### **Revenue Division**

We collect \$1.55 billion annually on behalf of the City of Portland Gen. Fund & bureaus, Metro, Multnomah County, Travel Portland, Enhanced Service Districts, and others.

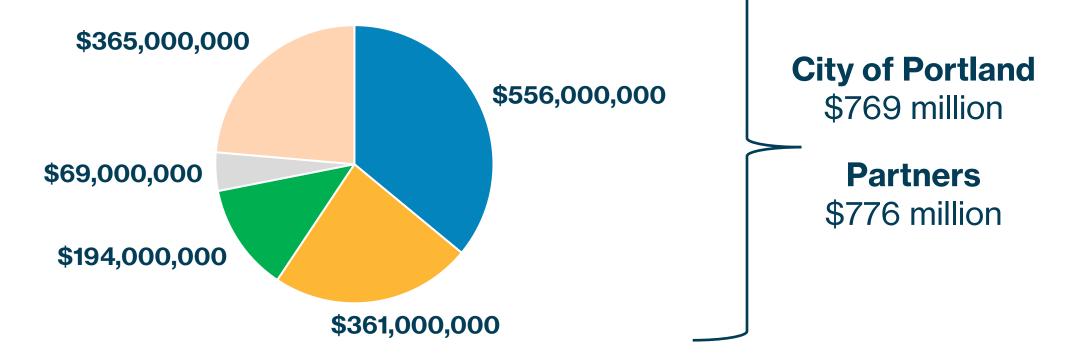

## **Treasury & Public Finance Divisions**

We provide centralized banking, investment management and debt financing services for all City programs. The Treasurer is also the administrator of the City's foreclosure sale process.

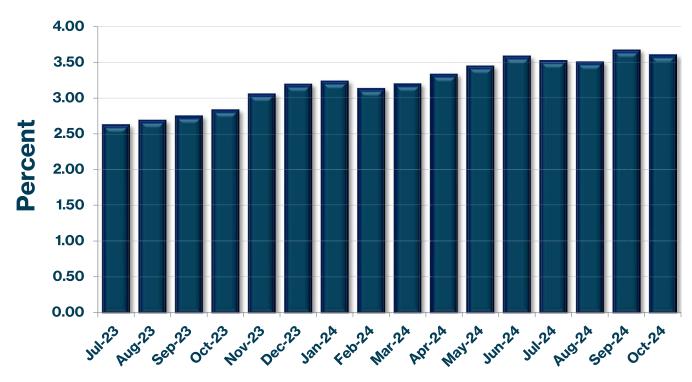
FY24-25 Budget: \$3.5 million (Operational)

#### **Treasury Team: (5.5 FTE)**

Manages a citywide investment portfolio of approximately \$3.2 billion.

- Earned \$101 million in Fiscal Year 2023-24
  - ✓ Paid directly to City Bureaus and program budgets

#### **City of Portland Portfolio Yield History**



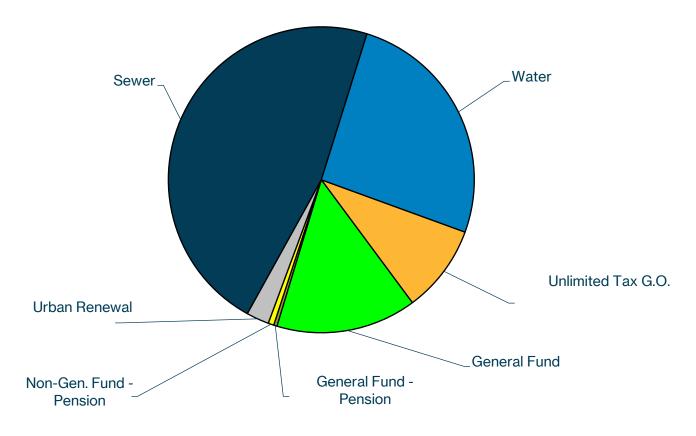
## **Treasury & Public Finance Divisions**

#### **Public Finance Team: (3.5 FTE)**

Manages approximately \$2.9 billion of debt financings for all bureaus and Prosper Portland.

- ➤ Issued \$759 million of bonds/loans for new City projects during Fiscal Year 2023-24 and YTD 2024-25.
- Over the same time-period, refinanced \$412 million of existing bonds to generate savings of \$21 million.

## **Business Operations Division**

We provide centralized support for bureau budget development, financial analysis, accounting, timekeeping, and personnel and employee related services.

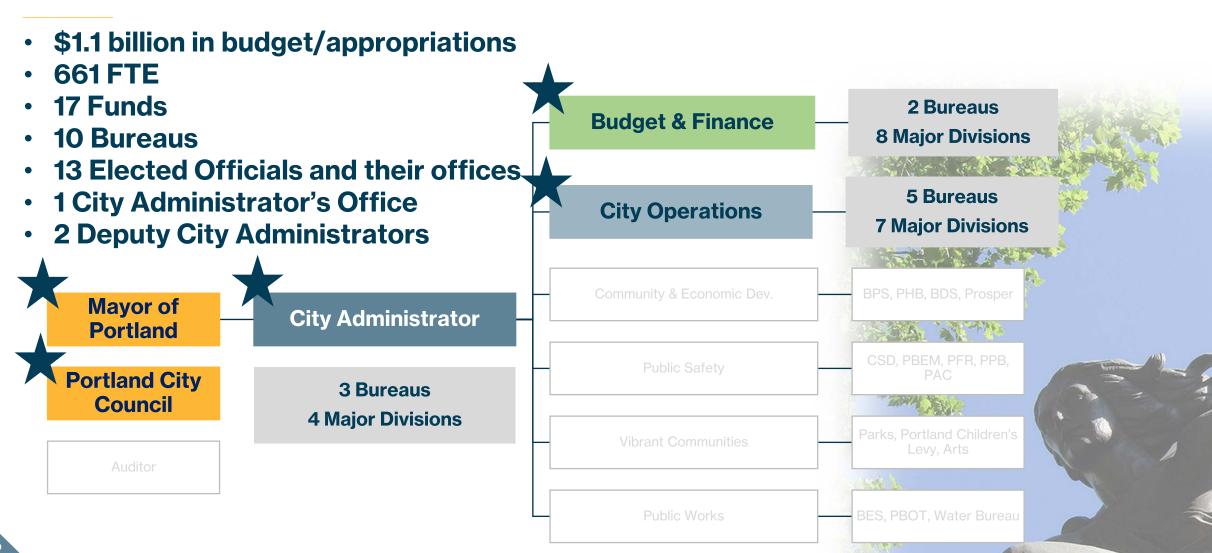
#### Work Teams: 37.5 FTE

- 6 teams organized by business line and customer bureau/organization
- Single "point of contact" approach

#### **FY24-25 Budget**: \$8.6 million

- Funded by customer bureaus based upon services received
- Cost allocation includes consideration of budget size, FTE count and any specialized or unique needs.

## **Grants Management**

#### Work Teams (13 FTE):

- Application Coordination Team: supports Bureau- and Office-led applications for grant funding and coordinate the City's pursuit of private, local, state, and federal funding opportunities.
- Incoming Grants Team: ensures effective administration and oversight of federal, state and private grant awards.
- Outgoing Grants Team: provides responsible management and adherence to City policies for outgoing grants from the City to the community.
- Public Assistance Disaster Recovery Team: coordinates citywide for federal reimbursement for disaster declaration

**FY24-25 Budget**: \$3.6 million



## Accounting

We review over \$2.1 billion in payable transactions annually and produce the City's Annual Comprehensive Financial Report.

- Financial Reporting

**FY24-25 Budget**: \$8.6 million

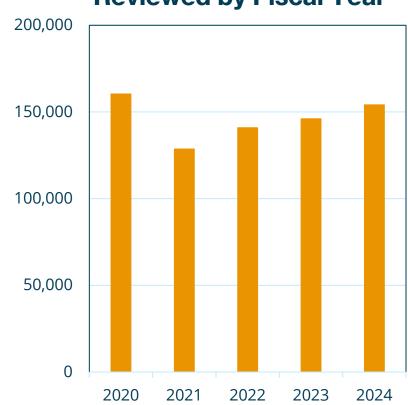
#### What is the Annual Comprehensive Financial Report (ACFR)?

## **Recent Accomplishments**



**Revenue**: All new 2025 agreement with TurboTax (Intuit) to make Portland area taxes easier to file this tax season (due April 15).



**Treasury & Public Finance**: City's AAA general obligation bond credit rating affirmed.



**Accounting:** Awarded the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting for 43 consecutive years by the Government Finance Officers Association.



**Business Operations**: Formed an internal team to support technical reorganization implementation.



**Grants**: Adopted a new Outgoing Grant Policy, 0 findings in the FY24 Single Audit (mandatory audit for any non-federal entity that expends over \$750,000 in federal funds during a fiscal year.



Risk: New Risk Management Information (RMIS) System implemented.

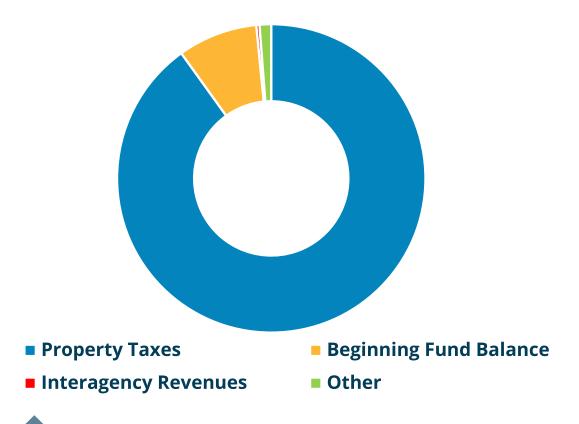

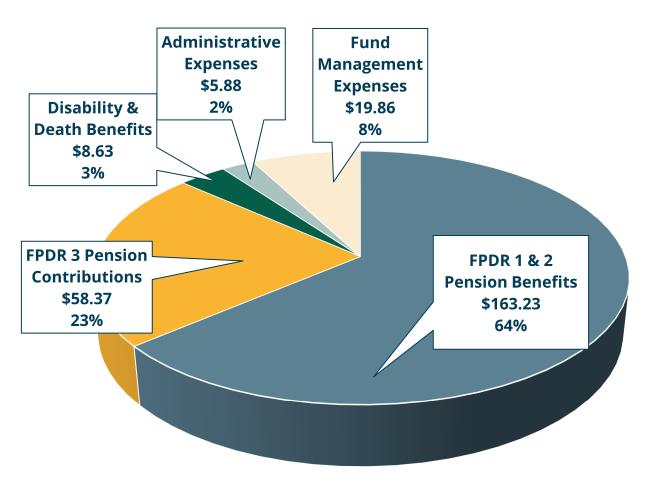

We enable candidates to run for office through small contributions and matching funds.

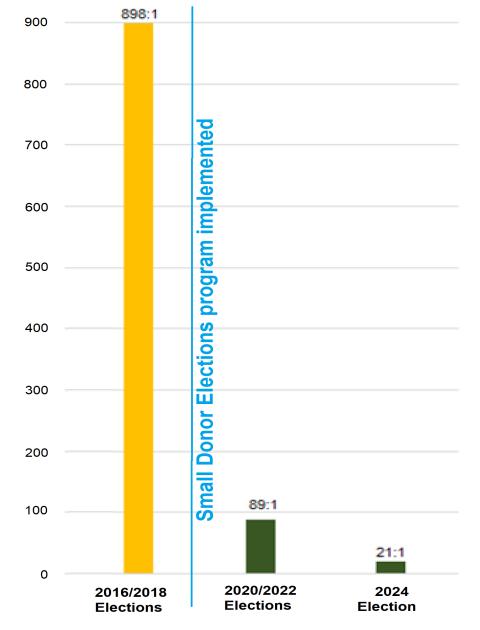
#### Work Team (2 FTE + casual staff):

FY24-25 Budget: \$1.383 million

#### The Work Ahead:

Using qualitative and quantitative data from the 2024 election – including user experience research – to improve the program.



The chart compares the zip code that contributed most per resident to least per resident. A 1:1 ratio would represent broad and equitable participation.

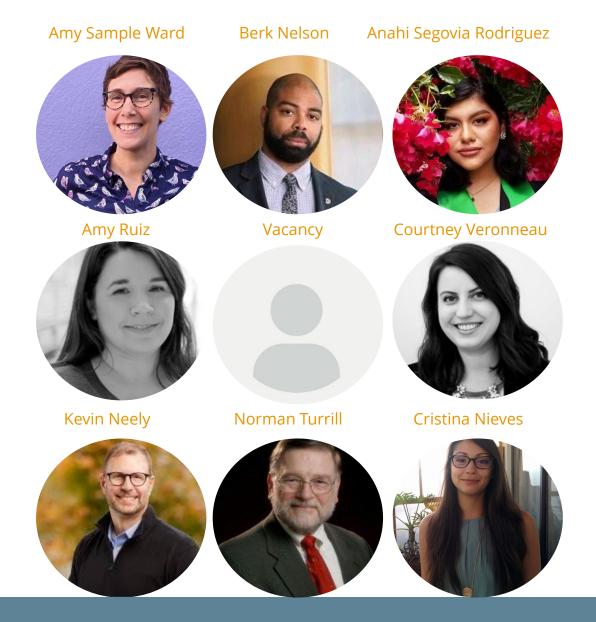
## **Primary Challenge**

Finding funding to enable the program without dramatically cutting match caps.

## **Portland Elections Commission**

- Independent commission, added to City Charter by voters in 2024
- Implements Small Donor Elections program
- Recommends policy updates and improvements to Council and the Director
- Annually informs Mayor and Council of funding needed for Small Donor Elections program to be solvent



## **City Budget Office**

We provide timely, accurate, and transparent information and analysis regarding financial planning, forecasting, and budgeting for the enterprise for the City and to Portlanders.

**FY24-25 Budget**: \$5.2 million

## **Budget and Policy Analysis Team**



Provide impartial analysis on budget concepts, actions, ordinances, and budget-related policy.



Work with bureau finance staff to aid in the development of bureau budgets.



Manage the annual and supplemental budget processes, budget book development, and City budget software to ensure procedural justice, legal compliance, and informed decision making by City leadership.



Create materials and participate in community engagement to support education and transparency regarding the City's financial health, budget processes, tradeoffs, and decisions.

## **Performance Team**



Set direction and provide policy and implementation support for bureaus to use data to manage performance.



Conduct citywide quality/process improvement training and support



Lead the Portland Insights survey, a biannual survey of Portlanders, to inform decision-making around services, policy, and budget
