this program has been blocked in one way or another by the Citizens' Planning Board.

This adverse behavior by the Board became apparent as early as July of last year when a proposal was submitted to it on behalf of the Model Cities Area residents which provided for the following:

- Establishment of avenues of communication between people, the planners, and the CPB.
- The means by which people could be influential in Model Cities planning procedures.
- 3) The right of people to accept or reject by vote any proposal that affected them.

This proposal, which required at least three votes by various committees before it could even be considered by the Board, was referred back to committee when first submitted to the Board because it was "... not in the proper form." When the Board found it could not kill the proposal to give people a say in what happens to them without creating adverse publicity for itself, it passed a watered down version which limited the vote to housing proposals for the Eliot School District. However, the Board did not include even this watered down safeguard in its final package submitted to N.U.D.

In late October a citizens'group, made up of neighborhood people submitted a proposed, detailed plan to involve people in the Model Cities planning process, the first stage of which was to be a telephone survey that would both familiarize people with the Model Cities program and find out their desires and needs. These people were all volunteers who planned their own activities without outside help, and asked only that Model Cities make office space, phones and other utilities available. After much rangling with the Board and staff, office space and phones were finally provided, but then, in the middle of winter, they refused to turn on the heat. The office was therefore unusable. The tax money that was spent on the office and phones was wasted, and the citizens' group (United in Service of Albina) U.S.A. ultimately enlisted the aid of a private organization to conduct the survey.

At the last meeting of the Board on June 3rd, a proposal was submitted that would have provided training and technical assistance and a series of seminars for people who, for lack of experience, have been unable to effectively particapate on the working committees, and reimbursment to help defray the cost of babysitters, etc; for low income people who have been unable to attend meetings for financial reasons. This proposal was voted down by the Board. Some board members, who had voted against it, later expressed a desire to reconsider their vote. The board chairman was contacted and asked to call a special meeting. He refused, saying that the board was already so divided that he was afraid another vote on this proposal would cause a complete split. It is obviously unrealistic to preserve this board while sacrificing the interest of the people, who the board does not nor has not ever adequately represented.

This is not meant to be a record of the Boards's activities for the past year. It is meant, rather, to show the attitude of the Board toward people having some control over the Model Cities program. It is this attitude that causes my concern and frustration.

It has been apparent for some time that the Model Cities program has been leaning more and more toward being just another program imposed on people whether they want it or not; (being different in that people are in imminent danger of losing their homes against their will.) For this reason, it is of utmost importance that people be allowed some control over this program. The Citizens' Planning Board, however, seems intent on playing its' game of sand box politics, and not only fails to represent the people who elected it, but block any attempt at providing a means by which people can represent themselves.

Because of this, I have decided to bring the issue before the people to make them aware of the problems, and to see if someone can come up with a way for people to have a voice and a choice in this program.



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
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

I, Thomas Wilson, member of the Cascade College Task Force and a member of the Model Cities Citizens Planning Board, representing the Boise area, am writing you this letter regarding the action that the Model Cities Citizens Planning Board has taken in regard to the Cascade College acquisition.

A draft or promissory note for \$400,000 to be drawn immediately to stop foreclosure action, and \$450,000 if necessary at a future date when needed to secure said property.







I am a graduate student enrolled in the doctoral program in Urban Planning at the University of Wisconsin and am presently involved in the process of developing a dissertation proposal. In developing this proposal, I am attempting to select a group of study areas (Model Cities Areas in several different cities) which could be utilized for purposes of comparison.

My personal observation of several Model Cities Areas points up very clearly the multiplicity of institutions and agencies operating within them and having an affect on them. Their overlapping jurisdictions and duplication of services have definite implications for coordination. Most important, for my purpose, is the fact that there has been little if any relationship between the public school as an institution and other institutions providing services to the same community. There seems to be a need for the development of more effective program collaboration between agencies and city departments, and the school on a local level.

My research will intensively examine the program interrelationships and the possibilities for program collaboration between one functional service or "program component"—to be selected—and the public education function. I would appreciate your forwarding any information on this particular subject which may be of help.

In order to be better able to consider your Model Cities Area(s) as a candidate for study, would you send me a copy of your Model Cities application and "problem analysis(es)" of the target area(s), if available. I would also like to know of your potential interest in and willingness to cooperate with me in this endeavor.

Should I eventually select one of your areas for study, I will send you a copy of my proposal as soon as possible. Thank you for your attention and consideration.

A. From November 14, 1969 through December 31, 1969

#### 1. Citizens Health Council (Working Committee)

This group has been meeting regularly and is still functioning with an acting chairman, pending more resident participation.

#### 2. Eye Clinic

The Oregon Optometric Center (clinic) has opened in temporary quarters downtown, 1122 S.W. Stark St. We are still working closely with the representatives of the Pacific University College of Optometry in an effort to obtain an adequate permanent location within the Model Neighborhood (MN).

#### 3. Directory of Community Services

The first draft has been completed and sent out for comments. Feedback has been received and we are ready to go into final copy on this.

#### 4. Maternal and Infant Care Project at Emanuel Hospital

We met with them and Dr. Carl Ashley, Director of Maternal and Child Health Section, Oregon State Board of Health, to discuss the problem of too many clients for the project's budget to cover. At this time alternatives are being studied.

#### 5. Drugs

Many participants in the Methadon Program are from the MN, and must go to the downtown area daily for their dosage of Methadon. A commitment has been made by a pharmacist in the MN to be a Methadon dispenser; the next step is up to the Drug Control Section of the Oregon State Board of Health. We are working with the Multi-Service Center, the City/County Health Department and Drug Control on this matter. (It is realized that this is but one facet in an overall drug program).

#### 6. Simplified Roberts Rules of Order

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This is not specifically related to Health, but it is felt to be vital information for everyone working in Model Cities (the board, staff, and the Working Committees). Therefore, arrangements were made to get this information and the Model Cities staff is now making an ample number of copies of it. This booklet will be invaluable in group and decision-making roles.

#### 8. Last, But Most Important: 3.61 Health Insurance Design

All of the preceding are attempts to show work done on health projects and to illustrate the broad range of the fields to be covered in developing a realistic health insurance design for the Portland  $MN_{\bullet}$ 

Beyond what was mentioned earlier, we are also working on the problem via:

- a. Contact with other Model Cities Programs through correspondence, e.g., Duluth, Minnesota and Trenton, New Jersey.
- b. Research and reading in current periodicals such as the January, 1970 issue of Fortune Magazine, which has a special section on "Our Ailing Health System."

#### B. Work Program for the Next 45 Days

The most pressing problems now are in the areas of the development of the Citizens' Health Council (Working Committee) and in the clarification of health insurance needs and the determining of eligibility within the framework of the 3.61 Health Insurance Design Component.

The Health Coordinator proposes to do the following in the next 45 days:

- 1. Expand the representation of the Health Council.
- 2. Clarify with the council members how they are to function as a committee, and in relation to the Model Cities staff and to the Citizens' Planning Board.
- 3. Continue work in other areas mentioned in Part I of this report.
- 4. Distribute the Directory of Community Services.

Each summer we have had to make an appeal to the community for money, supplies and equipment for our Summer Youth Program. Each summer we have had to find a suitable building in which to house the program.

This summer, as in each summer in the past, we are thinking of a year around program for youth. Not just a summer crash program to keep youth cool for the summer but a cool youth program for the entire year. Although the Office of Economic Opportunity provides funds for our Summer Crash Program, these funds barely pay for staffing the program.

So that we don't confuse you, let me explain why our goal is \$5,000.00. We are asking for donations in the name of two (2) causes. Our Summer Youth Program which runs from June 16th through September 15th and also an all year program that will be housed in the same building. The City of Portland has donated to us an old church building in the area of Stanton yards and Emanuel Hospital. It is a sound cement block building which we can use for four (4) years rent free. We are trying to rennovate this structure to house our Summer Program before summer is over. Vandals have removed all fixture, equipment and wiring from the building which we have to replace before the building is usable; projected rennovation cost is \$2.000.00.

In our year round program we will provide such professional services as Counseling & Guidance on a voluntary basis. At the present, we have had several psychologists and a psychiatrist who have indicated that they would be available for such a project on a voluntary basis. The counselors will be available 4-6 P.M. three days per week. Since one of the greatest reasons that youngsters drop our of school is because they can't communicate, we hope to catch the potential drop-out before he drops-out by providing drop-in counseling service. We feel that we can augment the school system by helping to make education more relevant and meaningful by helping them understand not only the system, but themselves; by providing a means of closing the communications gap between the youth, the schools and the parents.

We also feel that the lack of cultural and educational exposure other than through the Public schools, has caused problems that can only be solved by providing this needed exposure through field trips, etc. We will be providing a quiet place for youth to study, read, sit and talk, hold discussions or just pass time in an atmosphere conducive to these types of activities, rather than in the pool halls or on the streets.

Both programs will be directed by the Albina Neighborhood Service Center, with the Albina Citizens' War on Poverty Committee serving as the Advisory Board until we can select an advisory committee from among those agencies that are active in the community.

Since most programs for youth lean heavily toward recreation, we feel that this type of program is necessary and desireable.

We are asking for \$5,000.00 to cover not only the cost of rennovating the building but for operational funds for our year round program, the money to be used as follows:

This program is not another adult program scaled down for youth, but a program conceived and directed by youth. We also recognize the fact that \$2,033.00 is not enough money for part time staffing for an entire year, but it is a beginning.

Enclosed please find a copy of each category of employment announcements of the Model Cities' staff positions which were closed November 29, 1969. You will note that there is no recommendations for the Citizens Participation Assistant at this time.

During this interim period, I would urge that the Committee and the full Board give much thought to filling out the complete staff within the limit of funds available, so that when the next director comes on board the administration will not be understaffed.

In order to relieve us of financial drain of continuing the retention of Kelly Girls, it has been suggested in the past that we should hire high school girls on a training basis. While the overall theory is very good, nevertheless, I deem it very essential that we bring aboard a professional clerk typist regardless of the cost - because once the Citizens Participation staff is completely filled out, the business of the Citizens Planning Board and the neighborhood organizations and, even perhaps, the Working Committees will be such that high school girls, attempting to be instructed by Miss Casey who is already overloaded, simply will not be able to meet the demands of the workload for the above units so stated.

I have informed the Chairman of the Catizens Planning Board that during this interim period the administrative staff will keep the Board apprised of all actions as to developments for future hiring, and we shall do the dame with you and the Personnel Hiring Committee.

The Portland Development Commission has reviewed the City Planning Commission staff report contained in the February 4, 1969, Agenda of the City Planning Commission relative to planning for urban renewal activities in the Model Cities Neighborhood.

The Development Commission will support in every way possible the efforts of the City Planning Commission to develop a comprehensive plan which reflects the needs and desires of the people of the community. In addition, the Development Commission feels the City Planning Commission must play an important role in the physical planning aspects of any urban renewal project or program. However, since the Development Commission is totally responsible for contracting for and carrying out urban renewal activities in the City of Portland, it cannot abrogate its responsibilities for developing renewal projects and programs. The Development Commission, therefore, must retain administrative and fiscal responsibility over urban renewal plans and programs which are to be carried out by the Commission.

The Development Commission will continue to work closely with the City Planning Commission in establishing procedures which will assure a close working relationship between the Development Commission, the Citizens' Planning Board and the City Planning Commission and all planning to be carried out in the Model Cities Area.

I suggest that the City Planning Commission and the Development Commission meet at an early date to discuss these matters.
